boundless	Seemingly boundless in amount number degree or especially extent. <i>Enthusiasts who devote boundless energy to their hobby.</i>
general	Prevailing among and common to the general public. <i>Bearing a general resemblance to the original.</i>
global	Relating to or encompassing the whole of something, or of a group of things. <i>Global monetary policy.</i>
infinite	Very great in amount or degree. <i>He bathed the wound with infinite care.</i>
permeating	Spreading or spread throughout.

<u>pervasive</u>	(especially of an unwelcome influence or physical effect) spreading widely throughout an area or a group of people. <i>Ageism is pervasive and entrenched in our society.</i>
present everywhere	Being or existing in a specified place.
ubiquitous	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>His ubiquitous influence was felt by all the family.</i>
<u>universal</u>	Relating to or done by all people or things in the world or in a particular group; applicable to all cases. <i>The play opened to universal acclaim.</i>
<u>worldwide</u>	Of worldwide scope or applicability. <i>A worldwide epidemic.</i>

acceptation	A particular sense or the generally recognized meaning common acceptance of a word or phrase.
common	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <i>The common housefly.</i>
commonplace	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>Commonplace everyday activities.</i>
<u>comparatively</u>	To a moderate degree as compared to something else; relatively. <i>Inflation was comparatively low.</i>
current	In common or general use. <i>The raft floated downstream on the current.</i>
currently	At the present time. <i>Currently they live in Connecticut.</i>
distributive	A distributive word. <i>Transport and distributive industries.</i>
epoch	(astronomy) an arbitrarily fixed date that is the point in time relative to which information (as coordinates of a celestial body) is recorded. <i>The Pliocene epoch.</i>
everywhere	All places or directions. <i>You find fast food stores everywhere.</i>

<u>fashionable</u>	Popular and considered appealing or fashionable at the time. <i>They risked being scoffed at by their more fashionable friends.</i>
imbue	Fill soak or imbue totally. <i>His works are invariably imbued with a sense of calm and serenity.</i>
immanent	Of a mental act performed entirely within the mind. <i>A cognition is an immanent act of mind.</i>
<u>invasive</u>	Tending to spread very quickly and undesirably or harmfully. <i>The sound of the piano was invasive.</i>
normal	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Normal working hours.</i>
nowadays	In these times. <i>It is solely by their language that the upper classes nowadays are distinguished.</i>
<u>permeate</u>	Pass through. <i>His personality has begun to permeate through the whole organization.</i>
<u>pervade</u>	(especially of a smell) spread through and be perceived in every part of. <i>A smell of stale cabbage pervaded the air.</i>
<u>pervasive</u>	Spreading or spread throughout. <i>An error is pervasive if it is material to more than one conclusion.</i>
present	Formally present a debutante a representative of a country etc. <i>She did not expect to find herself in her present situation.</i>
<u>prevalent</u>	Widespread in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i>
realized	Successfully completed or brought to an end. <i>The joy of a realized ambition overcame him.</i>
<u>today</u>	On this day as distinct from yesterday or tomorrow. <i>Today we have computers.</i>
<u>typical</u>	Showing the characteristics expected of or popularly associated with a particular person or thing. <i>The typical car owner drives 10 000 miles a year.</i>
ubiquitous	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>Cowboy hats are ubiquitous among the male singers.</i>
ubiquity	The state of being everywhere at once (or seeming to be everywhere at once). <i>The growing ubiquity of advertising.</i>

- up-to-date** The present.
- whereabouts** The general location where something is.
***Whereabouts** do you come from.*
- widespread** Found or distributed over a large area or number of people.
*Drug use is **widespread**.*
