## Associations of "On the fly" (30 Words)

<b>aeronaut</b>	Someone who operates an aircraft.
<b>airman</b>	A pilot or member of the crew of an aircraft, especially in an air force.
<b>aviator</b>	A pair of aviator sunglasses. <i>I wear <b>aviators</b> but it's purely because they are practical sunglasses as opposed to being fashion accessories.</i>
<b>bee</b>	An insect of a large group to which the honeybee belongs including many solitary as well as social kinds. <i>A sewing <b>bee</b>.</i>
<b>bug</b>	General term for any insect or similar creeping or crawling invertebrate. <i>A thick green scum which crawls with <b>bugs</b> centipedes and worse.</i>
<b>butterfly</b>	Having a two lobed shape resembling the spread wings of a butterfly. <i>A social <b>butterfly</b>.</i>
<b><u>buzz</u></b>	The sound of a buzzer or telephone. <i>He <b>buzzed</b> the servant.</i>
<b>chirp</b>	A short, sharp, high-pitched sound. <i>Outside the crickets <b>chirped</b> monotonously.</i>
<b>cockroach</b>	Any of numerous chiefly nocturnal insects; some are domestic pests.
<b>croon</b>	Hum or sing in a soft, low voice, especially in a sentimental manner. <i>She was <b>crooning</b> to the child.</i>
<b>dragonfly</b>	Slender-bodied non-stinging insect having iridescent wings that are outspread at rest; adults and nymphs feed on mosquitoes etc.
<b><u>flap</u></b>	An act of flapping something typically a wing or arm up and down or from side to side. <i>He wrote on the <b>flap</b> of the envelope.</i>
<b>flea</b>	Any wingless bloodsucking parasitic insect noted for ability to leap.

<b>fledged</b>	(of a young bird) having wing feathers that are large enough for flight; able to fly. <i>A recently <b>fledged</b> bird.</i>
<b>grasshopper</b>	A cocktail made of creme de menthe and cream (sometimes with creme de cacao).
<b>housefly</b>	Common fly that frequents human habitations and spreads many diseases.
<b>hum</b>	A humming noise. <i>The refrigerator is <b>humming</b>.</i>
<b>hustle</b>	Obtain illicitly or by forceful action. <i>The <b>hustle</b> and bustle of the big cities.</i>
<b>levitate</b>	Be suspended in the air, as if in defiance of gravity. <i>The guru claimed that he could <b>levitate</b>.</i>
<b>mosquito</b>	Two-winged insect whose female has a long proboscis to pierce the skin and suck the blood of humans and animals.
<b>moth</b>	A clothes moth. <i>I store my sweaters in plastic bags to protect them from <b>moths</b>.</i>
<b>pilot</b>	Be the pilot of an aircraft or ship. <i>Many expected him to get the job as Desert Orchid s <b>pilot</b>.</i>
<b>pterodactyl</b>	Extinct flying reptile.
<b>pterosaur</b>	A fossil flying reptile of the Jurassic and Cretaceous periods, with membranous wings supported by a greatly lengthened fourth finger.
<b>twitter</b>	(of a bird) give a call consisting of repeated light tremulous sounds. <i>What a great crowd Perry <b>twittered</b>.</i>
<b>volant</b>	Relating to or characterized by flight. <i>Her sails caught a <b>volant</b> wind.</i>
<b>warble</b>	A lumpy abscess under the hide of domestic mammals caused by larvae of a botfly or warble fly. <i>He <b>warbled</b> in an implausible soprano.</i>
<b>wasp</b>	A solitary winged insect with a narrow waist mostly distantly related to the social wasps and including many parasitic kinds.
<b>wing</b>	The wing of a fowl. <i>Some sportsmen make no scruple about firing into the thick of a <b>wing</b> of plover.</i>
<b>winged</b>	Having one or more lateral parts, appendages, or projections. <i>On <b>winged</b> feet.</i>
