constant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. A constant lover.
continuing	Of long duration. The continuing struggle to put food on the table.
continuous	Continuing in time or space without interruption. Lived in continuous fear.
current	Occurring in or belonging to the present time. <i>Current psychoanalytic theories.</i>
developing	Relating to societies in which capital needed to industrialize is in short supply. <i>This is a rapidly developing field.</i>



endless	Having or seeming to have no end or limit. We smoked endless cigarettes.
<u>eternal</u>	Seeming to last or persist forever, especially on account of being tedious or annoying. To his eternal credit he maintained his dignity throughout.
everlasting	Lasting forever or a very long time. The damned would suffer everlasting torment.
existent	Being or occurring in fact or actuality; having verified existence; not illusory- Longfellow. <i>The technique has been existent for some years.</i>
existing	Presently existing. Depletion of the oxygen existing in the bloodstream.
<u>extant</u>	Still in existence; surviving. <i>Extant</i> manuscripts.
going on	In full operation.
growing	Relating to or suitable for growth. The growing concern over ozone levels.
happening	Fashionable; trendy. A happening neighbourhood.
in progress	Directed or bound inward.
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.
never-ending	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
on-going	Currently happening.
perpetual	(of an investment) having no fixed maturity date; irredeemable. A perpetual secretary of the society.
<u>relentless</u>	Harsh or inflexible. The relentless beat of the drums.
taking place	Very attractive; capturing interest.
<u>unbroken</u>	Not broken; whole and intact; in one piece. Unbroken land.
unceasing	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
under way	Lower in rank, power, or authority.
<u>unending</u>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. The charity rescues children from unending poverty.



<u>unfaltering</u>	Not faltering; steady; resolute. <i>Her unfaltering energy and determination.</i>
uninterrupted	Without a break in continuity. An uninterrupted flow of traffic.
<u>unremitting</u>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. Unremitting demands of hunger.

expedite	Make (an action or process) happen sooner or be accomplished more quickly. This should expedite the process.
<u>grinding</u>	A harsh and strident sound as of the grinding of gears. The grinding roar of the lorries.
improvement	A change for the better; progress in development. It s an improvement on the last cake I made.
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. The incessant beat of the music.
onwards	In a forward direction.
perpetuation	The act of prolonging something. Perpetuation of the species is our purpose.
<u>persist</u>	Be persistent refuse to stop. <i>He</i> persist ed to call me every night.
persistence	The continued or prolonged existence of something. <i>Cardiff s persistence</i> was rewarded with a try.
<u>proceed</u>	Do something after something else. He did not proceed to university in his seventeenth year.
process	An instance of a program being executed in a multitasking operating system typically running in an environment that protects it from other processes. <i>The ageing process.</i>
progress	Cause a task or undertaking to make progress. Great progress in the arts.
<u>progression</u>	The process of developing or moving gradually towards a more advanced state. A steady progression towards your goals.
prolongation	The consequence of being lengthened in duration. An examiner analysed the angle formed by the prolongation s of the lines.
sequel	A published, broadcast, or recorded work that continues the story or develops the theme of an earlier one. <i>This encouragement to grow potatoes had a disastrous</i> sequel <i>some fifty</i> <i>years later.</i>
<u>sequence</u>	Ascertain the sequence of amino acid or nucleotide residues in a protein DNA etc. <i>A gruelling sequence of exercises.</i>
step	Set up a mast in its step. <i>Step</i> back.



succession	The action or process of inheriting a title, office, property, etc. <i>The Cretaceous succession</i> .
<u>unabated</u>	Without any reduction in intensity or strength. <i>The storm was raging unabated</i> .
<u>unchecked</u>	Not restrained or controlled. An unchecked temper.
<u>undeterred</u>	Persevering with something despite setbacks. <i>He was undeterred by these disasters.</i>
