Definitions of "Opportune" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “opportune” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Suitable or at a time that is suitable or advantageous especially for a particular purpose.*
- *Done or occurring at a favourable time; well timed.*
- *(of a time) especially convenient or appropriate for a particular action or event.*



Synonyms of "Opportune" as an adjective (21 Words)

advantageous	Appropriate for achieving a particular end; implies a lack of concern for fairness. <i>Socially advantageous to entertain often.</i>
auspicious	Auguring favorable circumstances and good luck. <i>An auspicious beginning for the campaign.</i>
beneficial	Resulting in good; favourable or advantageous. <i>The beneficial effect on the economy.</i>
<u>benign</u>	Gentle and kindly. <i>The climate becomes more benign as we move nearer to the Black Sea.</i>
<u>bright</u>	Not made dim or less bright. <i>A bright young journalist.</i>
favourable	(of weather, or a period of time judged in terms of its weather) fine. <i>A favourable prognosis.</i>
felicitous	Exhibiting an agreeably appropriate manner or style. <i>A felicitous phrase.</i>
<u>fortunate</u>	Materially well off; prosperous. <i>It was fortunate that the weather was good.</i>
full of promise	Filled to satisfaction with food or drink.
<u>golden</u>	Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome. <i>A golden era.</i>

good	Promoting or enhancing well-being. <i>Now is the time to have a really good clear up.</i>
happy	Enjoying or showing or marked by joy or pleasure. <i>They tended to be grenade happy.</i>
heaven-sent	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention.
hopeful	Likely to turn out well in the future. <i>A line of people hopeful of obtaining tickets.</i>
lucky	Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome. <i>A lucky man.</i>
optimistic	(of an estimate) unrealistically high. <i>Took an optimistic view.</i>
promising	Showing possibility of achievement or excellence. <i>The scandal threatened an abrupt end to a promising political career.</i>
propitious	Favourably disposed towards someone. <i>Propitious omens.</i>
providential	Resulting from divine providence. <i>His appearance had seemed more than just providential.</i>
right	Socially right or correct. <i>Are you politically right left or centre.</i>
rosy	Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. <i>A rosy cheeked schoolgirl.</i>

appropriate	Devote (money or assets) to a special purpose. <i>A book not appropriate for children.</i>
appropriateness	The quality of being suitable or proper in the circumstances. <i>Some staff members question the appropriateness of this practice.</i>
<u>apropos</u>	Introducing a different topic. <i>The composer s reference to child s play is apropos.</i>
<u>apt</u>	Having a tendency to do something. <i>An apt reply.</i>
befitting	Appropriate to. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a befitting manner.</i>
chance	Be the case by chance. <i>There is a chance of winning the raffle.</i>
correct	Make right or correct. <i>Correct the alignment of the front wheels.</i>
<u>corrective</u>	A device for treating injury or disease. <i>Corrective lenses.</i>
felicitous	Marked by good fortune. <i>A felicitous life.</i>
germane	Relevant to a subject under consideration. <i>That is not germane to our theme.</i>
incidentally	Of a minor or subordinate nature. <i>These magnificent achievements were only incidentally influenced by Oriental models.</i>
<u>just</u>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>We were just finishing breakfast.</i>
licit	Not forbidden; lawful. <i>Usage patterns differ between licit and illicit drugs.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>A likely place for a restaurant.</i>
pertinence	Relevance by virtue of being applicable to the matter at hand.
pertinent	Being of striking appropriateness and pertinence. <i>Practitioners must consider all factors pertinent to a situation.</i>
<u>prone</u>	With a downward slope or direction. <i>Farmed fish are prone to disease.</i>
proper	Belonging to oneself or itself; own. <i>A very prim and proper Swiss lady.</i>

punctual	Denoting or relating to an action that takes place at a particular point in time. <i>He s the sort of man who s always punctual.</i>
relevance	The quality or state of being closely connected or appropriate. <i>The quantity quality and relevance of links count towards your rating.</i>
relevant	Having a bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>Critics may find themselves unable to stay relevant in a changing world.</i>
right	A right turn. <i>Hit him with quick rights to the body.</i>
rightness	Conformity with some esthetic standard of correctness or propriety. <i>They argue for the moral rightness of overthrowing the leader by force.</i>
ripe	(of a cheese or wine) fully matured. <i>The ripe age of 90.</i>
seasonable	Usual for or appropriate to a particular season of the year. <i>A seasonable time for discussion.</i>
timely	Before a time limit expires. <i>With timely treatment the patient has a good chance of recovery.</i>
