elected.

antagonism	The relation between opposing principles or forces or factors. <i>The inherent</i> <b>antagonism</b> of capitalism and socialism.
antagonists	Someone who offers opposition. When bending the elbow the triceps are the antagonist.
antipathy	A deep-seated feeling of aversion. His fundamental <b>antipathy</b> to capitalism.
<u>antithesis</u>	Exact opposite. Love is the <b>antithesis</b> of selfishness.
clash	A mismatch of colours. It is hoped that <b>clash</b> es of dates will be avoided.



competition	An event or contest in which people take part in order to establish superiority or supremacy in a particular area. <i>There is fierce competition between banks.</i>
competitors	The contestant you hope to defeat.
conflict	A disagreement or argument about something important. <i>The eternal</i> <b>conflict</b> <i>between the sexes.</i>
<u>confrontation</u>	A focussed comparison; bringing together for a careful comparison. <i>The race promised a classic</i> <b>confrontation</b> <i>between the two top runners in the world.</i>
contrast	Differences in colour, tone, or shape that contribute to the visual effect of a design or image. Match the trimming with one of the stronger colours in the pattern to provide <b>contrast</b> .
counteraction	Action intended to nullify the effects of some previous action.
criticism	The analysis and judgement of the merits and faults of a literary or artistic work. The senator received severe <b>criticism</b> from his opponent.
<u>defiance</u>	Intentionally contemptuous behavior or attitude. An act of <b>defiance</b> .
difference	A quantity by which amounts differ; the remainder left after subtraction of one value from another. <i>The difference</i> in her is amazing.
disparity	A great difference. <i>The arrangements could lead to</i> <b>disparity</b> of treatment between companies.
<u>dissent</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. There was no <b>dissent</b> from this view.
<u>enemies</u>	Any hostile group of people. <i>He viewed lawyers as the real enemy.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <b>Enemy</b> aircraft.
<u>enmity</u>	A state or feeling of active opposition or hostility. Decades of <b>enmity</b> between the two countries.
foe	An enemy or opponent. They had been political <b>foe</b> s for years.
foeman	An armed adversary (especially a member of an opposing military force.



<u>hostility</u>	The feeling of a hostile person. <i>He could no longer contain his <b>hostility</b>.</i>
<u>objection</u>	An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing. They have raised no <b>objection</b> s to the latest plans.
obstruction	The physical condition of blocking or filling a passage with an obstruction. <i>The filibuster was a major</i> <b>obstruction</b> <i>to the success of their plan.</i>
opponent	Someone who offers opposition. Against superior <b>opponent</b> s they fell two goals behind.
opponents	Someone who offers opposition.
opposers	Someone who offers opposition.
opposite	A contestant that you are matched against. We were <b>opposite</b> s in temperament.
oppositeness	The relation between opposed entities.
polarity	The relative orientation of poles; the direction of a magnetic or electric field. <i>He got the <b>polarity</b> of the battery reversed.</i>
resistance	The degree to which a substance or device opposes the passage of an electric current causing energy dissipation By Ohm s law resistance measured in ohms is equal to the voltage divided by the current. <i>These trees are widely planted because of their <b>resistance</b> to salt and smog.</i>
rivals	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>He had respect for his <b>rivals</b>.</i>

conflict	Be in conflict. Doctors often come into <b>conflict</b> with politicians.
conflicting	Incompatible or at variance; contradictory. There are <b>conflicting</b> accounts of what occurred.



<u>confrontation</u>	A hostile or argumentative situation or meeting between opposing parties. Four months of violent <b>confrontation</b> between government and opposition forces.
<u>contradictory</u>	A contradictory proposition. <i>Contradictory attributes of unjust justice and loving vindictiveness.</i>
<u>counterpart</u>	One of two copies of a legal document. The minister held talks with his French <b>counterpart</b> .
cracked	(of a person's voice) having an unusual harshness or pitch, especially through strain. <i>You must think my family are <b>cracked</b></i> .
<u>differ</u>	Be different. He <b>differ</b> ed from his contemporaries in ethical matters.
<u>disagree</u>	Disapprove of. Historians often <b>disagree</b> .
<u>disagreement</u>	The speech act of disagreeing or arguing or disputing. There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.
discomfit	Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed. <i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfit</b>ed by her tone.</i>
disconcert	Cause to lose one's composure. The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcert</b> ed her.
<u>discord</u>	(of people) disagree. We <b>discord</b> ed commonly on two points.
<u>discordant</u>	(of sounds) harsh and jarring because of a lack of harmony. Studies with data from <b>discordant</b> twins will be useful to confirm our findings.
discrepant	Not in agreement. Widely <b>discrepant</b> statements.
dissonant	Lacking harmony. Jackson employs both harmonious and <b>dissonant</b> colour choices.
<u>divisive</u>	Tending to cause disagreement or hostility between people. <i>The highly <b>divisive</b> issue of abortion.</i>
encounter	A hostile disagreement face-to-face. <i>He was shot dead in a police <b>encounter</b>.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <i>He viewed lawyers as the real <b>enemy</b>.</i>
factious	Relating or inclined to dissension. A <b>factious</b> country.



(of equipment, computer programs, etc.) not capable of being used in combination. <i>Incompatible colors.</i>
An inconsistent aspect or element. The <b>inconsistency</b> between his expressed attitudes and his actual behaviour.
Not forming or contributing to a pleasing whole; discordant. An <b>inharmonious</b> or incongruous mixture of architectural styles.
Unfavorable to life or growth. They are extremely <b>inhospitable</b> these days.
A person who dissents from some established policy. <i>Objector</i> s to the housing plans.
Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>Opponent</i> or opposing armies.
Be resistant to. A majority of the electorate <b>oppose</b> d EC membership.
A figure of speech in which apparently contradictory terms appear in conjunction (e.g. faith unfaithful kept him falsely true).
Be the rival of be in competition with. Nothing can <b>rival</b> cotton for durability.
Not encouraging or approving or pleasing. <i>Unfavorable</i> conditions.
Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.
