<b>enslaved</b>	Make a slave of; bring into servitude.
<b>exploited</b>	Draw from; make good use of.
<b>get down</b>	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).
<b>hang over</b>	Hold on tightly or tenaciously.
<b>hegemonize</b>	Subject (a population, region, process, etc.) to a dominant political or social power. <i>Colonialism sought to <b>hegemonize</b> through a process of acculturation.</i>
<b>ill-treat</b>	Treat badly.
<b>lie heavy on</b>	Be and remain in a particular state or condition.
<b>make desolate</b>	Gather and light the materials for.
<b>make despondent</b>	Amount to.
<b>make gloomy</b>	Proceed along a path.
<b>maltreat</b>	Treat badly. <i>Children die from neglect or are <b>maltreated</b> by their carers.</i>
<b>maltreated</b>	Treat badly.
<b>misused</b>	Apply to a wrong thing or person; apply badly or incorrectly.

<b>persecute</b>	Cause to suffer. <i>Hilda was <b>persecuted</b> by some of the other girls.</i>

<b>repress</b>	Suppress (a thought or desire) so that it becomes or remains unconscious. <i>The process of <b>repressing</b> gene transcription.</i>

<b>subdue</b>	Bring under control by force or authority. <i><b>Subdue</b> one's appetites.</i>

<b><u>subjugate</u></b>	Bring under domination or control, especially by conquest. <i>The rich landowners <b>subjugated</b> the peasants working the land.</i>
<b>subjugated</b>	Make subservient; force to submit or subdue.
<b><u>suppress</u></b>	Control and refrain from showing; of emotions, desires, impulses, or behavior. <i>Use of the drug <b>suppressed</b> the immune response.</i>

<b>encumber</b>	Hold back. <i>She was <b>encumbered</b> by her heavy skirts.</i>
<u>harass</u>	Subject to aggressive pressure or intimidation. <i>Being <b>harassed</b> at work can leave you feeling confused and helpless.</i>
<b>irritate</b>	Make (someone) annoyed or a little angry. <i><b>Irritate</b> the glands of a leaf.</i>
<u>mistreat</u>	Treat (a person or animal) badly, cruelly, or unfairly. <i>He denied <b>mistreating</b> his workers.</i>

<b>persecute</b>	Subject (someone) to hostility and ill-treatment, especially because of their ethnicity, religion, or sexual orientation or their political beliefs. <i>Some religious groups are <b>persecuted</b> in some countries.</i>
<b>predominance</b>	The state of being predominant over others. <i>Hollywood s continued <b>predominance</b> in the international film market.</i>
<b>repress</b>	Impede or hinder the natural development or self-expression of. <i>Isabel couldn t <b>repress</b> a sharp cry of fear.</i>
<b>restrain</b>	Deprive (someone) of freedom of movement or personal liberty. <i>All front seats must be equipped with seat belts which <b>restrain</b> the upper part of the body.</i>

<b>ruthlessly</b>	Without pity or compassion for others. <i>They fell prey to money lenders who <b>ruthlessly</b> exploited them.</i>
<u>smother</u>	Make (someone) feel trapped and oppressed by acting in an overly protective manner towards them. <i><b>Smother</b> fires.</i>
<u>stifle</u>	Be asphyxiated; die from lack of oxygen. <i>She <b>stifled</b> a giggle.</i>

<b>subdue</b>	Bring under control by force or authority. <i>She managed to <b>subdue</b> an instinct to applaud.</i>
<b>subjugate</b>	Put down by force or intimidation. <i>The rich landowners <b>subjugated</b> the peasants working the land.</i>
<b>suffocate</b>	Deprive of oxygen and prevent from breathing. <i>The child <b>suffocated</b> herself with a plastic bag that the parents had left on the floor.</i>
<b>suppress</b>	Bring under control by force or authority. <i><b>Suppress</b> a nascent uprising.</i>
<b>suppression</b>	The conscious inhibition of unacceptable memories, impulses, or desires. <i>The heavy handed <b>suppression</b> of political dissent.</i>
<b>tyrannize</b>	Rule a country as a tyrant. <i>She <b>tyrannized</b> her family.</i>
<b>vex</b>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>A <b>vexing</b> problem.</i>
