Definitions of "Oppression" as a noun

- *A feeling of being oppressed.*
- *The act of subjugating by cruelty.*
- *Mental pressure or distress.*
- *Prolonged cruel or unjust treatment or exercise of authority.*
- *The state of being subject to oppressive treatment.*
- *The state of being kept down by unjust use of force or authority.*



Synonyms of "Oppression" as a noun (13 Words)

abuse	Violent treatment involving sexual assault, especially on a regular basis. <i>Waving his fists and hurling abuse at the driver.</i>
despotism	A country or political system where the ruler holds absolute power. <i>Some nations are democracies others are despotisms.</i>
enslavement	The state of being a slave. <i>The enslavement of millions of Africans.</i>
exploitation	An act that exploits or victimizes someone (treats them unfairly). <i>The exploitation of migrant workers.</i>
ill treatment	An often persistent bodily disorder or disease; a cause for complaining.
maltreatment	Cruel or violent treatment of a person or animal; mistreatment. <i>16 per cent of children experience serious maltreatment at the hands of their parents.</i>
oppressiveness	Unwelcome burdensome difficulty.

- persecution** The act of persecuting (especially on the basis of race or religion).
*His **persecution** at the hands of other students.*
- repression The classical defense mechanism that protects you from impulses or ideas that would cause anxiety by preventing them from becoming conscious.
*Children and adults pay a heavy price for their deep **repression** of thoughts about death.*
- subjection** The action of subjecting a country or person to one's control, or the fact of being subjected.
*The country's **subjection** to European colonialism.*
- subjugation Forced submission to control by others.
*The colonial **subjugation** of a country by means of brute military force.*
- suppression** Prevention of electrical interference.
*The **suppression** of heresy.*
- tyranny A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc).
*The **tyranny** of her stepmother.*



Usage Examples of "Oppression" as a noun

- *A region shattered by oppression and killing.*
- *The tyrant's oppression of the people.*
- *A response to collective poverty and oppression.*
- *After years of oppression they finally revolted.*
- *Beatrice's mood had initially been alarm and a sense of oppression.*

- autocracy** Domineering rule or control.
*A boss who shifts between **autocracy** and consultation.*
- autocratic** Characteristic of an absolute ruler or absolute rule; having absolute sovereignty.
*An **autocratic** person.*
- barbarism** Extreme cruelty or brutality.
*She called the execution an act of **barbarism**.*

<u>cruelty</u>	The quality of being cruel and causing tension or annoyance. <i>She divorced my stepfather for persistent cruelty.</i>
despot	A ruler or other person who holds absolute power, typically one who exercises it in a cruel or oppressive way.
despotism	A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc. <i>Some nations are democracies others are despotisms.</i>
dictatorship	A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc. <i>The effects of forty years of dictatorship.</i>
dominate	Be the most important or conspicuous person or thing in. <i>The villa dominates the town.</i>
fascism	A political theory advocating an authoritarian hierarchical government (as opposed to democracy or liberalism. <i>This is yet another example of health fascism in action.</i>
fascist	An adherent of fascism or other authoritarian views. <i>He went to Spain to fight against the fascists.</i>
<u>ferocity</u>	The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>She hated him with a ferocity that astonished her.</i>
hardship	Something that causes or entails suffering- James Boswell. <i>A life of hardship.</i>
heretical	Holding an opinion at odds with what is generally accepted. <i>Heretical beliefs.</i>
inhumanity	The quality of lacking compassion or consideration for others. <i>Man s inhumanity to man.</i>
insensate	Completely lacking sense or reason. <i>A patient who was permanently unconscious and insensate.</i>
monocracy	A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc.
<u>monopolize</u>	Get or keep exclusively to oneself. <i>Sophie monopolized the guest of honour for most of the evening.</i>
persecution	The act of persecuting (especially on the basis of race or religion. <i>Her family fled religious persecution.</i>
perversity	A deliberate desire to behave in an unreasonable or unacceptable way; contrariness. <i>The perversity of being able to carry a gun but not purchase a drink.</i>

proletarian	A member of the proletariat. A proletarian ideology.
repression	(psychiatry) the classical defense mechanism that protects you from impulses or ideas that would cause anxiety by preventing them from becoming conscious. <i>His goal was the repression of insolence.</i>
ruthlessness	Mercilessness characterized by a lack of pity. <i>The real world ruthlessness of business.</i>
savagery	The quality of being fierce or cruel. <i>A crime of the utmost savagery.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>His disregard for the sufferings of his fellow countrymen.</i>
suppress	Prevent or inhibit (a process or reaction). Suppress a smile.
suppression	The absence or non-development of a part or organ that is normally present. <i>The heavy handed suppression of political dissent.</i>
theocracy	The commonwealth of Israel from the time of Moses until the election of Saul as king. <i>His ambition is to lead a worldwide theocracy.</i>
tyrannize	Rule a country as a tyrant. <i>He tyrannizes over the servants.</i>
tyranny	A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc). <i>Refugees fleeing tyranny and oppression.</i>
