airless	Without wind or breeze; still. <i>A dusty airless attic.</i>
autocratic	Relating to a ruler who has absolute power. <i>The constitutional reforms threatened his autocratic power.</i>
brutal	Harsh. <i>The brutal honesty of his observations.</i>
burdensome	Difficult to carry out or fulfil; taxing. <i>The burdensome task of preparing the income tax return.</i>
close	Close in relevance or relationship. <i>It was very close in the dressing room.</i>

cruel	(of persons or their actions) able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>Cruel tortures.</i>
crushing	Physically or spiritually devastating; often used in combination. <i>A crushing blow.</i>
despotic	Ruled by or characteristic of a despot. <i>Moved from a feudal to a despotic order.</i>
dictatorial	Of or characteristic of a dictator. <i>A dictatorial rule that lasted for the duration of the war.</i>
domineering	Tending to domineer. <i>How can I do my job with a domineering boss yelling in my ear.</i>
draconian	Of or relating to Draco or his harsh code of laws. <i>The Nazis destroyed the independence of the press by a series of draconian laws.</i>
fuggy	(of a room or atmosphere) warm, stuffy, or smoky. <i>A fuggy pub.</i>
hard to bear	Unfortunate or hard to bear.
harsh	Disagreeable to the senses. <i>The harsh realities of the world news.</i>
heavy	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i>A heavy truck.</i>
hot	Used of physical heat; having a high or higher than desirable temperature or giving off heat or feeling or causing a sensation of heat or burning. <i>The dice are hot tonight.</i>
humid	Marked by a relatively high level of water vapour in the atmosphere. <i>Humid weather.</i>
intolerable	Incapable of being put up with. <i>The intolerable pressures of his work.</i>
muggy	Hot or warm and humid. <i>It was a hot very muggy evening.</i>
overpowering	So strong as to be irresistible. <i>A feeling of overpowering sadness.</i>
overwhelming	(especially of an emotion) very strong. <i>She felt an overwhelming desire to giggle.</i>
punitive	Inflicting or intended as punishment. <i>He called for punitive measures against the Eastern bloc.</i>

repressive	Inhibiting or preventing the expression or awareness of thoughts or desires. <i>A repressive regime.</i>
soupy	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>Soupy nostalgia.</i>
steamy	Hot or warm and humid. <i>Steamy towels.</i>
<u>sticky</u>	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>A sticky thread is now live on the forum.</i>
<u>stifling</u>	Making one feel constrained or oppressed. <i>Stifling heat.</i>
stuffy	Excessively conventional and unimaginative and hence dull. <i>A stuffy overcrowded office.</i>
<u>suffocating</u>	Causing difficulty in breathing especially through lack of fresh air and presence of heat. <i>Some marriages can at times feel suffocating.</i>
sultry	Characterized by oppressive heat and humidity. <i>The sultry late summer weather had brought swarms of insects.</i>
torrid	Extremely hot and dry. <i>The torrid heat of the noonday sun.</i>
<u>tyrannical</u>	Marked by unjust severity or arbitrary behavior. <i>A momentary quieting of her tyrannical appetite.</i>
tyrannous	(of a government or ruler) exercising power in a cruel or arbitrary way. <i>They would welcome liberation from their tyrannous oppressor.</i>
<u>unbearable</u>	Not able to be endured or tolerated. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
<u>undemocratic</u>	Not in agreement with or according to democratic doctrine or practice or ideals. <i>The union broke with its past undemocratic procedures.</i>
unendurable	Incapable of being put up with. <i>Cries of unendurable suffering.</i>

- autocratic** Taking no account of other people's wishes or opinions; domineering.

- bullying** The act of intimidating a weaker person to make them do something.
- cavalier** A royalist supporter of Charles I during the English Civil War.
*Anne was irritated by his **cavalier** attitude.*
- coercive** Relating to or using force or threats.
*Authority is directional instead of **coercive**.*

commanding	(in military contexts) having a position of authority. <i>A commanding view of the ocean.</i>
despotic	Of or typical of a despot; tyrannical. <i>Despotic rulers.</i>
despotism	The exercise of absolute power, especially in a cruel and oppressive way. <i>Some nations are democracies others are despotisms.</i>
dictator	(in ancient Rome) a chief magistrate with absolute power, appointed in an emergency. <i>My boss is a dictator who makes everyone work overtime.</i>
dictatorial	Of or typical of a ruler with total power. <i>A dictatorial rule that lasted for the duration of the war.</i>
dictatorship	Absolute authority in any sphere. <i>The effects of forty years of dictatorship.</i>
dominant	Denoting the predominant species in a plant or animal community. <i>The dominant partner in the marriage.</i>
domineering	Tending to domineer. <i>How can I do my job with a domineering boss yelling in my ear.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>Stocks are still firm.</i>
forceful	Forceful and definite in expression or action. <i>Forceful measures.</i>
haughty	Arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>A haughty British aristocrat.</i>
imperative	The imperative mood. <i>As nuclear weapons proliferate preventing war becomes imperative.</i>
imperious	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His imperious demands.</i>
magisterial	Used of a person's appearance or behavior; befitting an eminent person. <i>He dropped his somewhat magisterial style of questioning.</i>
misrule	The disruption of peace; disorder. <i>A country that is recovering from decades of misrule.</i>
monocracy	A system of government by one person only.
overbearing	Expecting unquestioning obedience. <i>Insufferably overbearing behavior toward the waiter.</i>

- peremptory** Insisting on immediate attention or obedience, especially in a brusquely imperious way.
Peremptory commands.
- powerful** Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful.
A powerful bomb.
- regime** A coordinated programme for the promotion or restoration of health a regimen.
A low calorie low fat regime.
- sovereign** A former British gold coin worth one pound sterling, now only minted for commemorative purposes.
A sovereign state.
- tyrannical** Characteristic of tyranny; oppressive and controlling.
A tyrannical parent.
- vigorous** Characterized by or involving physical strength, effort, or energy.
A vigorous old man who spent half of his day on horseback.
