<b><u>cycle</u></b>	The period of time taken to complete a cycle of events. <i>The recurrent <b>cycle</b> of harvest failure food shortages and price increases.</i>
<b>department</b>	A division of a large organization such as a government, university, or business, dealing with a specific area of activity. <i>You ll find it in the hardware <b>department</b>.</i>
<b>domain</b>	(mathematics) the set of values of the independent variable for which a function is defined. <i>The French <b>domains</b> of the Plantagenets.</i>
<b>electron orbit</b>	An elementary particle with negative charge.
<b>eye socket</b>	Attention to what is seen.
<b><u>field</u></b>	A fielder. <i>Fifty white stars on a blue <b>field</b>.</i>
<b>jurisdiction</b>	The territory or sphere of activity over which the legal authority of a court or other institution extends. <i>The claim will be within the <b>jurisdiction</b> of the industrial tribunal.</i>
<b>lap</b>	The part of an item of clothing especially a skirt or dress covering the lap. <i>She stood up and brushed the crumbs from the <b>lap</b> of her dress.</i>
<b><u>loop</u></b>	An intrauterine device in the shape of a loop. <i>Make a <b>loop</b> in the twine.</i>

<b>orbital cavity</b>	Soft decayed area in a tooth; progressive decay can lead to the death of a tooth.
<b>path</b>	A schedule available for allocation to an individual railway train over a given route. <i>Our <b>paths</b> in life led us apart.</i>
<u>preserve</u>	A foodstuff made with fruit preserved in sugar such as jam or marmalade. <i>Home made <b>preserves</b>.</i>
<u>province</u>	Northern Ireland. <i>It was his <b>province</b> to take care of himself.</i>
<b>range</b>	The set of values that a given function can take as its argument varies. <i>The vans have a <b>range</b> of 125 miles.</i>
<b>reach</b>	The act of physically reaching or thrusting out. <i>The upper <b>reaches</b> of the Nile.</i>
<u>realm</u>	A field or domain of activity or interest. <i>The rise of the <b>realm</b> of cotton in the south.</i>
<u>remit</u>	The act of remitting especially the referral of a law case to another court. <i>A <b>remit</b> on the question failed.</i>
<b>revolution</b>	A drastic and far-reaching change in ways of thinking and behaving. <i>One <b>revolution</b> a second.</i>
<b>rotation</b>	A single complete turn (axial or orbital). <i>Crop <b>rotation</b> makes a balanced demand on the fertility of the soil.</i>
<u>round</u>	A cut of beef between the rump and the lower leg. <i>The doctor made his <b>rounds</b>.</i>

*Don't go committing murders on my **territory**.*

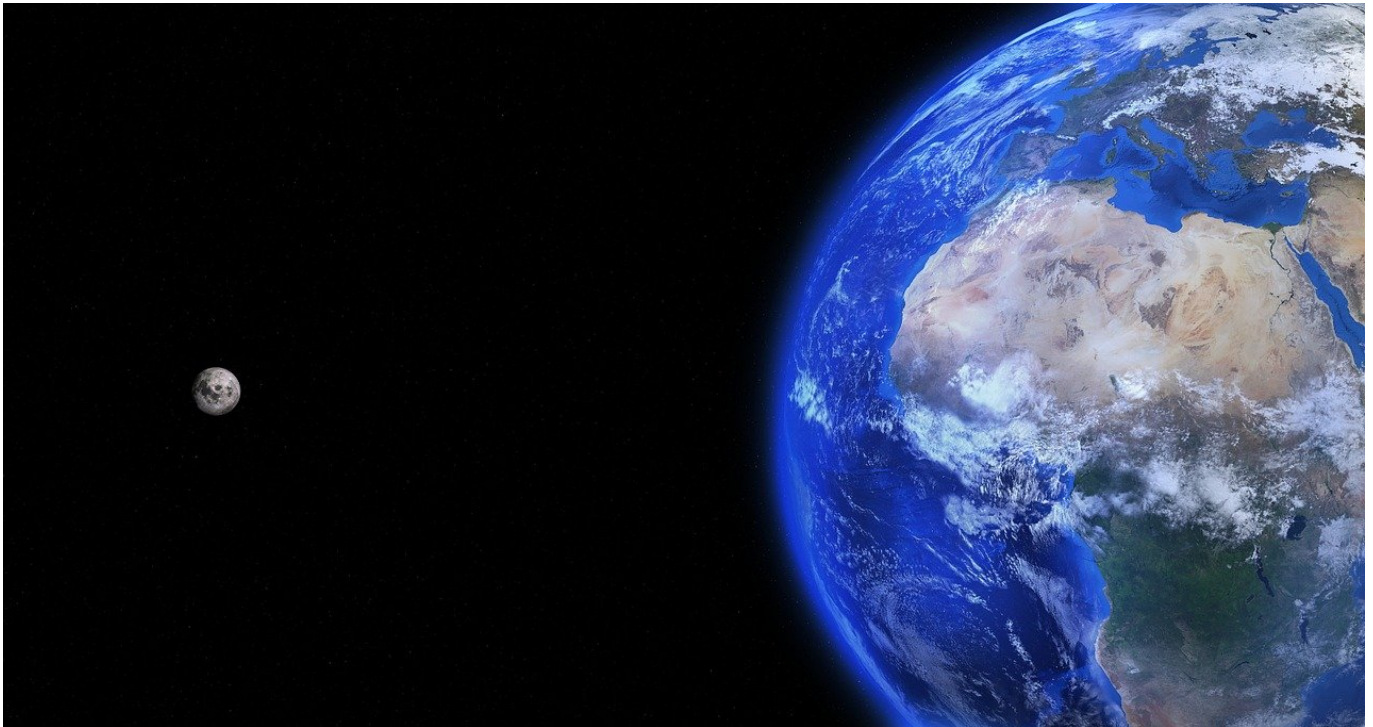
**tour** A journey for pleasure in which several different places are visited.

**track** The soundtrack of a film or video.

**trajectory** The path followed by a projectile flying or an object moving under the action of given forces.  
*The rapid upward **trajectory** of Rich's career.*

**turf** A piece of turf cut from the ground.  
*A bureaucracy chiefly concerned with **turf** and protecting the retirement system.*

**turn** A place where a road meets or branches off another a turning.  
*The **turn** of the tide.*

<a href="#">compass</a>	An instrument for drawing circles and arcs and measuring distances between points, consisting of two arms linked by a movable joint, one arm ending in a point and the other usually carrying a pencil or pen. <i>Walkers should be equipped with a map and <b>compass</b>.</i>
<b>diameter</b>	The length of a straight line passing through the center of a circle and connecting two points on the circumference.
<b>earth</b>	Cover the root and lower stem of a plant with heaped up earth. <i><b>Earth</b> the circuit.</i>
<b>epicycle</b>	An epicycle used to describe planetary orbits in the Ptolemaic system.
<a href="#">extraterrestrial</a>	Of or from outside the earth or its atmosphere. <i>Searches for <b>extraterrestrial</b> intelligence.</i>
<b>globular</b>	Globe-shaped; spherical. <i>Plants with distinctive <b>globular</b> blooms.</i>
<b>hemisphere</b>	Each of the two parts of the cerebrum (left and right) in the brain of a vertebrate. <i>The left <b>hemisphere</b> plays a dominant role in the comprehension of language.</i>
<b>interstellar</b>	Between or among stars. <i><b>Interstellar</b> travel.</i>
<b>jupiter</b>	Supreme god of Romans; counterpart of Greek Zeus.
<b>latitude</b>	The range of exposures for which an emulsion or printing paper will give acceptable contrast. <i>Temperate <b>latitudes</b>.</i>
<b>lunar</b>	Of, determined by, or resembling the moon. <i>A <b>lunar</b> eclipse.</i>
<b>mars</b>	(Roman mythology) Roman god of war and agriculture; father of Romulus and Remus; counterpart of Greek Ares.
<a href="#">planet</a>	Astronomy any of the nine large celestial bodies in the solar system that revolve around the sun and shine by reflected light Mercury Venus Earth Mars Jupiter Saturn Uranus Neptune and Pluto in order of their proximity to the sun viewed from the constellation Hercules all the planets rotate around the sun in a counterclockwise direction. <i>The <b>planets</b> are presently influencing you in a positive way.</i>
<b>pluto</b>	A small planet and the farthest known planet from the sun; it has the most elliptical orbit of all the planets.
<b>precession</b>	The act of preceding in time or order or rank (as in a ceremony).
<b>range</b>	Have a range be capable of projecting over a certain distance as of a gun. <i>Tribes who <b>ranged</b> the windswept lands of the steppe.</i>

<b>rotation</b>	The passing of a privilege or responsibility to each member of a group in a regularly recurring order. <i>The plane made three <b>rotations</b> before it crashed.</i>
<b>satellite</b>	Transmitted by satellite using or relating to satellite technology. <i><b>Satellite</b> offices in London and New York.</i>
<b>saturn</b>	A giant planet that is surrounded by three planar concentric rings of ice particles; the 6th planet from the sun.
<b>spacecraft</b>	A vehicle used for travelling in space.
<b><u>universe</u></b>	All existing matter and space considered as a whole the cosmos The universe is believed to be at least 10 billion light years in diameter and contains a vast number of galaxies it has been expanding since its creation in the Big Bang about 13 billion years ago. <i>They study the evolution of the <b>universe</b>.</i>
<b>uranus</b>	God of the heavens; son and husband of Gaea and father of the Titans in ancient mythology.
<b>venus</b>	The second nearest planet to the sun; it is peculiar in that its rotation is slow and retrograde (in the opposite sense of the Earth and all other planets except Uranus); it is visible from Earth as an early 'morning star' or an 'evenin.
<b>world</b>	All of the people and societies on the earth. <i>The ancient <b>world</b>.</i>
