- *A person or place on which a character or location in a literary work is based.*
- *The language in which something was first written.*
- *The earliest form of something, from which copies may be made.*
- *A garment made to order from a design specially prepared for a fashion collection.*
- *Something that serves as a model or a basis for making copies.*
- *An eccentric or unusual person.*
- *An original creation (i.e., an audio recording) from which copies can be made.*



Synonyms of "Original" as a noun (18 Words)

archetype

A very typical example of a certain person or thing.
*An instrument which was the **archetype** of the early flute.*

bohemian

A member of a people with dark skin and hair who speak Romany and who traditionally live by seasonal work and fortunetelling; they are believed to have originated in northern India but now are living on all continents (but mostly in Eur.

*Warhol and the artists and **bohemians** he worked with in the 1960s.*

eccentric

A disc or wheel mounted eccentrically on a revolving shaft in order to transform rotation into backward and forward motion e g a cam in an internal combustion engine.

*A friendly **eccentric**.*

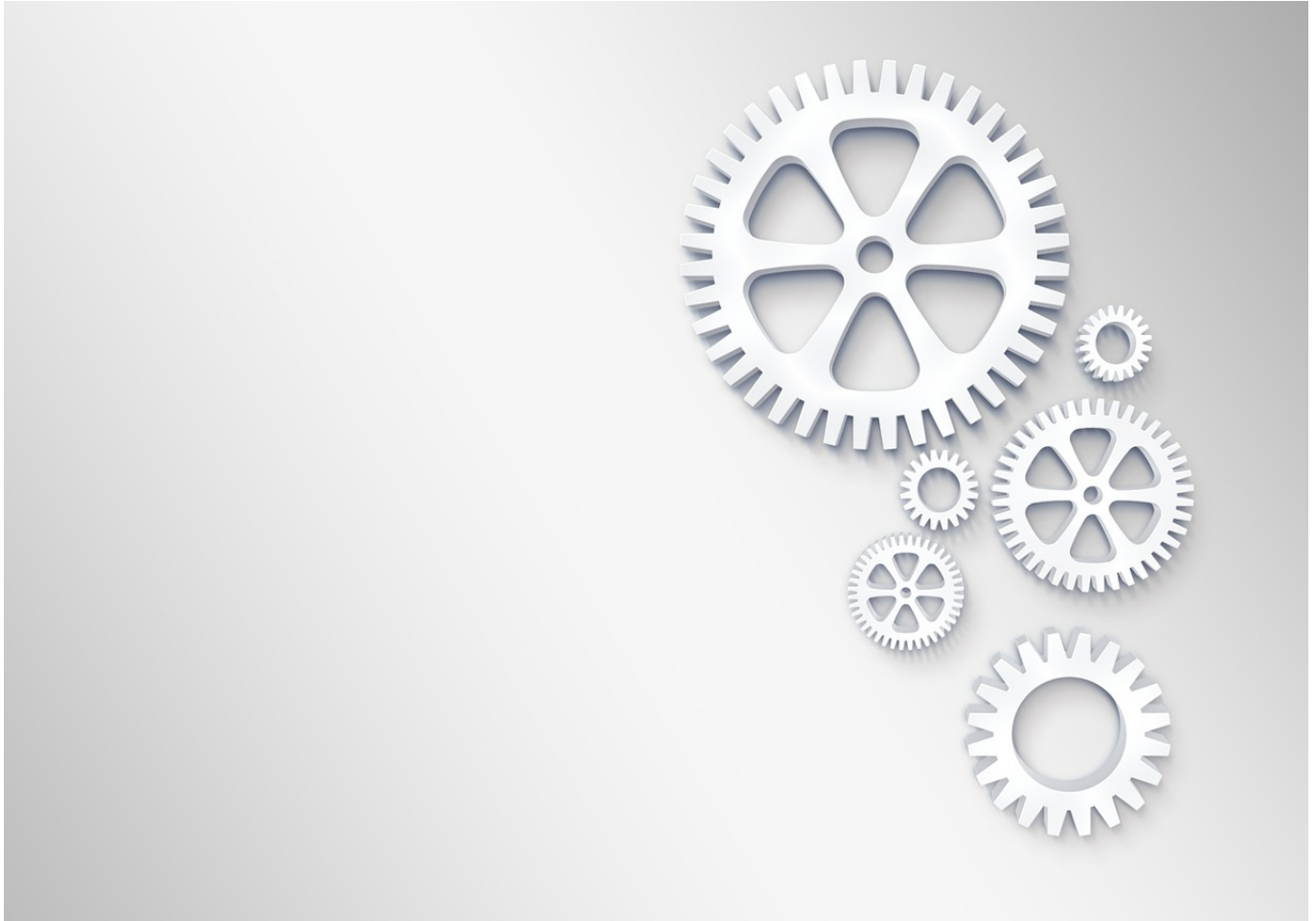
free spirit

A person of a specified kind.
*Boat trips for parties and **individuals**.*

individualist	A person who is independent and self-reliant. <i>Radical individualists committed to quality of life.</i>
master	Someone who holds a master s degree from academic institution. <i>He was master of the situation.</i>
master copy	Presiding officer of a school.
maverick	An unbranded range animal (especially a stray calf); belongs to the first person who puts a brand on it. <i>He s the maverick of the senate.</i>
model	A person who poses for a photographer or painter or sculptor. <i>Strikes have dogged the production of the models.</i>
nonconformist	A Protestant in England who is not a member of the Church of England. <i>She was a nonconformist an individualist.</i>
oddity	A strange attitude or habit. <i>She was regarded as a bit of an oddity.</i>
<u>paradigm</u>	The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>The discovery of universal gravitation became the paradigm of successful science.</i>
pattern	Graphical representation (in polar or Cartesian coordinates) of the spatial distribution of radiation from an antenna as a function of angle. <i>The school is located a few kilometers away and is run on the pattern of other army schools.</i>
<u>pilot</u>	An inclined metal frame at the front of a locomotive to clear the track. <i>A strike by local airline pilots.</i>
prototype	A standard or typical example. <i>The construction of bandpass networks from low pass prototypes.</i>
source	Anything (a person or animal or plant or substance) in which an infectious agent normally lives and multiplies. <i>Pittsburgh is the source of the Ohio River.</i>
standard	A required or agreed level of quality or attainment. <i>They live by the standards of their community.</i>

Definitions of "Original" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "original" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Created personally by a particular artist, writer, musician, etc.; not a copy.*
- *Preceding all others in time or being as first made or performed.*
- *Being or productive of something fresh and unusual; or being as first made or thought of.*
- *Not derived or copied or translated from something else.*
- *Present or existing from the beginning; first or earliest.*
- *Not secondhand or by way of something intermediary.*
- *Not dependent on other people's ideas; inventive or novel.*
- *(of e.g. information) not secondhand or by way of something intermediary.*

earliest	Very young. <i>Verdi s earliest and most raucous opera.</i>
first	Ranking above all others. <i>The first meetings of the new party.</i>
<u>genuine</u>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. Genuine leather.
<u>imaginative</u>	(used of persons or artifacts) marked by independence and creativity in thought or action. <i>An imaginative use of material.</i>
<u>indigenous</u>	Originating or occurring naturally in a particular place; native. <i>The Ainu are indigenous to the northernmost islands of Japan.</i>
ingenious	(of a machine or idea) cleverly and originally devised and well suited to its purpose. <i>He was ingenious enough to overcome the limited budget.</i>
innovational	Being or producing something like nothing done or experienced or created before. <i>A mind so innovational so original.</i>
innovative	Being or producing something like nothing done or experienced or created before. <i>Is British industry innovative enough.</i>
<u>inventive</u>	Having the ability to create or design new things or to think originally. Inventive ceramics.
master	Most important element. <i>You don t have to be a master chef in order to cook meat properly.</i>
<u>native</u>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e g native bee. <i>Some last vestige of native wit prompted Guy to say nothing.</i>
prototypical	Denoting the first, original, or typical form of something. <i>The phone emerged as the prototypical example of point to point communication.</i>
real	Coinciding with reality. <i>The tour turned out to be a real disaster.</i>
true	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>The true meaning of the statement.</i>
<u>veritable</u>	Not counterfeit or copied. <i>He s a veritable swine.</i>

The background or origins of a person or organization.

*It was a dark and stormy night is a hackneyed **beginning** for a story.*

creative

A person whose job involves creative work.

*Change unleashes people s **creative** energy.*

creatively

In a creative manner.

*This article inspires you to think **creatively**.*

disinclination

That toward which you are inclined to feel dislike.

*Lucy felt a strong **disinclination** to talk about her engagement.*

epitome

A summary of a written work; an abstract.

*She looked the **epitome** of elegance and good taste.*

example	A person or thing regarded in terms of their fitness to be imitated. <i>But there is always the famous example of the Smiths.</i>
<u>exemplar</u>	Something to be imitated. <i>The place is an exemplar of multicultural Britain.</i>
first	The fielding position of the player on a baseball team who is stationed at first of the bases in the infield counting counterclockwise from home plate. <i>The first of the month.</i>
germinal	Providing material for future development. <i>A germinal idea.</i>
<u>groundbreaking</u>	Being or producing something like nothing done or experienced or created before. <i>Groundbreaking research into fertility problems.</i>
<u>imaginative</u>	Marked by independence and creativity in thought or action- Lewis Mumford. <i>Making imaginative use of computer software.</i>
<u>inception</u>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its inception two years ago.</i>
<u>incipient</u>	Beginning to happen or develop. <i>We seemed more like friends than incipient lovers.</i>
ingenious	Showing inventiveness and skill. <i>He was ingenious enough to overcome the limited budget.</i>
initial	Mark or sign a document with one's initials in order to authorize or validate it. <i>Greece and the United States initialled a new defence cooperation agreement.</i>
initially	At the beginning. <i>Initially he thought the new concept was nonsense.</i>
innovative	(of a person) introducing new ideas; original and creative in thinking. <i>Stylistically innovative works.</i>
<u>instance</u>	An item of information that is typical of a class or group. <i>Another instance occurred yesterday.</i>
<u>invention</u>	Something, typically a process or device, that has been invented. <i>You know my story is an invention.</i>
<u>inventive</u>	Showing creativity or original thought. <i>A courageous and inventive piece of film making.</i>
manuscript	The form of a literary work submitted for publication. <i>Several manuscripts in his own hand.</i>

mythological	Relating to, based on, or appearing in myths or mythology. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all mythological symbols.</i>
paradigm	The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>English determiners form a paradigm we can say a book or his book but not a his book.</i>
precursory	Warning of future misfortune. <i>Precursory seismic activity.</i>
prototype	Make a prototype of a product. <i>These objects are the prototypes of a category of rapidly spinning neutron stars.</i>
quintessence	The most typical example or representative of a type. <i>We were all brought up to believe that advertising is the quintessence of marketing.</i>
quintessential	Representing the perfect example of a class or quality. <i>He was the quintessential tough guy strong silent and self contained.</i>
root	Cause a plant or cutting to grow roots. <i>This plant roots quickly.</i>
unabridged	Not shortened. <i>An unabridged novel.</i>
