**insistence** Continual and persistent demands.

**Insistence** on grammatical correctness is a conservative position.

Insisting on or demanding something; not allowing refusal.

Tony s soft **insistent** questioning.

intransigence Refusal to change one's views or to agree about something.

*In the face of government intransigence* he resigned in disgust.

. . An intransigent person.

intransigent Her father had tried persuasion but she was intransigent.

Characterized by anger.

irascible An irascible and difficult man.

**obduracy** Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.

obdurate Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing.

The child s misery would move even the most **obdurate** heart.



**obstinacy** The quality or condition of being obstinate; stubbornness.

His reputation for **obstinacy**.

**obstinate** Stubbornly persistent in wrongdoing.

The **obstinate** problem of unemployment.

**opinionated** Obstinate in your opinions.

An arrogant and **opinionated** man.

**persistence** The property of a continuous and connected period of time.

Cardiff s **persistence** was rewarded with a try.

persistent Continually recurring to the mind- Claudia Cassidy.

**Persistent** leaves remain attached past maturity.

pertinacious Stubbornly unyielding.

The most vocal and **pertinacious** of all the critics.

**pertinacity** Persistent determination.

**pigheaded** Obstinate and stupid.

**querulous** Complaining in a rather petulant or whining manner.

She became **querulous** and demanding.

**recalcitrance** The trait of being unmanageable.

recalcitrant Stubbornly resistant to authority or control.
