**purportedly**Believed or reputed to be the case.

A purportedly independent arbitrator.

**seemingly**According to the facts as one knows them; as far as one knows.

The child is **seemingly** healthy but the doctor is concerned.

superficially At or on the surface or skin.

**Superficially** they have little in common.

According to what is generally assumed or believed (often used to

indicate that the speaker doubts the truth of the statement.

There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues

**supposedly** because they were jealous of his relationship with the

Duchess.
