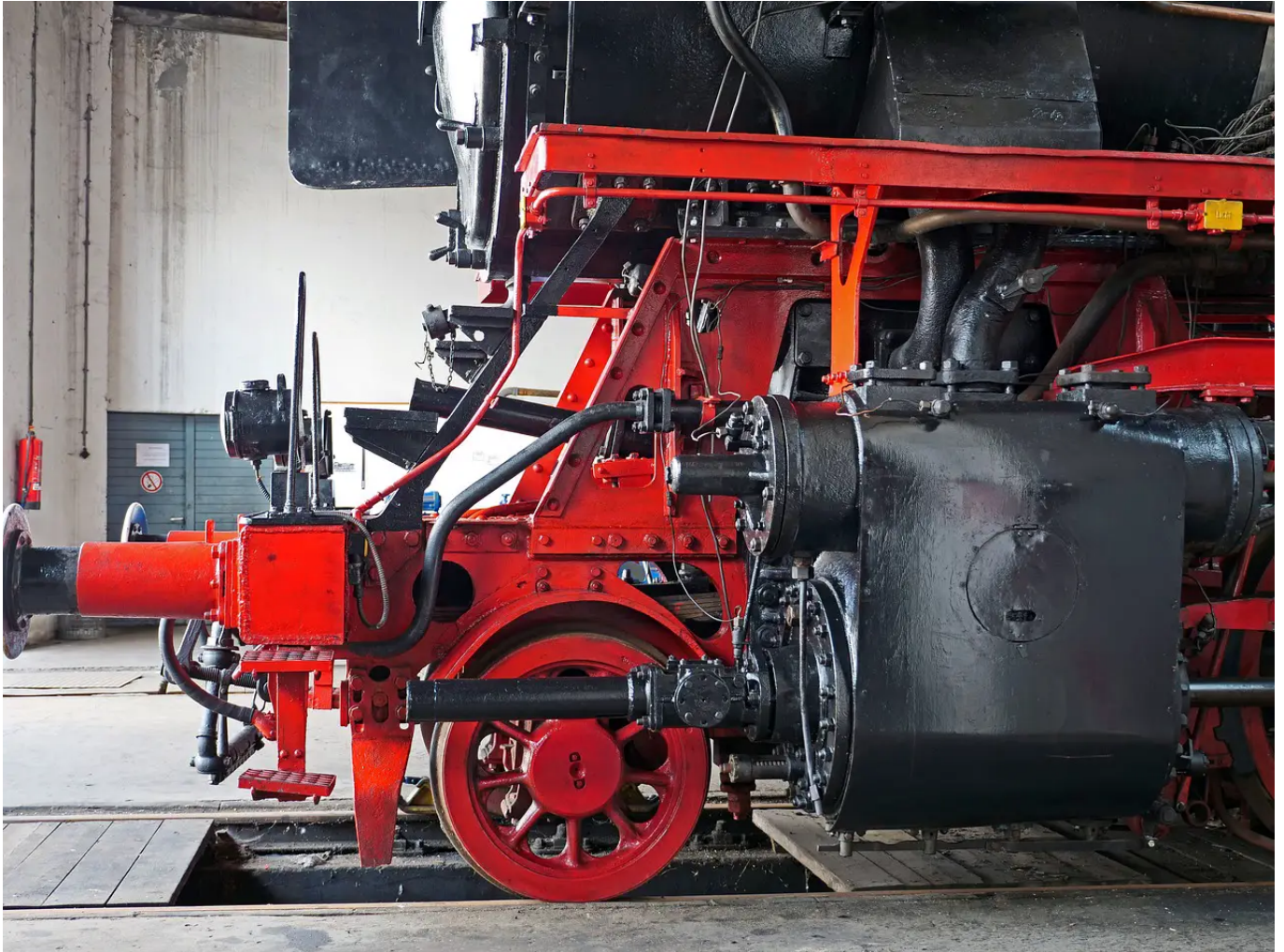
- actorly** Characteristic of an actor or actress.
*He seems to lack the **actorly** range that the role requires.*
- affected** Speaking or behaving in an artificial way to make an impression.
*You might become differently **affected** towards him.*
- brash** Having an ostentatious or tasteless appearance.
*The cafe was a **brash** new building.*
- conspicuous** Obvious to the eye or mind.
*He showed **conspicuous** bravery.*
- extravagant** Recklessly wasteful.
***Extravagant** gifts like computer games.*
- fancy** Sophisticated or expensive in a way that is intended to impress.
***Fancy** clothes.*

flamboyant	(of a person or their behaviour) tending to attract attention because of their exuberance, confidence, and stylishness. <i>A flamboyant bow tie.</i>
garish	Tastelessly showy. <i>Garish colors.</i>
gaudy	(used especially of clothes) marked by conspicuous display. <i>A gaudy costume.</i>
kitsch	Considered to be in poor taste but appreciated in an ironic or knowing way. <i>She offers kitsch interpretations of classic British dress including a range of tartan mini kilts.</i>
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>There were loud protests from the lumber barons.</i>
obtrusive	Sticking out; protruding. <i>The obtrusive behavior of a spoiled child.</i>
ornate	Marked by elaborate rhetoric and elaborated with decorative details. <i>Ornate rhetoric taught out of the rule of Plato.</i>
overdone	Cooked too long but still edible. <i>An overdone show of camaraderie.</i>
pretentious	(of a display) tawdry or vulgar. <i>A pretentious scholarly edition.</i>
showy	(used especially of clothes) marked by conspicuous display. <i>A cheap showy rhinestone bracelet.</i>
tasteless	Lacking flavour. <i>The vegetables were watery and tasteless.</i>
theatrical	Suited to or characteristic of the stage or theater. <i>One of the most theatrical figures in public life.</i>
tinselly	Glittering with gold or silver.



Usage Examples of "Ostentatious" as an adjective

- *An ostentatious sable coat.*
- *A simple design that is glamorous without being ostentatious.*

affluence	Abundant wealth. <i>A sign of our growing affluence.</i>

deluxe	Rich and superior in quality. <i>A deluxe hotel.</i>
fertility	The property of producing abundantly and sustaining vigorous and luxuriant growth. <i>Anxiety and stress affect fertility in both men and women.</i>
jewellery	Personal ornaments, such as necklaces, rings, or bracelets, that are typically made from or contain jewels and precious metal. <i>A jewellery box.</i>
luxuriant	(of vegetation) rich and profuse in growth; lush. <i>Forests of dark luxuriant foliage.</i>
luxurious	Displaying luxury and furnishing gratification to the senses. <i>The island s most luxurious hotel.</i>
luxuriously	In an indulgently luxurious manner.
luxury	Luxurious or of the nature of a luxury. <i>Luxury goods.</i>
mellowness	A taste (especially of fruit) that is ripe and of full flavor. <i>The cheap wine had no body no mellowness.</i>
opulent	Wealthy. <i>The opulent comfort of a limousine.</i>
ornate	Elaborately or highly decorated. <i>Peculiarly ornate and metaphorical language.</i>
plenitude	The condition of being full or complete. <i>The plenitude of the Pope s powers.</i>
plenteous	Plentiful. <i>A plenteous grape harvest.</i>
plentiful	Producing in abundance. <i>A plentiful year.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.
plenty	Used to emphasize the degree of something. <i>I ve had plenty thanks.</i>
profusion	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>A rich profusion of flowers.</i>
prosper	Make steady progress; be at the high point in one's career or reach a high point in historical significance or importance. <i>The state hopes to prosper from free trade with the United States.</i>

prosperity	The state of being prosperous. <i>A long period of peace and prosperity.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Her father is extremely rich.</i>
riches	Material wealth. <i>The riches of the world s waters.</i>
richness	The quality of having high intrinsic value. <i>The richness of the mines and pastureland.</i>
substantially	To a great or significant extent. <i>The price went up substantially.</i>
<u>sumptuous</u>	Rich and superior in quality. <i>The banquet was a sumptuous luxurious meal.</i>
wealth	Well-being. <i>Great wealth is not a sign of great intelligence.</i>
