avoid

Refrain from certain foods or beverages.
*Gerard **avoided** meeting his eye.*

ban

Ban from a place of residence as for punishment.
*Her son was **banned** for life from the Centre.*

banish	Expel from a community or group. <i>A number of people were banished to Siberia for political crimes.</i>
bar	Fasten something especially a door or window with a bar or bars. <i>Barricade the streets.</i>
blackball	Vote against; refuse to endorse; refuse to assent. <i>Her husband was blackballed when he tried to join the Country Club.</i>
blacklist	Put on a blacklist. <i>Workers were blacklisted after being quoted in the newspaper.</i>
boycott	Withdraw from commercial or social relations with (a country, organization, or person) as a punishment or protest. <i>We will boycott all banks which take part in the loans scheme.</i>
cast off	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment.
cast out	Get rid of.
cold-shoulder	Pay no attention to, disrespect.
cut dead	Cut and assemble the components of.
debar	Exclude or prohibit (someone) officially from doing something. <i>They were debarred entry to the port.</i>
deport	Conduct oneself in a specified manner. <i>He was deported for violation of immigration laws.</i>
dismiss	Terminate the employment of; discharge from an office or position. <i>He suspected a double meaning in her words but dismissed the thought.</i>
displace	Force (someone) to leave their home, typically because of war, persecution, or natural disaster. <i>Thousands of people have been displaced by the civil war.</i>
evict	Expel or eject without recourse to legal process. <i>The landlord evicted the tenants after they had not paid the rent for four months.</i>
exclude	Lack or fail to include. <i>Clauses seeking to exclude liability for loss or damage.</i>
exile	Expel and bar (someone) from their native country, typically for political or punitive reasons. <i>A corrupt dictator who had been exiled from his country.</i>

expatriate	Send (a person or money) abroad. <i>People that have illegally expatriated funds.</i>
expel	Remove from a position or office. <i>Eight diplomats were expelled from Norway for espionage.</i>
give someone the cold shoulder	Place into the hands or custody of.
ignore	Fail to notice. <i>The rules ignore one important principle of cricket.</i>
keep at arm's length	Fail to spoil or rot.
leave out in the cold	Transmit (knowledge or skills).
ostracise	Avoid speaking to or dealing with.
reject	Reject with contempt. <i>I reject the idea of starting a war.</i>
repudiate	(in the past or in non-Christian religions) disown or divorce (one's wife). <i>Repudiate a debt.</i>
shun	Persistently avoid, ignore, or reject (someone or something) through antipathy or caution. <i>He shunned fashionable society.</i>
shut out	Prevent from entering shut out.
snub	Check the movement of (a horse or boat), especially by a rope wound round a post. <i>A horse snubbed to a tree.</i>
spurn	Strike, tread, or push away with the foot. <i>With one touch of my feet I spurn the solid Earth.</i>

- *She was declared a witch and ostracized by the villagers.*
- *Themistocles was indeed out of favour at Athens by the end of the 470s, when he was ostracized.*

- abolitionism** The doctrine that calls for the abolition of slavery.
- apophasis** Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.

<u>asylum</u>	A hospital for mentally incompetent or unbalanced person. <i>She applied for asylum and was granted refugee status.</i>
<u>avert</u>	Turn away (one's eyes or thoughts). <i>They averted their eyes when the King entered.</i>
avoid	Keep away from or stop oneself from doing (something). <i>Boys queued up to take Gloria out but avoided Deirdre.</i>
banish	Expel, as if by official decree. <i>A number of people were banished to Siberia for political crimes.</i>
<u>bypass</u>	An alternative channel created during a bypass operation. <i>I had a bypass last year so have been building up my strength.</i>
circumvent	Find a way around (an obstacle). <i>I found it quite easy to circumvent security.</i>
<u>coup</u>	A brilliant and notable success. <i>It was a major coup to get such a prestigious contract.</i>
<u>deflect</u>	Cause (something) to change orientation. <i>He deflected his competitors.</i>
deport	Exile (a native) to another country. <i>He has deported himself with great dignity.</i>
depose	Testify to or give (evidence) under oath, typically in a written statement. <i>Every affidavit shall state which of the facts deposed to are within the deponent's knowledge.</i>
<u>detour</u>	Avoid by taking a detour. <i>He had made a detour to a cafe.</i>
<u>dodge</u>	(of a bell in change-ringing) move one place contrary to the normal sequence, and then back again in the following round. <i>Marchers had to dodge missiles thrown by loyalists.</i>
elude	(of an idea or fact) fail to be understood or remembered by (someone). <i>Sleep still eluded her.</i>
escape	Interrupt an operation by means of the escape key. <i>A baby boy narrowly escaped death.</i>
eschew	Avoid and stay away from deliberately; stay clear of. <i>He appealed to the crowd to eschew violence.</i>
<u>evade</u>	Escape, either physically or mentally. <i>Sleep still evaded her.</i>
evasion	Nonperformance of something distasteful (as by deceit or trickery) that you are supposed to do. <i>His evasion of all his creditors.</i>

exile	Expel and bar (someone) from their native country, typically for political or punitive reasons. <i>Men in exile dream of hope.</i>
expatriate	Denoting or relating to a person living outside their native country. <i>American expatriates in London.</i>
expel	Force to leave or move out. <i>She was expelled from school.</i>
flee	Run away from (someone or something). <i>He was forced to flee the country.</i>
forfend	Protect (something) by precautionary measures. <i>The sacrifice of Mississippi was forfended against even the treason of Wilkinson.</i>
obviate	Prevent the occurrence of; prevent from happening. <i>The presence of roller blinds obviated the need for curtains.</i>
oust	Remove from a position or office. <i>The chairman was ousted after he misappropriated funds.</i>
parry	An act of parrying something. <i>Her question met with a polite parry.</i>
shun	Expel from a community or group. <i>He shunned fashionable society.</i>
sidestep	A step to one side (as in boxing or dancing). <i>He neatly sidestepped the questions about riots.</i>
undiagnosed	Not diagnosed or having been subject to diagnosis. <i>Some patients have diseases that go undiagnosed and therefore untreated.</i>
