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| ascendant | Most powerful or important or influential. <i>The newly ascendant liberal party.</i> |
| controllable | Capable of being directed or influenced. <i>Discontent began to give way to barely controllable rage.</i> |
| dominate | Have dominance or the power to defeat over. <i>Hispanics predominate in this neighborhood.</i> |
| dominated | Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power. |
| govern | Serve to decide (a legal case). <i>Most transitive verbs govern the accusative case in German.</i> |
| governing | The act of governing exercising authority. <i>Governing bodies.</i> |
| indiscriminately | In a random manner; unsystematically. <i>His armies slaughtered men women and children indiscriminately.</i> |
| manageable | Able to be controlled or dealt with without difficulty. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and manageable.</i> |
| mastery | Comprehensive knowledge or skill in a particular subject or activity. <i>Mastery of the seas.</i> |
| monocracy | A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc. |
| monopolize | Have or exploit a monopoly of. <i>They instituted press censorship and monopolized the means of communication.</i> |
| obedience | The trait of being willing to obey. <i>Obedience to moral standards.</i> |
| obedient | Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>Children are taught to be obedient to their parents.</i> |

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| <u>obsession</u> | An unhealthy and compulsive preoccupation with something or someone. <i>He was in the grip of an obsession he was powerless to resist.</i> |
| <u>overlord</u> | A person who has general authority over others. <i>Charles was overlord of vast territories in Europe.</i> |
| potentate | A ruler who is unconstrained by law. |
| reign | Have sovereign power. <i>In America baseball reigns supreme.</i> |
| rudder | Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft. <i>Bring the aircraft to a stall and apply full rudder.</i> |
| sovereignty | The authority of a state to govern itself or another state. <i>The sovereignty of Parliament.</i> |
| <u>steer</u> | The type of steering of a vehicle. <i>The fishermen were steering a direct course for Koepang.</i> |
| <u>subjugate</u> | Bring under domination or control, especially by conquest. <i>The rich landowners subjugated the peasants working the land.</i> |
| <u>subjugation</u> | The act of subjugating by cruelty. <i>The fear of human subjugation by technology.</i> |
| superintendence | The management or arrangement of an activity or organization; supervision. <i>The school was under the superintendence of the nuns of the convent.</i> |
| supervision | The action of supervising someone or something. <i>He was placed under the supervision of a probation officer.</i> |
| <u>supremacy</u> | The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. <i>The supremacy of the king.</i> |
| tame | (of a plant) produced by cultivation. <i>Tame obedience.</i> |
| thermostat | Control the temperature with a thermostat. |
| <u>tractable</u> | (of a person) easy to control or influence. <i>The natives being of an intelligent tractable disposition.</i> |
| tyrannize | Rule or treat (someone) despotically or cruelly. <i>She tyrannized her family.</i> |
