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## Associations of "Out of control" (30 Words)

<b>ascendant</b>	Most powerful or important or influential. <i>The newly <b>ascendant</b> liberal party.</i>
<b>controllable</b>	Capable of being directed or influenced. <i>Discontent began to give way to barely <b>controllable</b> rage.</i>
<b>dominate</b>	Have dominance or the power to defeat over. <i>Hispanics <b>predominate</b> in this neighborhood.</i>
<b>dominated</b>	Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power.
<b>govern</b>	Serve to decide (a legal case). <i>Most transitive verbs <b>govern</b> the accusative case in German.</i>
<a href="#">governing</a>	The act of governing exercising authority. <i><b>Governing</b> bodies.</i>
<a href="#">indiscriminately</a>	In a random manner; unsystematically. <i>His armies slaughtered men women and children <b>indiscriminately</b>.</i>
<a href="#">manageable</a>	Able to be controlled or dealt with without difficulty. <i>Her long hair was black wavy and <b>manageable</b>.</i>
<a href="#">mastery</a>	Comprehensive knowledge or skill in a particular subject or activity. <i><b>Mastery</b> of the seas.</i>
<b>monocracy</b>	A form of government in which the ruler is an absolute dictator (not restricted by a constitution or laws or opposition etc.
<a href="#">monopolize</a>	Have or exploit a monopoly of. <i>They instituted press censorship and <b>monopolized</b> the means of communication.</i>
<a href="#">obedience</a>	The trait of being willing to obey. <i><b>Obedience</b> to moral standards.</i>
<a href="#">obedient</a>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>Children are taught to be <b>obedient</b> to their parents.</i>

<b><u>obsession</u></b>	An unhealthy and compulsive preoccupation with something or someone. <i>He was in the grip of an <b>obsession</b> he was powerless to resist.</i>
<b><u>overlord</u></b>	A person who has general authority over others. <i>Charles was <b>overlord</b> of vast territories in Europe.</i>
<b>potentate</b>	A ruler who is unconstrained by law.
<b>reign</b>	Have sovereign power. <i>In America baseball <b>reigns</b> supreme.</i>
<b>rudder</b>	Application of a rudder in steering a boat ship or aircraft. <i>Bring the aircraft to a stall and apply full <b>rudder</b>.</i>
<b>sovereignty</b>	The authority of a state to govern itself or another state. <i>The <b>sovereignty</b> of Parliament.</i>
<b><u>steer</u></b>	The type of steering of a vehicle. <i>The fishermen were <b>steering</b> a direct course for Koepang.</i>
<b><u>subjugate</u></b>	Bring under domination or control, especially by conquest. <i>The rich landowners <b>subjugated</b> the peasants working the land.</i>
<b><u>subjugation</u></b>	The act of subjugating by cruelty. <i>The fear of human <b>subjugation</b> by technology.</i>
<b>superintendence</b>	The management or arrangement of an activity or organization; supervision. <i>The school was under the <b>superintendence</b> of the nuns of the convent.</i>
<b>supervision</b>	The action of supervising someone or something. <i>He was placed under the <b>supervision</b> of a probation officer.</i>
<b><u>supremacy</u></b>	The state or condition of being superior to all others in authority, power, or status. <i>The <b>supremacy</b> of the king.</i>
<b>tame</b>	(of a plant) produced by cultivation. <i><b>Tame</b> obedience.</i>
<b>thermostat</b>	Control the temperature with a thermostat.
<b><u>tractable</u></b>	(of a person) easy to control or influence. <i>The natives being of an intelligent <b>tractable</b> disposition.</i>
<b>tyrannize</b>	Rule or treat (someone) despotically or cruelly. <i>She <b>tyrannized</b> her family.</i>
