pariah	An outcast. <i>They were treated as social pariahs.</i>
persona non grata	An actor's portrayal of someone in a play.
reject	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>Some of the team's rejects have gone on to prove themselves in championships.</i>
<u>untouchable</u>	Belongs to lowest social and ritual class in India.

<u>apart</u>	Having characteristics not shared by others. <i>Studies from as far apart as America and Iceland.</i>
bespectacled	Wearing, or having the face adorned with, eyeglasses or an eyeglass. <i>She was thin and bespectacled.</i>
cloistered	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>A cloistered upbringing.</i>
<u>controversial</u>	Giving rise or likely to give rise to controversy or public disagreement. <i>Rushdie s controversial book.</i>

<u>deserted</u>	(of a place) empty of people. <i>Deserted beaches of soft sand.</i>
<u>eccentric</u>	A person of a specified kind usually with many eccentricities. <i>Famed for his eccentric spelling.</i>
expatriate	Denoting or relating to a person living outside their native country. <i>American expatriates.</i>
foreigner	A person who comes from a foreign country; someone who does not owe allegiance to your country.
geek	A person with an unusual or odd personality. <i>I am totally geeking out over this upcoming film.</i>
isle	An island or peninsula, especially a small one. <i>Crusoe s fabled isle.</i>
isolate	A culture of microorganisms isolated for study. <i>The chemist managed to isolate the compound.</i>
isolated	Marked by separation of or from usually contiguous elements. <i>Could not remain the isolated figure he had been.</i>
<u>isolation</u>	(psychiatry) a defense mechanism in which memory of an unacceptable act or impulse is separated from the emotion originally associated with it. <i>Isolation from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.</i>
lonely	Devoid of creatures. <i>A lonely fisherman stood on a tuft of gravel.</i>
<u>loser</u>	A person or thing that loses or has lost something, especially a game or contest. <i>They should concede that we won and be good losers.</i>
<u>misunderstood</u>	Incorrectly interpreted or understood. <i>A misunderstood question.</i>
<u>nerd</u>	A single-minded expert in a particular technical field. <i>A computer nerd.</i>
outback	Any remote or sparsely populated inland region. <i>A two week tour of the outback.</i>
outpost	A remote part of a country or empire. <i>Troops in some outposts have surrendered.</i>
<u>outsider</u>	A contestant (human or animal) not considered to have a good chance to win. <i>The winner was Beech Road a fifty to one outsider.</i>
pariah	An outcast. <i>The country is becoming an international pariah state.</i>

<u>remote</u>	A remote control device. <i>The remote past or future.</i>
<u>secluded</u>	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i>
seclusion	The quality of being secluded from the presence or view of others. <i>They enjoyed ten days of peace and seclusion.</i>
<u>solitary</u>	Characterized by or preferring solitude. <i>A man of a solitary disposition.</i>
<u>solitude</u>	A state of social isolation. <i>She savoured her few hours of freedom and solitude.</i>
<u>stranger</u>	A person who does not know, or is not known in, a particular place or community. <i>He must have been a stranger to the village.</i>
<u>underdog</u>	A person who has little status in society. <i>What is it like to be an underdog in America.</i>
yon	At or in an indicated usually distant place yon is archaic and dialectal Calder Willingham. <i>What is yon place.</i>
