- antiquated** Old-fashioned or outdated.
*This **antiquated** central heating system.*
- archaic** (of a word or a style of language) no longer in everyday use but sometimes used to impart an old-fashioned flavour.
*A term with a rather **archaic** ring to it.*
- behind the times** Having the lower score or lagging position in a contest.

behindhand	Late or slow in doing something. <i>You are miserably behindhand Mr Cole gave me a hint of it six weeks ago.</i>
bygone	Well in the past; former. <i>Bygone days.</i>
crusted	Having or forming a hard outer layer. <i>A crusted establishment figure.</i>
<u>dated</u>	Marked with a date. <i>A signed and dated painting.</i>
defunct	No longer in force or use; inactive. <i>A defunct Indian tribe.</i>
feudal	Of or relating to or characteristic of feudalism. <i>His view of patriotism was more than old fashioned it was positively feudal.</i>
<u>former</u>	Having previously been a particular thing. <i>The seafarers of former times.</i>
fusty	Old-fashioned and out of date. <i>The fusty odour of decay.</i>
medieval	Resembling or likened to the Middle Ages, especially in being cruel, uncivilized, or primitive. <i>A medieval castle.</i>
moth-eaten	Showing signs of wear and tear.
musty	Having a stale taste. <i>The beer tasted sour thin and musty.</i>
obsolescent	Becoming obsolete. <i>Obsolescent equipment.</i>
<u>obsolete</u>	No longer in use. <i>Obsolete words.</i>
old	Very familiar used for emphasis old adj skilled through long experience. <i>He was fourteen years old.</i>
old-fashioned	Out of fashion.
old-time	Attractively old-fashioned (but not necessarily authentic).
old-world	Characteristic of former times especially in Europe.
olde worlde	Attractively old-fashioned (but not necessarily authentic).
out	Being out or having grown cold. <i>That style is out these days.</i>
out of date	Outer or outlying.

out of fashion	Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.
out of style	Out of power; especially having been unsuccessful in an election.
outmoded	Old-fashioned. <i>An outmoded Victorian building.</i>
outworn	Out of date. Outworn prejudices.
past	(of a tense) expressing an action that has happened or a state that previously existed. <i>This past Thursday.</i>
prehistoric	Of or relating to times before written history. Prehistoric peoples.
quaint	Attractively unusual or old-fashioned. Quaint dialect words.
superannuated	Outdated or obsolete through age or new developments. <i>He left the house for the support of twelve superannuated wool carders.</i>
unfashionable	Unpopular and considered unappealing or unfashionable at the time. <i>They lived in an unfashionable part of London.</i>

*Gigantic bones of **antediluvian** animals.*
- antiquated** So extremely old as seeming to belong to an earlier period.
*This **antiquated** central heating system.*
- antique** Give an antique appearance to.
*A suit of rather **antique** appearance.*
- antiquity** The ancient past, especially the period of classical and other human civilizations before the Middle Ages.
*A church of great **antiquity**.*

<u>archaic</u>	So extremely old as seeming to belong to an earlier period. <i>The archaic temple at Corinth.</i>
<u>decrepitude</u>	The state of being decrepit. <i>He had passed directly from middle age into decrepitude.</i>
diehard	One who adheres to traditional views. <i>A diehard Yankees fan.</i>
dilapidated	(of a building or object) in a state of disrepair or ruin as a result of age or neglect. <i>The tank was now rather dilapidated.</i>
<u>elder</u>	A person who is older than one by a specified length of time. <i>He left the Church of which he had been an elder.</i>
elderly	(of a machine or similar object) showing signs of age. <i>Specialist services for the elderly.</i>
historical	Having once lived or existed or taken place in the real world as distinct from being legendary. <i>Actual historical events.</i>
hyperborean	One of a people that the ancient Greeks believed lived in a warm and sunny land north of the source of the north wind.
immemorial	Originating in the distant past; very old. <i>An immemorial custom.</i>
<u>moot</u>	A regular gathering of people having a common interest. <i>The whole matter is becoming increasingly moot.</i>
obsolescent	Becoming obsolete. <i>Obsolescent equipment.</i>
<u>obsolete</u>	Cause a product or idea to become obsolete by replacing it with something new. <i>The phrase was obsolete after 1625.</i>
old	Very familiar used for emphasis old adj skilled through long experience. <i>Good old boy.</i>
ossified	Set in a rigidly conventional pattern of behavior, habits, or beliefs. <i>An ossified bureaucratic system.</i>
paleolithic	Of or relating to the second period of the Stone Age (following the eolithic). <i>Paleolithic artifacts.</i>
prehistory	The events or conditions leading up to a particular occurrence or phenomenon. <i>Myths that stretch back into prehistory.</i>

primeval	(of emotion or behaviour) strongly instinctive and unreasoning. <i>Mile after mile of primeval forest.</i>
ramshackle	(especially of a house or vehicle) in a state of severe disrepair. <i>A ramshackle cottage.</i>
rickety	(of a structure or piece of equipment) poorly made and likely to collapse. <i>A rickety table.</i>
ruined	Having been irreparably damaged or harmed. <i>The nation s ruined economy.</i>
stodgy	Out of fashion; old fashioned. <i>Why is the middle class so stodgy so utterly without a sense of humor.</i>
stuffy	Lacking fresh air. <i>A stuffy overcrowded office.</i>
superannuated	Too old to be useful- Anthony Trollope. <i>She is not superannuated and has no paid holiday.</i>
traditional	(of jazz) in the style of the early 20th century. <i>The traditional festivities of the Church year.</i>
