<b>crusted</b>	Having or forming a hard outer layer. <i>A <b>crusted</b> establishment figure.</i>
<b><u>dated</u></b>	Marked with a date. <i>A signed and <b>dated</b> painting.</i>
<b>defunct</b>	No longer in force or use; inactive. <i>A <b>defunct</b> Indian tribe.</i>
<b>feudal</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of feudalism. <i>His view of patriotism was more than old fashioned it was positively <b>feudal</b>.</i>
<b><u>former</u></b>	Having previously been a particular thing. <i>The seafarers of <b>former</b> times.</i>
<b>fusty</b>	Old-fashioned and out of date. <i>The <b>fusty</b> odour of decay.</i>
<b>medieval</b>	Resembling or likened to the Middle Ages, especially in being cruel, uncivilized, or primitive. <i>A <b>medieval</b> castle.</i>
<b>moth-eaten</b>	Showing signs of wear and tear.
<b>musty</b>	Having a stale taste. <i>The beer tasted sour thin and <b>musty</b>.</i>
<b>obsolescent</b>	Becoming obsolete. <i><b>Obsolescent</b> equipment.</i>
<b><u>obsolete</u></b>	No longer in use. <i><b>Obsolete</b> words.</i>
<b>old</b>	Very familiar used for emphasis old adj skilled through long experience. <i>He was fourteen years <b>old</b>.</i>
<b>old-fashioned</b>	Out of fashion.
<b>old-time</b>	Attractively old-fashioned (but not necessarily authentic).
<b>old-world</b>	Characteristic of former times especially in Europe.
<b>olde worlde</b>	Attractively old-fashioned (but not necessarily authentic).
<b>out</b>	Being out or having grown cold. <i>That style is <b>out</b> these days.</i>
<b>out of date</b>	Outer or outlying.

<b>out of fashion</b>	Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.
<b>out of style</b>	Out of power; especially having been unsuccessful in an election.
<b>outmoded</b>	Old-fashioned. <i>An <b>outmoded</b> Victorian building.</i>
<b>outworn</b>	Out of date. <b>Outworn</b> prejudices.
<b>past</b>	(of a tense) expressing an action that has happened or a state that previously existed. <i>This <b>past</b> Thursday.</i>
<b>prehistoric</b>	Of or relating to times before written history. <b>Prehistoric</b> peoples.
<b>quaint</b>	Attractively unusual or old-fashioned. <b>Quaint</b> dialect words.
<b>superannuated</b>	Outdated or obsolete through age or new developments. <i>He left the house for the support of twelve <b>superannuated</b> wool carders.</i>
<b>unfashionable</b>	Unpopular and considered unappealing or unfashionable at the time. <i>They lived in an <b>unfashionable</b> part of London.</i>

<b>archaic</b>	So extremely old as seeming to belong to an earlier period. <i>The <b>archaic</b> temple at Corinth.</i>
<b>decrepitude</b>	The state of being decrepit. <i>He had passed directly from middle age into <b>decrepitude</b>.</i>
<b>diehard</b>	One who adheres to traditional views. <i>A <b>diehard</b> Yankees fan.</i>
<b>dilapidated</b>	(of a building or object) in a state of disrepair or ruin as a result of age or neglect. <i>The tank was now rather <b>dilapidated</b>.</i>
<b>elder</b>	A person who is older than one by a specified length of time. <i>He left the Church of which he had been an <b>elder</b>.</i>
<b>elderly</b>	(of a machine or similar object) showing signs of age. <i>Specialist services for the <b>elderly</b>.</i>
<b>historical</b>	Having once lived or existed or taken place in the real world as distinct from being legendary. <i>Actual <b>historical</b> events.</i>
<b>hyperborean</b>	One of a people that the ancient Greeks believed lived in a warm and sunny land north of the source of the north wind.
<b>immemorial</b>	Originating in the distant past; very old. <i>An <b>immemorial</b> custom.</i>
<b>moot</b>	A regular gathering of people having a common interest. <i>The whole matter is becoming increasingly <b>moot</b>.</i>
<b>obsolescent</b>	Becoming obsolete. <i><b>Obsolescent</b> equipment.</i>
<b>obsolete</b>	Cause a product or idea to become obsolete by replacing it with something new. <i>The phrase was <b>obsolete</b> after 1625.</i>

<b>ossified</b>	Set in a rigidly conventional pattern of behavior, habits, or beliefs. <i>An <b>ossified</b> bureaucratic system.</i>
<b>paleolithic</b>	Of or relating to the second period of the Stone Age (following the eolithic). <i><b>Paleolithic</b> artifacts.</i>
<b>prehistory</b>	The events or conditions leading up to a particular occurrence or phenomenon. <i>Myths that stretch back into <b>prehistory</b>.</i>

<b>primeval</b>	(of emotion or behaviour) strongly instinctive and unreasoning. <i>Mile after mile of <b>primeval</b> forest.</i>
<b>ramshackle</b>	(especially of a house or vehicle) in a state of severe disrepair. <i>A <b>ramshackle</b> cottage.</i>
<b>rickety</b>	(of a structure or piece of equipment) poorly made and likely to collapse. <i>A <b>rickety</b> table.</i>
<b>ruined</b>	Having been irreparably damaged or harmed. <i>The nation s <b>ruined</b> economy.</i>
<b>stodgy</b>	Out of fashion; old fashioned. <i>Why is the middle class so <b>stodgy</b> so utterly without a sense of humor.</i>
<b>stuffy</b>	Lacking fresh air. <i>A <b>stuffy</b> overcrowded office.</i>
<b>superannuated</b>	Too old to be useful- Anthony Trollope. <i>She is not <b>superannuated</b> and has no paid holiday.</i>
<b>traditional</b>	(of jazz) in the style of the early 20th century. <i>The <b>traditional</b> festivities of the Church year.</i>
