<b>expenses</b>	Money spent to perform work and usually reimbursed by an employer. <i>He kept a careful record of his <b>expenses</b> at the meeting.</i>

<b>outlay</b>	An amount of money spent on something. <i>A modest <b>outlay</b> on local advertising.</i>
<b>overheads</b>	A transparency for use with an overhead projector.
<b>payments</b>	A sum of money paid or a claim discharged.
<b>spending</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money.

<b>extrovert</b>	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His <b>extrovert</b> personality made him the ideal host.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	Being concerned with the social and physical environment. <i>She is <b>extroverted</b> confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<b>forthcoming</b>	Ready or made available when wanted or needed. <i>She had never been <b>forthcoming</b> about her time in the States.</i>
<b>friendly</b>	(of troops or equipment) of, belonging to, or allied with one's own forces. <i>The risk of blowing up <b>friendly</b> forces is minimized.</i>
<b>genial</b>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>Our <b>genial</b> host.</i>
<b>gregarious</b>	(of animals) tending to form a group with others of the same species. <i>He was a popular and <b>gregarious</b> man.</i>
<b>hail-fellow-well-met</b>	Heartily friendly and congenial.
<b>lively</b>	Intellectually stimulating or perceptive. <i>A <b>lively</b> tennis ball.</i>
<b>retiring</b>	Reluctant to draw attention to yourself. <i>A gentle <b>retiring</b> person who avoided conflict.</i>
<b>sociable</b>	Inclined to or conducive to companionship with others. <i>A <b>sociable</b> conversation.</i>
<b>uninhibited</b>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i>Fits of <b>uninhibited</b> laughter.</i>
<b>unreserved</b>	Frank and open. <i>A tall <b>unreserved</b> young man.</i>
<b>warm</b>	Inducing the impression of warmth used especially of reds and oranges and yellows. <i>They exchanged <b>warm</b> friendly smiles.</i>

<b><u>excitable</u></b>	Responding too readily to something new or stimulating; easily excited. <i>These alkaloids act on nerve cells to make them more <b>excitable</b>.</i>
<b><u>expansive</u></b>	Able or tending to expand or characterized by expansion. <i>An <b>expansive</b> lifestyle.</i>
<b>extrovert</b>	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His <b>extrovert</b> personality made him the ideal host.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	Outgoing and socially confident. <i>She is <b>extroverted</b> confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>

<b>personality</b>	Lively, engaging qualities. <i>An official opening by a famous <b>personality</b>.</i>
<b>rhapsodize</b>	Speak or write about someone or something with great enthusiasm and delight. <i>He began to <b>rhapsodize</b> about Gaby's beauty and charm.</i>
<b>sociable</b>	An S-shaped couch for two people who sit partially facing each other. <i>Enjoyed a <b>sociable</b> chat.</i>
<b>social</b>	An informal social gathering especially one organized by the members of a particular club or group. <i>A recent analysis of <b>social</b> class in Britain.</i>
<b>talkative</b>	Friendly and open and willing to talk. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn't stopped chatting.</i>
<b>verbose</b>	Using or containing too many words. <i><b>Verbose</b> and ineffective instructional methods.</i>
<b>vocal</b>	Given to expressing yourself freely or insistently. <i>The <b>vocal</b> apparatus.</i>
<b>volubility</b>	The quality of talking fluently, readily, or incessantly; talkativeness. <i>Her legendary <b>volubility</b> deserted her.</i>
