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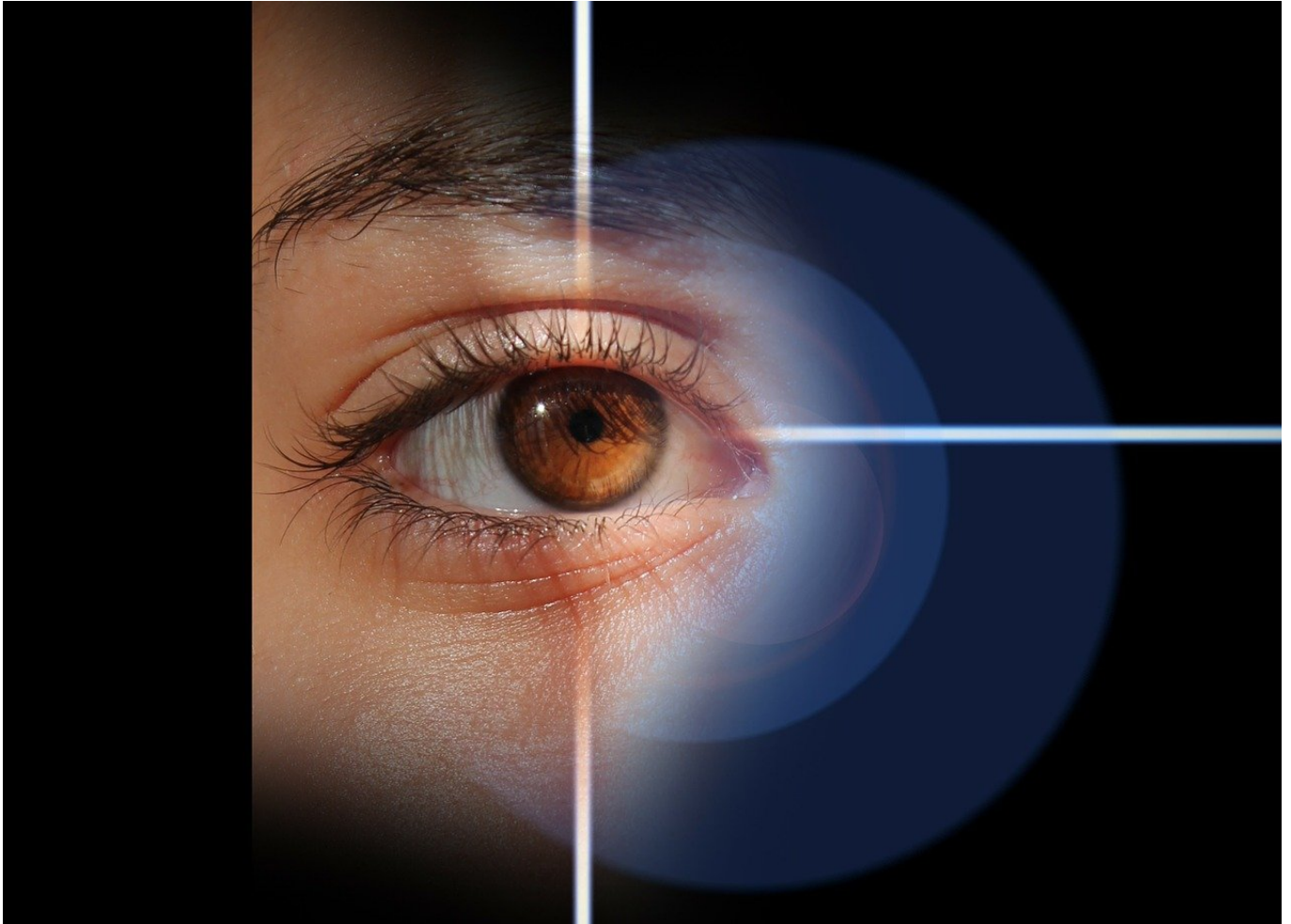

## **Outraged as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Outraged" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “outraged” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Angered at something unjust or wrong.*



### Synonyms of "Outraged" as an adjective (3 Words)

- incensed** Angered at something unjust or wrong.  
*Leonora glared back at him **incensed**.*
- indignant** Feeling or showing anger or annoyance at what is perceived as unfair treatment.  
*An **indignant** denial.*
- umbrageous** Filled with shade.  
***Umbrageous** at the loss of their territory.*



## Usage Examples of "Outraged" as an adjective

- *A look of outraged disbelief.*



## Associations of "Outraged" (30 Words)

- acrimonious** (typically of speech or discussion) angry and bitter.  
*An **acrimonious** dispute about wages.*
- angry** Severely inflamed and painful.  
*Why are you **angry** with me.*
- delirium** A usually brief state of excitement and mental confusion often accompanied by hallucinations.  
*She had fits of **delirium**.*
- enraged** Marked by extreme anger.  
*The **enraged** bull attacked.*
- exasperated** Intensely irritated and frustrated.  
*Had an **exasperated** look on his face.*

<b>fume</b>	Expose something especially wood to ammonia fumes in order to produce dark tints. <i>We simply cannot have this she <b>fumed</b>.</i>
<b>furious</b>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i><b>Furious</b> about the accident.</i>
<b>furiously</b>	In an impassioned or very angry manner. <i>He <b>furiously</b> denies the claims.</i>
<b>fury</b>	Wild or violent anger. <i>Hell hath no <b>fury</b> like a woman scorned.</i>
<b>indignant</b>	Feeling or showing anger or annoyance at what is perceived as unfair treatment. <i>An <b>indignant</b> denial.</i>
<b>inflammatory</b>	Arousing to action or rebellion. <i>An <b>inflammatory</b> process.</i>
<b>infuriated</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i><b>Infuriated</b> onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
<b>irascible</b>	Quickly aroused to anger. <i>An <b>irascible</b> response.</i>
<b>irate</b>	Feeling or characterized by great anger. <i>A barrage of <b>irate</b> letters.</i>
<b>ire</b>	A strong emotion; a feeling that is oriented toward some real or supposed grievance. <i>The plans provoked the <b>ire</b> of conservationists.</i>
<b>livid</b>	(of a light) imparting a deathlike luminosity. <i>A face <b>livid</b> with shock.</i>
<b>miff</b>	A petty quarrel or fit of pique. <i>A doctor might be <b>miffed</b> by claims that the cure had no medical explanation.</i>
<b>nauseate</b>	Upset and make nauseated. <i>They were <b>nauseated</b> by the jingoism.</i>
<b>outrage</b>	An action or event causing outrage. <i>Her voice trembled with <b>outrage</b>.</i>
<b>rage</b>	Violent uncontrollable anger. <i>A <b>rage</b> for absolute honesty informs much western art.</i>
<b>rancor</b>	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.
<b>rancorous</b>	Showing deep-seated resentment. <i>Sixteen miserable months of <b>rancorous</b> disputes.</i>

<b><u>resentful</u></b>	Feeling or expressing bitterness or indignation at having been treated unfairly. <i><b>Resentful</b> at the way he was treated.</i>
<b>resentment</b>	Bitter indignation at having been treated unfairly. <i>Some people harbour <b>resentments</b> going back many years.</i>
<b><u>scowl</u></b>	Frown in an angry or bad-tempered way. <i>She stamped into the room with a <b>scowl</b> on her face.</i>
<b>seethe</b>	(of a liquid) boil or be turbulent as if boiling. <i>The grey ocean <b>seethed</b>.</i>
<b><u>snarl</u></b>	Make a snarling noise or move with a snarling noise. <i>Shut your mouth he <b>snarled</b>.</i>
<b>sulk</b>	A period of sulking. <i>She was in a fit of the <b>sulks</b>.</i>
<b><u>unleash</u></b>	Turn loose or free from restraint. <i>They dig up badger setts and <b>unleash</b> terriers into them.</i>
<b><u>wrath</u></b>	Extreme anger. <i>He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father s <b>wrath</b>.</i>
