perfect	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i>Perfect timing.</i>

positive	Having a positive charge. <i>The company received a positive response from investors.</i>
prize	Denoting something for which a prize is awarded. <i>A prize bull.</i>

thoroughgoing	Performed comprehensively and completely; not superficial or partial. <i>A thoroughgoing villain.</i>
through and through	Having finished or arrived at completion.
ultimate	Furthest or highest in degree or order; utmost or extreme. <i>One's ultimate goal in life.</i>
unadulterated	Not mixed with impurities. <i>Unadulterated whole milk yogurt.</i>
unalloyed	Free from admixture. <i>Unalloyed metal.</i>
unconditional	Not conditional. <i>Unconditional surrender.</i>

<u>undeniable</u>	Not possible to deny. <i>It is an undeniable fact that some dogs are easier to train than others.</i>
<u>unequivocal</u>	Leaving no doubt; unambiguous. <i>An unequivocal or univocal statement.</i>
unlimited	That cannot be entirely consumed or used up. <i>Offshore reserves of gas and oil are not unlimited.</i>
<u>unmistakable</u>	Clearly evident to the mind. <i>His opposition to slavery was unmistakable.</i>
<u>unmitigated</u>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>Unmitigated suffering.</i>
unmodified	Not modified. <i>The unmodified Fender has a clean sharp response.</i>
unqualified	Not meeting the proper standards and requirements and training. <i>No company would permit an unqualified accountant to audit its books.</i>
unrestricted	Not limited or restricted. <i>I had unrestricted access.</i>
<u>utter</u>	Complete; absolute. <i>Utter nonsense.</i>
<u>veritable</u>	Often used as intensifiers. <i>Photographs taken in a veritable bull ring.</i>
wholesale	Done on a large scale; extensive. <i>The wholesale destruction of these animals by poachers.</i>

***Frankly** my dear I don't give a damn.*

fully

To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; ('full' in this sense is used as a combining form.

*They were **fully** or amply fed.*

honestly

It is sincerely the case that used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude honestly adv in an honest manner.

***Honestly** that man is the absolute limit.*

immediately

Without any intervening time or space.

*They would be the states most **immediately** affected by any such action.*

To or toward the inside of.

in every respect

To or toward the inside of.

in one fell swoop

To or toward the inside of.

in plain language

Without deviation.

straight from the shoulder

straightforwardly

In an honest and frank manner.

*She treated everyone openly and **straightforwardly**.*

Subsequently or soon afterward (often used as sentence connectors).

there and then	In that matter.
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house thoroughly.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Used to emphasize a clause or statement. <i>I m sorry I totally didn t mean it.</i>
<u>truly</u>	In fact (used as intensifiers or sentence modifiers). <i>Why cannot all masters be served truly.</i>
<u>truthfully</u>	Used to emphasize the truthfulness or honesty of a statement. <i>Truthfully I never liked any of em.</i>
unreservedly	Frankly and openly. <i>I unreservedly recommend the book.</i>
<u>utterly</u>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i>Utterly miserable.</i>
<u>wholly</u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She found herself given over wholly to sensation.</i>
with no holds barred	Used to express refusal or denial or disagreement etc or especially to emphasize a negative statement.

gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. The orchestral gamut .
generic	(of goods, especially medicinal drugs) having no brand name; not protected by a registered trademark. The generic name.
instantaneously	Without any delay. Soldiers must be ready to react instantaneously .
<u>instantly</u>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. She fell asleep almost instantly .
perfectly	In a perfect or faultless way. A perfectly idiotic idea.

<u>rely</u>	Have confidence or faith in. <i>The charity has to rely entirely on public donations.</i>
ripen	Cause to ripen or develop fully. <i>Honeydew melons ripen slowly.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>People are appointed solely on the basis of merit.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement. <i>A stark contrast.</i>
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>We searched the files thoroughly.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Completely; absolutely. <i>Some of the lyrics are totally brilliant.</i>
<u>unrelated</u>	Lacking a logical or causal relation. <i>Unrelated facts.</i>
unsuited	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally unsuited for the job.</i>
