<b><u>limitless</u></b>	Without end, limit, or boundary. <i>Our resources are not <b>limitless</b>.</i>
<b>out-and-out</b>	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.
<b>perfect</b>	Of a tense denoting a completed action or a state or habitual action which began in the past The perfect tense is formed in English with have or has and the past participle as in they have eaten and they have been eating present perfect they had eaten past perfect and they will have eaten future perfect. <i><b>Perfect</b> timing.</i>

<b>positive</b>	Having a positive charge. <i>The company received a <b>positive</b> response from investors.</i>
<b>prize</b>	Denoting something for which a prize is awarded. <i>A <b>prize</b> bull.</i>

<b>thoroughgoing</b>	Performed comprehensively and completely; not superficial or partial. <i>A <b>thoroughgoing</b> villain.</i>
<b>through and through</b>	Having finished or arrived at completion.
<b>ultimate</b>	Furthest or highest in degree or order; utmost or extreme. <i>One's <b>ultimate</b> goal in life.</i>
<b>unadulterated</b>	Not mixed with impurities. <i><b>Unadulterated</b> whole milk yogurt.</i>

<b>unmodified</b>	Not modified. <i>The <b>unmodified</b> Fender has a clean sharp response.</i>
<b>unqualified</b>	Not meeting the proper standards and requirements and training. <i>No company would permit an <b>unqualified</b> accountant to audit its books.</i>
<b>unrestricted</b>	Not limited or restricted. <i>I had <b>unrestricted</b> access.</i>
<b><u>utter</u></b>	Complete; absolute. <i><b>Utter</b> nonsense.</i>
<b><u>veritable</u></b>	Often used as intensifiers. <i>Photographs taken in a <b>veritable</b> bull ring.</i>
<b>wholesale</b>	Done on a large scale; extensive. <i>The <b>wholesale</b> destruction of these animals by poachers.</i>

<b>forthrightly</b>	Directly and without evasion; not roundabout. <i>Spoke forthright or <b>forthrightly</b> and to the point.</i>

<b>frankly</b>	(used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude) it is sincerely the case that. <i>Frankly my dear I don't give a damn.</i>
<b>fully</b>	To the greatest degree or extent; completely or entirely; ('full' in this sense is used as a combining form). <i>They were fully or amply fed.</i>
<b>honestly</b>	It is sincerely the case that used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude honestly adv in an honest manner. <i>Honestly that man is the absolute limit.</i>
<b>immediately</b>	Without any intervening time or space. <i>They would be the states most immediately affected by any such action.</i>
<b>in a flash</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in every respect</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in one fell swoop</b>	To or toward the inside of.

<b>plainly</b>	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>A light was plainly visible.</i>
<b>quite</b>	To the utmost or most absolute extent or degree; absolutely; completely. <i>Her victory was quite something.</i>
<b>sincerely</b>	Written formula for ending a letter. <i>She praised him sincerely for his victory.</i>
<b>straight away</b>	Without deviation.
<b>straight from the shoulder</b>	Without deviation.
<b>straightforwardly</b>	In an honest and frank manner. <i>She treated everyone openly and straightforwardly.</i>
<b>then and there</b>	Subsequently or soon afterward (often used as sentence connectors).

<b>there and then</b>	In that matter.
<u><a href="#">thoroughly</a></u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>

<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged Bacon. Was able to keep the collection <b>entire</b> during his lifetime.
<b>entirely</b>	Completely (often used for emphasis). Eight coaches <b>entirely</b> for passenger transport.
<b>entirety</b>	The whole of something. He read the article in its <b>entirety</b> .

<b>ripen</b>	Cause to ripen or develop fully. <i>Honeydew melons <b>ripen</b> slowly.</i>
<b><u>solely</u></b>	Without any others being included or involved. <i>People are appointed <b>solely</b> on the basis of merit.</i>
<b><u>stark</u></b>	Stiff, rigid, or incapable of movement. <i>A <b>stark</b> contrast.</i>
<b><u>thoroughly</u></b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>We searched the files <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<b><u>totally</u></b>	Completely; absolutely. <i>Some of the lyrics are <b>totally</b> brilliant.</i>
