## Outsider as a Noun

### Definitions of "Outsider" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “outsider” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person who is not accepted by or who isolates themselves from society.*
- *A person who does not belong to a particular organization or profession.*
- *A contestant (human or animal) not considered to have a good chance to win.*
- *A competitor, applicant, etc. thought to have little chance of success.*
- *Someone who is excluded from or is not a member of a group.*



## Synonyms of "Outsider" as a noun (3 Words)

- foreigner** A person who comes from a foreign country; someone who does not owe allegiance to your country.
- [stranger](#) A person entirely unaccustomed to (a feeling, experience, or situation).  
*I m a **stranger** in these parts.*
- [visitor](#) A migratory bird present in a locality for only part of the year.  
*She s a frequent **visitor** to London.*



## Usage Examples of "Outsider" as a noun

- *She felt that his friends despised her as an outsider.*
- *To the outsider, glitzy fashion shows may seem an outrageous extravagance.*
- *The winner was Beech Road, a fifty-to-one outsider.*
- *He started as a rank outsider.*





## Associations of "Outsider" (30 Words)

<b>alien</b>	A form of life assumed to exist outside the Earth or its atmosphere. <i><b>Alien</b> beings.</i>
<b>bespectacled</b>	Wearing glasses. <i>A <b>bespectacled</b> grandmother.</i>
<b><u>controversial</u></b>	Marked by or capable of arousing controversy. <i>Rushdie s <b>controversial</b> book.</i>
<b>deport</b>	Conduct oneself in a specified manner. <i>He was <b>deported</b> to Turkey for his public condemnation of the Shah.</i>
<b>deportation</b>	The expulsion from a country of an undesirable alien. <i>His <b>deportation</b> to a penal colony.</i>
<b><u>deserted</u></b>	(of a place) empty of people. <i><b>Deserted</b> beaches of soft sand.</i>
<b>expatriate</b>	Move away from one's native country and adopt a new residence abroad. <i>The poet was then <b>expatriated</b> from France.</i>
<b>foreigner</b>	A person who comes from a foreign country; someone who does not owe allegiance to your country.
<b><u>forlorn</u></b>	Marked by or showing hopelessness. <i>A <b>forlorn</b> cause.</i>
<b>geek</b>	Be or become extremely excited or enthusiastic about a subject, typically one of specialist or minority interest. <i>I am totally <b>geeking</b> out over this upcoming film.</i>
<b>isolated</b>	Cut off or left behind. <i><b>Isolated</b> farms and villages.</i>
<b><u>lone</u></b>	Being the only one; single and isolated from others. <i>Poverty among <b>lone</b> mothers.</i>
<b>lonely</b>	Without companions; solitary. <i>Passing long <b>lonely</b> hours looking on to the street.</i>
<b><u>misunderstood</u></b>	Incorrectly interpreted or understood. <i>A <b>misunderstood</b> question.</i>
<b>naturalize</b>	Alter (an adopted foreign word) so that it conforms more closely to the phonology or orthography of the adopting language. <i>This species of crocus <b>naturalizes</b> itself very easily.</i>

<b><u>nerd</u></b>	A foolish or contemptible person who lacks social skills or is boringly studious. <i>It s my one time of year to really <b>nerd</b> out with my G I Joe collector friends.</i>
<b><u>outcast</u></b>	(of a person) rejected or ostracized. <i>They can be made to feel <b>outcast</b> and inadequate.</i>
<b><u>pariah</u></b>	A person who is rejected (from society or home). <i>The country is becoming an international <b>pariah</b> state.</i>
<b><u>population</u></b>	The extent to which an area is or has been populated. <i>The <b>population</b> seemed to be well fed and clothed.</i>
<b><u>recluse</u></b>	Favouring a solitary life. <i>He s a bit of a <b>recluse</b>.</i>
<b><u>remote</u></b>	A remote control device. <i>He lost the <b>remote</b> for his TV.</i>
<b><u>secluded</u></b>	Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>The gardens are quiet and <b>secluded</b>.</i>
<b><u>solitary</u></b>	(of a bird, mammal, or insect) living alone or in pairs, especially in contrast to related social forms. <i>Tigers are essentially <b>solitary</b>.</i>
<b><u>stranger</u></b>	A person who does not know, or is not known in, a particular place or community. <i>He must have been a <b>stranger</b> to the village.</i>
<b><u>traveler</u></b>	A person who changes location.
<b><u>troglodyte</u></b>	Someone who lives in a cave.
<b><u>unappreciated</u></b>	Not fully understood, recognized, or valued. <i>She had been brought up in a family where she felt <b>unappreciated</b> and undervalued.</i>
<b><u>underdog</u></b>	A person who has little status in society. <i>What is it like to be an <b>underdog</b> in America.</i>
<b><u>unrewarding</u></b>	Not rewarding; not providing personal satisfaction. <i>It was dull <b>unrewarding</b> work.</i>
<b><u>westerner</u></b>	An inhabitant of a western area; especially of the U.S.
