<b>be heavier than</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be superior to</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>cancel out</b>	Make invalid for use.
<b>compensate for</b>	Do or give something to somebody in return.
<b><a href="#">exceed</a></b>	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>This <b>exceeds</b> all my expectations.</i>

<b>have the edge on</b>	Have ownership or possession of.
<b>have the edge over</b>	Be confronted with.
<b>make up for</b>	Create or design, often in a certain way.
<b><u>offset</u></b>	Create an offset in. <b>Offset</b> a wall.
<b>outbalance</b>	Be more valuable, important, or influential than. <i>The advantages far <b>outbalanced</b> the drawbacks.</i>
<b>overbalance</b>	Weigh more heavily. <i>It is not desirable to <b>overbalance</b> the budget.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Ride (a horse) too hard. <i>This commitment should <b>override</b> all other considerations.</i>
<b>preponderate</b>	Be greater in number, influence, or importance. <i>The advantages <b>preponderate</b> over this apparent disadvantage.</i>
<b>prevail over</b>	Be valid, applicable, or true.
<b>redress</b>	Make reparations or amends for. <i>The power to <b>redress</b> the grievances of our citizens.</i>
<b>supersede</b>	Take the place or move into the position of. <i>The older models of car have now been <b>superseded</b>.</i>
<b>take precedence over</b>	Have with oneself; have on one's person.
<b>take priority over</b>	Point or cause to go (blows, weapons, or objects such as photographic equipment) towards.
<b>tip the balance against</b>	Strike lightly.
<b>tip the scales against</b>	Give insider information or advise to.
<b>turn the balance against</b>	Have recourse to or make an appeal or request for help or information to.
<b>turn the scales against</b>	Get by buying and selling.

<b>considerably</b>	By a notably large amount or to a notably large extent; greatly. <i>The house has fallen <b>considerably</b> in value.</i>
<b>cornucopia</b>	A goat's horn filled with grain and flowers and fruit symbolizing prosperity. <i>The festival offers a <b>cornucopia</b> of pleasures.</i>
<b>fertility</b>	The ability to conceive children or young. <i>Improve the soil <b>fertility</b> by adding compost.</i>
<b>greatly</b>	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>They now have <b>greatly</b> increased powers.</i>
<b>heavy</b>	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i>A <b>heavy</b> pudding.</i>
<b>indeed</b>	An expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc. (used as an interjection). <i>Who'd believe it Who <b>indeed</b>.</i>
<b>indubitably</b>	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i><b>Indubitably</b> liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
<b>lot</b>	Divide into lots as of land for example. <i>Nineteen <b>lots</b> failed to sell.</i>
<b>many</b>	The majority of people. <i>The job of government is to help order society in the interests of the <b>many</b> not the few.</i>
<b>markedly</b>	To an extent which is clearly noticeable; significantly. <i>New diagnoses have increased <b>markedly</b> since 1998.</i>
<b>mellowness</b>	A soft shade of a color. <i>A <b>mellowness</b> of light and shade not attainable in marble.</i>

<b>much</b>	Very. <i>Not <b>much</b> rain.</i>
<b>obviously</b>	In a way that is easily perceived or understood; clearly. <i>The answer is <b>obviously</b> wrong.</i>
<b>plentitude</b>	A full supply.
<b>plenty</b>	A full supply. <i>It must have cost <b>plenty</b>.</i>
<b>predominate</b>	Having superior power and influence. <i>Private interest was not allowed to <b>predominate</b> over the public good.</i>
<b>profusion</b>	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>A rich <b>profusion</b> of flowers.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not <b>really</b> my aunt and uncle.</i>
<b>richness</b>	A strong deep vividness of hue. <i>The fire light gave a <b>richness</b> of coloring to that side of the room.</i>
<b>substantially</b>	To a great or significant extent. <i>Profits grew <b>substantially</b>.</i>
<b>surely</b>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>The results are <b>surely</b> encouraging.</i>
<b>very</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other. <i>Those were his <b>very</b> words.</i>
<b>weight</b>	Blocks or discs of metal or other heavy material used in weightlifting or weight training. <i>The balance of power is <b>weighted</b> in favour of the government.</i>
