be superior to	Happen, occur, take place.
cancel out	Make invalid for use.
compensate for	Do or give something to somebody in return.
exceed	Be greater in scope or size than some standard. <i>This exceeds all my expectations.</i>

have the edge on	Have ownership or possession of.
have the edge over	Be confronted with.
make up for	Create or design, often in a certain way.
<u>offset</u>	Create an offset in. Offset a wall.
outbalance	Be more valuable, important, or influential than. <i>The advantages far outbalanced the drawbacks.</i>
overbalance	Weigh more heavily. <i>It is not desirable to overbalance the budget.</i>
<u>override</u>	Ride (a horse) too hard. <i>This commitment should override all other considerations.</i>
preponderate	Be greater in number, influence, or importance. <i>The advantages preponderate over this apparent disadvantage.</i>
prevail over	Be valid, applicable, or true.
redress	Make reparations or amends for. <i>The power to redress the grievances of our citizens.</i>
supersede	Take the place or move into the position of. <i>The older models of car have now been superseded.</i>
take precedence over	Have with oneself; have on one's person.
take priority over	Point or cause to go (blows, weapons, or objects such as photographic equipment) towards.
tip the balance against	Strike lightly.
tip the scales against	Give insider information or advise to.
turn the balance against	Have recourse to or make an appeal or request for help or information to.
turn the scales against	Get by buying and selling.

greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>They now have greatly increased powers.</i>
heavy	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i>A heavy pudding.</i>
indeed	An expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc. (used as an interjection). <i>Who'd believe it Who indeed.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>Indubitably liberalism parades under many guises.</i>
lot	Divide into lots as of land for example. <i>Nineteen lots failed to sell.</i>
many	The majority of people. <i>The job of government is to help order society in the interests of the many not the few.</i>
markedly	To an extent which is clearly noticeable; significantly. <i>New diagnoses have increased markedly since 1998.</i>
mellowness	A soft shade of a color. <i>A mellowness of light and shade not attainable in marble.</i>

much	Very. <i>Not much rain.</i>
obviously	In a way that is easily perceived or understood; clearly. <i>The answer is obviously wrong.</i>
plentitude	A full supply.
plenty	A full supply. <i>It must have cost plenty.</i>
predominate	Having superior power and influence. <i>Private interest was not allowed to predominate over the public good.</i>
profusion	An abundance or large quantity of something. <i>A rich profusion of flowers.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They re not really my aunt and uncle.</i>
richness	A strong deep vividness of hue. <i>The fire light gave a richness of coloring to that side of the room.</i>
substantially	To a great or significant extent. <i>Profits grew substantially.</i>
surely	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>The results are surely encouraging.</i>
very	Being the exact same one; not any other. <i>Those were his very words.</i>
weight	Blocks or discs of metal or other heavy material used in weightlifting or weight training. <i>The balance of power is weighted in favour of the government.</i>
