## Over as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Over" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “over” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having come or been brought to a conclusion.*



## Synonyms of "Over" as an adjective (5 Words)

- all over** Completely given to or absorbed by.
- complete** Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities.  
*A **complete** meal.*
- concluded** Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
- ended** Having come or been brought to a conclusion.  
*The affair is over **ended** finished.*
- terminated** Having come or been brought to a conclusion.  
*The abruptly **terminated** interview.*



## Usage Examples of "Over" as an adjective

- *The affair is over, ended, finished.*



## Over as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Over" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "over" as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Expressing passage or trajectory across an area.*
- *Over the entire area.*
- *Used to express action and result.*
- *Throughout an area.*
- *Used to express repetition of a process.*
- *Beyond the top or upper surface or edge; forward from an upright position.*

- *Throughout a period of time.*
- *In or to the place indicated.*
- *Finished.*
- *Beyond and falling or hanging from a point.*
- *At or to a point across intervening space etc.*



### Synonyms of "Over" as an adverb (4 Words)

**all over** To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

**dead** Quickly and without warning.  
*You re **dead** right.*

**no more** Referring to the degree to which a certain quality is present.

**o'er** Throughout a period of time.



## Usage Examples of "Over" as an adverb

- *Hand the money over.*
- *The match is over.*
- *She ached all over.*
- *Everything was dusted over with a fine layer of soot.*
- *He leant over and tapped me on the hand.*
- *The wallpaper was covered all over with flowers.*
- *The jukebox plays every song twice over.*
- *The car flipped over.*
- *I'm over here.*
- *Stay over the weekend.*
- *She knocked the jug over.*
- *Message understood, over and out.*



## Associations of "Over" (30 Words)

<b><u>absenteeism</u></b>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition; too. <i><b>Also</b> a car is very expensive to run.</i>
<b><u>consumerism</u></b>	A movement advocating greater protection of the interests of consumers. <i>The growth of <b>consumerism</b> has led to many organizations improving their service to the customer.</i>
<b><u>exceedingly</u></b>	To an extreme degree. <i>The supply multiplied <b>exceedingly</b>.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>

<b>excessively</b>	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <b>Excessively</b> high taxes.
<b>exorbitant</b>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <b>Exorbitant</b> rent.
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. Installation will cost about 60 <b>extra</b> .
<b>extravagant</b>	Resulting from or showing a lack of restraint in spending money or resources. It was rather <b>extravagant</b> to buy both.
<b>furthermore</b>	In addition. Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <b>Immoderate</b> laughter.
<b>inordinate</b>	Beyond normal limits. The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.
<b>intemperate</b>	Not mild; subject to extremes. <b>Intemperate</b> zones.
<b>levity</b>	The treatment of a serious matter with humour or lack of due respect. As an attempt to introduce a note of <b>levity</b> the words were a disastrous flop.
<b>outdo</b>	Be or do something to a greater degree. She <b>outdoes</b> all other athletes.
<b>overcome</b>	Overcome usually through no fault or weakness of the person that is overcome. You must <b>overcome</b> all difficulties.
<b>overreach</b>	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. Faustus's lunacy in thinking he can <b>overreach</b> the devil.
<b>pedantry</b>	An ostentatious and inappropriate display of learning. To object to this is not mere <b>pedantry</b> .
<b>prodigal</b>	A person who leaves home to lead a prodigal life but later makes a repentant return. The dessert was <b>prodigal</b> with whipped cream.
<b>profiteer</b>	A person who profiteers. A war <b>profiteer</b> .
<b>prolix</b>	Tediously prolonged or tending to speak or write at great length. Editing a <b>prolix</b> manuscript.



<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>superfluous</b>	Unnecessary, especially through being more than enough. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b>tiredness</b>	The state of wishing for sleep or rest; weariness. <i>Depression and <b>tiredness</b> caused by overwork.</i>
<b>too</b>	To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively. <i>He has a Mercedes <b>too</b>.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Surpass (a person or achievement). <i>This was an issue <b>transcending</b> party politics.</i>
<b>undue</b>	Not appropriate or proper (or even legal) in the circumstances. <i>Accused of using <b>undue</b> force.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Unnecessary things. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
<b>unreasonable</b>	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. <i>An <b>unreasonable</b> request.</i>
<b>weariness</b>	Extreme tiredness; fatigue. <i>He began to feel <b>weariness</b>.</i>
