<b>drop</b>	Let or cause to fall in drops. <i>The light <b>dropped</b> from the ceiling.</i>
<b><u>excuse</u></b>	Excuse overlook or make allowances for be lenient with. <i>Please <b>excuse</b> me from this class.</i>
<b>face</b>	Turn so as to face turn the face in a certain direction. <i>The building <b>faces</b> the park.</i>
<b>fail to notice</b>	Stop operating or functioning.
<b>fail to observe</b>	Be unsuccessful.
<b>fail to see</b>	Be unable.
<b>fail to spot</b>	Fall short in what is expected.
<b><u>forget</u></b>	Forget to do something. <i>Don t <b>forget</b> to call the chairman of the board to the meeting.</i>
<b>forgive</b>	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I ll never <b>forgive</b> David for the way he treated her.</i>
<b>front on to</b>	Be oriented in a certain direction, often with respect to another reference point; be opposite to.
<b>give on to</b>	Contribute to some cause.
<b>give over</b>	Present to view.
<b>gloss over</b>	Provide an interlinear translation of a word or phrase.
<b>have a view of</b>	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.
<b>ignore</b>	Fail to notice. <i>The rules <b>ignore</b> one important principle of cricket.</i>
<b>leave</b>	Leave unchanged or undisturbed or refrain from taking. <i>They <b>leave</b> the impression that they can be bullied.</i>
<b>leave out</b>	Have as a result or residue.
<b>leave undone</b>	Leave unchanged or undisturbed or refrain from taking.
<b>leave unnoticed</b>	Have as a result or residue.
<b>let bygones be bygones</b>	Actively cause something to happen.
<b>let go</b>	Make it possible through a specific action or lack of action for something to happen.
<b>let pass</b>	Consent to, give permission.

<b>overtop</b>	Look down on. <i>None can <b>overtop</b> him in goodness.</i>
<b>pardon</b>	Grant a pardon to. <i>The Thanksgiving turkey was <b>pardoned</b> by the President.</i>
<b>pass over</b>	Pass over across or through.
<b>pay no attention to</b>	Bear (a cost or penalty), in recompense for some action.
<b>pay no heed to</b>	Dedicate.
<b>pretermit</b>	Disregard intentionally or let pass. <i>Some points of conduct we advisedly <b>pretermit</b>.</i>

<b>downplay</b>	Make (something) appear less important than it really is. <i>This report <b>downplays</b> the seriousness of global warming.</i>
<b>except</b>	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are <b>excepted</b> from control.</i>
<b>exclude</b>	Expel (a pupil) from school. <i>The unruly student was <b>excluded</b> from the game.</i>
<b>forget</b>	Forget to do something. <i>For years she had struggled to <b>forget</b> about him.</i>
<b>ignore</b>	Refuse to take notice of or acknowledge; disregard intentionally. <i>The rules <b>ignore</b> one important principle of cricket.</i>
<b>intelligence</b>	A person or being with the ability to acquire and apply knowledge and skills. <i>The chief of military <b>intelligence</b>.</i>
<b>irrelevant</b>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i><b>Irrelevant</b> allegations.</i>
<b>knowledge</b>	True, justified belief; certain understanding, as opposed to opinion. <i>He denied all <b>knowledge</b> of the incidents.</i>
<b>leave</b>	In snooker croquet and other games the position in which a player leaves the balls for the next player. <i>She wants to <b>leave</b>.</i>
<b>memory</b>	An electronic memory device. <i>The module provides 16Mb of <b>memory</b>.</i>
<b>misplace</b>	Place or position wrongly; put in the wrong position. <i>Crewe came back into the game when Strachan <b>misplaced</b> a pass in the midfield.</i>
<b>miss</b>	A form of address for an unmarried woman. <i>She <b>misses</b> all her old friends.</i>

<b><u>neglect</u></b>	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He <b>neglects</b> his children.</i>
<b><u>obscurity</u></b>	The state of being unknown, inconspicuous, or unimportant. <i>He is too good a player to slide into <b>obscurity</b>.</i>
<b><u>omit</u></b>	Prevent from being included or considered or accepted. <i>He was <b>omitted</b> from the second Test.</i>
<b>remember</b>	Recover one's manners after a lapse. <i>Did you <b>remember</b> to post the letters.</i>
<b><u>scoff</u></b>	An expression of scornful derision. <i>Patrick professed to <b>scoff</b> at soppy love scenes in films.</i>
<b>snub</b>	Check the movement of (a horse or boat), especially by a rope wound round a post. <i>She <b>snubbed</b> his proposal.</i>
<b>unabridged</b>	(used of texts) not shortened. <i>An <b>unabridged</b> novel.</i>
