negate Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of.

Get rid of (someone who may be a threat) by killing.

neutralize

She neutralized the solution.

Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out.

nullify

Declare invalid.

Judges were unwilling to nullify government decisions.

judges were unwinning to numity government decisions.

reject The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality.

His body **reject**ed the liver of the donor.

Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove

**remove** something abstract.

Remove a case to another court.

The act of abrogating; an official or legal cancellation.

**repeal**The House voted in favour of **repeal**.

Rejecting or disowning or disclaiming as invalid.

**repudiation** The breach is not so serious as to amount to a **repudiation** of the whole

contract.

rescind Revoke, cancel, or repeal (a law, order, or agreement.

The government eventually **rescind**ed the directive.

(law) the act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return

of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not

rescission been made.

The plaintiff agreed to the **rescission** of the agreement.

Capable of being reversed or used with either side out.

**reversible** The entropy change is zero only in the limiting case of a **reversible** 

process.

revocable Capable of being revoked or cancelled.

A **revocable** settlement.

**revoke** Fail to follow suit when able and required to do so.

He **revoke**d the ban on smoking.

Terminate the employment of discharge from an office or position.

The chain **terminate**d in an iron ball covered with spikes.

Leave behind empty; move out of.

The Justices **vacate**d a ruling by the federal appeals court.

veto A rejection by right of veto.

The president **veto**ed the bill.
