### Synonyms of "Oversee" as a verb (28 Words)

<b>adjudicate</b>	Bring to an end; settle conclusively. <i>The father <b>adjudicated</b> when the sons were quarreling over their inheritance.</i>
<b>administer</b>	Administer or bestow as in small portions. <i>He <b>administered</b> the sacraments to the flock.</i>
<b>be in charge of</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be in control of</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be responsible for</b>	Happen, occur, take place.

<b>chair</b>	Act or preside as chair as of an academic department in a university. <i>The debate was <b>chaired</b> by the Archbishop of York.</i>
<b>command</b>	Be in command of. <i>They <b>command</b> a majority in Parliament.</i>
<b>control</b>	Exercise authoritative control or power over. <i>He was appointed to <b>control</b> the company's marketing strategy.</i>
<b>direct</b>	Give directions to point somebody into a certain direction. <i>Put them all in one packet and <b>direct</b> them to me.</i>
<b>govern</b>	Conduct oneself, especially with regard to controlling one's emotions. <i>His belief in God <b>governs</b> his conduct.</i>
<b>guide</b>	Use as a guide. <i>They had the lights to <b>guide</b> on.</i>
<b>head</b>	Of a lettuce or cabbage form a head. <i>We were <b>headed</b> in the wrong direction.</i>
<b>head up</b>	Be in charge of.
<b>inspect</b>	Come to see in an official or professional capacity. <i>Customs officers came aboard to <b>inspect</b> our documents.</i>
<b>judge</b>	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of. <i>I cannot <b>judge</b> some works of modern art.</i>
<b>keep an eye on</b>	Continue a certain state, condition, or activity.
<b>lead</b>	Lead as in the performance of a composition. <i>There will be specific areas or skills in which other nations <b>lead</b> the world.</i>
<b>look after</b>	Have a certain outward or facial expression.
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>He could not <b>manage</b> 24 March after all.</i>
<b>moderate</b>	(especially in the Presbyterian Church in Scotland) act as a moderator; preside. <i>The dependability of an examining system rests on those who set <b>moderate</b> and mark the papers.</i>
<b>organize</b>	Bring order and organization to. <i>The soul doth <b>organize</b> the body.</i>
<b>preside over</b>	Act as president.
<b>referee</b>	Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. <i>He <b>refereed</b> two of the first round group matches.</i>
<b>rule</b>	Mark or draw with a ruler. <i><b>Rule</b> one's temper.</i>

<b>run</b>	Move about freely and without restraint or act as if running around in an uncontrolled way. <i>Run</i> <b>rogue</b> .
<b>superintend</b>	Watch and direct. He <b>superintended</b> a land reclamation scheme.
<b>supervise</b>	Keep watch over (someone) in the interest of their or others' security. The sergeant left to <b>supervise</b> the loading of the lorries.
<b>umpire</b>	Be a referee or umpire in a sports competition. He <b>umpired</b> the World Cup final.

<b>audit</b>	Conduct a systematic review of. An email log <b>audit</b> .
<b>check</b>	Put a check mark on or near or next to. A <b>check</b> on its dependability under stress.
<b>constable</b>	A police officer of the lowest rank.
<b>controller</b>	A person who directs and restrains. A temperature <b>controller</b> .
<b>director</b>	Member of a board of directors. The sales <b>director</b> .
<b>examiner</b>	A person whose job is to inspect something; an inspector. Exams are marked by external <b>examiners</b> .
<b>foreman</b>	A man who is foreperson of a jury. If you want to leave early you have to ask the <b>foreman</b> .
<b>inspect</b>	Come to see in an official or professional capacity. Please <b>inspect</b> your father s will carefully.
<b>inspector</b>	A police officer ranking below a chief inspector. A prison <b>inspector</b> .
<b>keypad</b>	A miniature keyboard or set of buttons for operating a portable electronic device, telephone, or other equipment.

<b>monitor</b>	Display produced by a device that takes signals and displays them on a television screen or a computer monitor. <i>The deployment of troops went ahead despite the shooting down of an EC <b>monitor</b> s helicopter.</i>
<b><u>overseer</u></b>	A person who supervises others, especially workers.
<b><u>patrol</u></b>	Maintain the security of by carrying out a patrol. <i>Pairs of men were <b>patrolling</b> on each side of the thoroughfare.</i>
<b>proctor</b>	An invigilator at a university or college examination. <i>18 of the faculty reported that graduate assistants frequently <b>proctored</b> exams.</i>
<b><u>reconnaissance</u></b>	Military observation of a region to locate an enemy or ascertain strategic features. <i>Conducting client <b>reconnaissance</b>.</i>
<b><u>screen</u></b>	Project onto a screen for viewing. <i>They put <b>screens</b> in the windows for protection against insects.</i>
<b><u>scrutinize</u></b>	Examine carefully for accuracy with the intent of verification. <i>He <b>scrutinized</b> his likeness in the mirror.</i>
<b>sentinel</b>	Station a soldier or guard by (a place) to keep watch. <i>A <b>sentinel</b> surveillance programme for influenza.</i>
<b>sentry</b>	A soldier stationed to keep guard or to control access to a place. <i>On <b>sentry</b> duty.</i>
<b>sheriff</b>	(in Scotland) a judge.
<b>superintend</b>	Watch and direct. <i>He <b>superintended</b> a land reclamation scheme.</i>
<b>superintendence</b>	The management or arrangement of an activity or organization; supervision. <i>The school was under the <b>superintendence</b> of the nuns of the convent.</i>
<b><u>supervise</u></b>	Keep watch over (someone) in the interest of their or others' security. <i>Nurses were <b>supervised</b> by a consultant psychiatrist.</i>
<b>supervision</b>	The action of supervising someone or something. <i>She let them work without <b>supervision</b>.</i>
<b>supervisory</b>	Of or limited to or involving supervision. <i>The women play a largely <b>supervisory</b> role in the process.</i>
<b>surveillance</b>	Close observation of a person or group (usually by the police). <i>He found himself put under <b>surveillance</b> by British military intelligence.</i>

<b>vigilant</b>	Carefully observant or attentive; on the lookout for possible danger. <i>The <b>vigilant</b> eye of the town watch.</i>
<b><u>watch</u></b>	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>As she <b>watched</b> two women came into the garden.</i>
<b><u>watchdog</u></b>	Monitor (a person, activity, or situation). <i>The consumer <b>watchdog</b> for transport in London.</i>
<b>watchman</b>	A member of a body of people employed to keep watch in a town at night. <i>A night <b>watchman</b>.</i>
