- *A person who directs and manages an organization.*



## Synonyms of "Overseer" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>chargehand</b>	A worker, ranking below a foreman, in charge of others on a particular job.
<b>controller</b>	A mechanism that controls the operation of a machine. <i>A temperature <b>controller</b>.</i>
<b>foreman</b>	(in a law court) a person who presides over a jury and speaks on its behalf. <i>If you want to leave early you have to ask the <b>foreman</b>.</i>
<b>forewoman</b>	(in a law court) a woman who presides over a jury and speaks on its behalf.
<b>line manager</b>	A fortified position (especially one marking the most forward position of troops).
<b>manager</b>	A person responsible for controlling or administering an organization or group of staff. <i>She was a good <b>manager</b> and could make a meal out of nothing.</i>
<b>manageress</b>	A female manager of a shop, restaurant, etc.

- superintendent** (in the US) a high-ranking official, especially the chief of a police department.  
*The **superintendent** registrar.*
- supervisor** A person who directs and oversees the work of a postgraduate research student.
- team leader** Two or more draft animals that work together to pull something.



## Associations of "Overseer" (30 Words)

- accountant** A person whose job is to keep, inspect, and analyse financial accounts.
- administrator** A person who dispenses or administers something.  
*Hospital **administrators**.*
- assistant** A person who ranks below a senior person.  
*My invaluable **assistant**.*
- banker** A financier who owns or is an executive in a bank.  
*The horse should be a **banker** for him in the Members race.*

<b>bookkeeper</b>	Someone who records the transactions of a business. <i>The business had grown enough to justify hiring a <b>bookkeeper</b>.</i>
<b>boss</b>	Excellent; outstanding. <i>That was a real <b>boss</b> move on his part.</i>
<b><u>captain</u></b>	Be the captain of a ship aircraft or sports team. <i>All the boats are <b>captained</b> by professional sailors.</i>
<b>chief</b>	An ordinary consisting of a broad horizontal band across the top of the shield. <i><b>Chief</b> among her concerns is working alone at night.</i>
<b>controller</b>	A person who directs and restrains. <i>The speed <b>controller</b> on his turntable was not working properly.</i>
<b>director</b>	Member of a board of directors. <i>The sales <b>director</b>.</i>
<b><u>employer</u></b>	A person or firm that employs workers. <i>The National Health Service was the largest <b>employer</b> in Europe.</i>
<b>examiner</b>	Someone who administers a test to determine your qualifications. <i>Exams are marked by external <b>examiners</b>.</i>
<b>foreman</b>	A man who is foreperson of a jury. <i>If you want to leave early you have to ask the <b>foreman</b>.</i>
<b>inspector</b>	A police officer ranking below a chief inspector. <i>A prison <b>inspector</b>.</i>
<b>leading</b>	Having the leading position or higher score in a contest. <i>The country's <b>leading</b> poet.</i>
<b>manager</b>	(in the Houses of Parliament and the US Senate) a member of a committee appointed by one house to confer with a similar committee of the other house. <i>She was a good <b>manager</b> and could make a meal out of nothing.</i>
<b>organizer</b>	A person who arranges an event or activity. <i>She was the <b>organizer</b> of the meeting.</i>
<b><u>paramount</u></b>	More important than anything else; supreme. <i>A <b>paramount</b> chief.</i>
<b>potentate</b>	A monarch or ruler, especially an autocratic one.
<b>producer</b>	Something that produces. <i>This microorganism is a <b>producer</b> of disease.</i>
<b>rudderless</b>	Lacking a clear sense of one's aims or principles. <i>Today's leadership is <b>rudderless</b>.</i>

<b><u>scribe</u></b>	A sharp-pointed awl for marking wood or metal to be cut. <i>He <b>scribed</b> a note that he passed to Dan.</i>
<b><u>secretary</u></b>	The principal assistant of a UK government minister or ambassador. <i>She was <b>secretary</b> to David Wilby MP.</i>
<b>storekeeper</b>	A shopkeeper.
<b>superintend</b>	Watch and direct. <i>He <b>superintended</b> a land reclamation scheme.</i>
<b>superintendence</b>	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. <i>The school was under the <b>superintendence</b> of the nuns of the convent.</i>
<b>superintendent</b>	A person who directs and manages an organization. <i>The <b>superintendent</b> registrar.</i>
<b><u>supervise</u></b>	Keep watch over (someone) in the interest of their or others' security. <i>The sergeant left to <b>supervise</b> the loading of the lorries.</i>
<b>supervision</b>	Management by overseeing the performance or operation of a person or group. <i>He was placed under the <b>supervision</b> of a probation officer.</i>
<b>supervisor</b>	A person who supervises a person or an activity.
