<b>eclipse</b>	Cause an eclipse of a celestial body by intervention. <i>The Sun <b>eclipses</b> the moon today.</i>
<b>exceed</b>	Go beyond what is allowed or stipulated by (a set limit). <i>This <b>exceeds</b> all my expectations.</i>
<b>excel</b>	Perform exceptionally well. <i>The keeper <b>excelled</b> himself to keep out an Elliott header.</i>
<b>lead</b>	Lead extend or afford access. <i>They are waiting for an expansion of world trade to <b>lead</b> a recovery.</i>
<b>mantle</b>	Spread over a surface like a mantle. <i>A warm pink mounted to the girl s cheeks and <b>mantled</b> her brow.</i>
<b>mar</b>	Make imperfect. <i>Nothing <b>marred</b> her beauty.</i>
<b>mask</b>	Cover the face with a mask. <i>He <b>masked</b> his disappointment.</i>
<b>obliterate</b>	Remove completely from recognition or memory. <i>The memory was so painful that he <b>obliterated</b> it from his mind.</i>
<b>obscure</b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The stars are <b>obscured</b> by the clouds.</i>
<b>outclass</b>	Be far superior to. <i>The Yankees <b>outclassed</b> Cincinnati.</i>
<b>outdistance</b>	Leave (a competitor or pursuer) far behind. <i>She could maintain a fast enough pace to <b>outdistance</b> any pursuers.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Be superior to in action or performance. <i>The men tried to <b>outdo</b> each other in their generosity.</i>
<b>outshine</b>	Be much better than (someone) in a particular area. <i>A supernova would <b>outshine</b> all the other stars in its galaxy.</i>
<b>outstrip</b>	Move faster than and overtake (someone else). <i>Supply far <b>outstripped</b> demand.</i>
<b>put in the shade</b>	Make an investment.

<b>put to shame</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b>ruin</b>	Reduce to ruins. <i>The castle was <b>ruined</b> when dynamite was used to demolish one of the corner towers.</i>
<b>screen</b>	Separate something from something else with or as if with a screen. <i>Her hair swung across to <b>screen</b> her face.</i>
<b>shade</b>	Represent the effect of shade or shadow on. <i>The Welsh side <b>shaded</b> a tight tough first half.</i>
<b>shadow</b>	Cast a shadow over. <i>A hood <b>shadowed</b> her face.</i>
<b>shame</b>	Cause to be ashamed. <i>I tried to <b>shame</b> him into giving some away.</i>
<b>shroud</b>	Wrap in a shroud. <i><b>Shroud</b> the corpses.</i>
<b>spoil</b>	Treat with excessive indulgence. <i>She was afraid of <b>spoiling</b> Christmas for the rest of the family.</i>
<b>surpass</b>	Exceed; be greater than. <i>Her performance <b>surpasses</b> that of any other student I know.</i>
<b>take the edge off</b>	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
<b>take the pleasure out of</b>	Accept or undergo, often unwillingly.
<b>top</b>	Reach or ascend the top of. <i>Toast <b>topped</b> with baked beans.</i>
<b>tower above</b>	Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.
<b>tower over</b>	Appear very large or occupy a commanding position.
<b>transcend</b>	Surpass (a person or achievement). <i>This was an issue <b>transcending</b> party politics.</i>

<b>lunar</b>	Of or relating to or associated with the moon. <i>A <b>lunar</b> eclipse.</i>
<b>meteorite</b>	A piece of rock or metal that has fallen to the earth's surface from outer space as a meteor. Over 90 per cent of meteorites are of rock while the remainder consist wholly or partly of iron and nickel.
<b>moon</b>	The period between successive new moons 29 531 days. <i>That wonderful night four <b>moons</b> ago.</i>
<b>nebula</b>	A cloud of gas and dust in outer space, visible in the night sky either as an indistinct bright patch or as a dark silhouette against other luminous matter.
<b>neptune</b>	A giant planet with a ring of ice particles; the 8th planet from the sun is the most remote of the gas giants.
<b>noon</b>	Twelve o'clock in the day; midday. <i>The service starts at twelve <b>noon</b>.</i>
<b>obfuscate</b>	Make obscure, unclear, or unintelligible. <i>The new rule is more likely to <b>obfuscate</b> people than enlighten them.</i>

<b>planetary</b>	Having no fixed course. <i>Neither national nor continental but <b>planetary</b>.</i>

<b>shadowy</b>	Insubstantial; unreal. <i>We sat on rocks in a <b>shadowy</b> cove.</i>
