huge	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>Huge country estates.</i>
immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>Immense numbers of birds.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
irrefutable	Impossible to deny or disprove. <i>An irrefutable argument.</i>
irrepressible	Impossible to repress or control. <i>An irrepressible rogue.</i>
<u>irresistible</u>	Impossible to resist; overpowering. <i>He found the delicious looking cakes irresistible.</i>
massive	Consisting of great mass; containing a great quantity of matter. <i>A massive limestone without bedding planes.</i>
<u>oppressive</u>	Inflicting harsh and authoritarian treatment. <i>The oppressive government.</i>
overpowering	So strong as to be irresistible. <i>An overpowering need for solitude.</i>
prodigious	Of momentous or ominous significance. <i>Her memory was prodigious.</i>
profound	Showing intellectual penetration or emotional depth. <i>A profound silence.</i>
<u>profuse</u>	(especially of something offered or discharged) very plentiful; abundant. <i>They are profuse in hospitality.</i>
shattering	Very shocking or upsetting. <i>The shattering tones of the enormous carillon.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The amount of money required was staggering.</i>
stupendous	Extremely impressive. <i>A stupendous field of grass.</i>
<u>sweeping</u>	(of a statement) taking no account of particular cases or exceptions; too general. <i>A sweeping assertion.</i>
<u>unbearable</u>	Not able to be endured or tolerated. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
<u>uncontrollable</u>	Impossible to repress or control. <i>Uncontrollable laughter.</i>

unutterable	Too great or awful to describe. <i>Unutterable consonant clusters.</i>
very large	Being the exact same one; not any other.
very strong	Being the exact same one; not any other.

bulk	The property possessed by a large mass. <i>The parcel bulked in the sack.</i>
bulky	Taking up much space; large and unwieldy. <i>A bulky overcoat clad figure.</i>
dominance	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>Some plants produce structures to outcompete other species for dominance in a given habitat.</i>
enormous	Very large in size, quantity, or extent. <i>The possibilities are enormous.</i>
expanded	Increased in extent or size or bulk or scope. <i>The expanded fins of the ray.</i>

<u>gigantic</u>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A gigantic concrete tower.</i>
gladness	Experiencing joy and pleasure.
hulking	(of a person or object) very large, heavy, or clumsy. <i>A hulking figure of a man.</i>
incalculable	Not able to be computed or enumerated. <i>The odds against such an event are incalculable.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>An intense young woman passionate about her art.</i>
<u>irresistible</u>	Overpoweringly attractive. <i>What happens when an irresistible force meets an immovable object.</i>
large	A garment size for a large person. <i>The concert attracted large crowds.</i>
lot	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>They were an angry lot.</i>
<u>majority</u>	The age at which persons are considered competent to manage their own affairs. <i>Labour retained the seat with a majority of 9 830.</i>
massive	Being the same substance throughout. <i>A massive limestone without bedding planes.</i>
<u>most</u>	Almost. <i>A most welcome relief.</i>
much	(degree adverb used before a noun phrase) for all practical purposes but not completely. <i>Much grain is in storage.</i>
personage	A character in a play or other work. <i>It was no less a personage than the bishop.</i>
preeminence	High status importance owing to marked superiority.
preponderance	The quality or fact of being greater in number, quantity, or importance. <i>The preponderance of women among older people.</i>
prodigious	Of momentous or ominous significance. <i>A prodigious storm.</i>
<u>tremendous</u>	Inspiring awe or dread. <i>Penny put in a tremendous amount of time.</i>

triumvirate	(in ancient Rome) a group of three men holding power, in particular (the First Triumvirate) the unofficial coalition of Julius Caesar, Pompey, and Crassus in 60 BC and (the Second Triumvirate) a coalition formed by Antony, Lepidus, and Octavian in 43 BC. <i>A triumvirate of three executive vice presidents.</i>
untold	(of a story or event) not narrated or recounted. <i>No event however boring is left untold.</i>
unusually	To a remarkable or unusual extent; exceptionally. <i>The name is spelt unusually.</i>
unwieldy	Difficult to use or handle or manage because of size or weight or shape. <i>Heaved his unwieldy figure out of his chair.</i>
upstream	In the direction against a stream's current. <i>A lone motor cruiser rumbled upstream.</i>
vast	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>The vast reaches of outer space.</i>
voluminous	Marked by repeated turns and bends. <i>A voluminous purple cloak.</i>
