Associations of "Own accord" (30 Words)

| accede | Agree to a demand, request, or treaty. <i>By now John had died and Henry III had acceded.</i> |
| accept | Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>The Irish never accepted him as one of them.</i> |
| acceptance | A draft or bill of exchange that is accepted by being signed. <i>Her acceptance of the gift encouraged him.</i> |
| admissible | Having the right to be admitted to a place. <i>Foreigners were admissible only as temporary workers.</i> |
| admittedly | Used to express a concession or recognition that something is the case. <i>Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.</i> |
| agree | Show grammatical agreement. <i>I don t agree with random drugs testing in schools.</i> |
| approbation | Approval or praise. <i>A term of approbation.</i> |
| approval | A message expressing a favorable opinion. <i>The road schemes have been given approval.</i> |
| approve | Officially agree to or accept as satisfactory. <i>I don t approve of romance.</i> |
| assent | Express approval or agreement. <i>A loud murmur of assent.</i> |
| coincide | Happen simultaneously. <i>Our views on this matter coincided.</i> |
| concession | A commercial operation set up by agreement within the premises of a larger concern. <i>He got the beer concession at the ball park.</i> |
| concur | Be of the same opinion; agree. <i>We strongly concur with this recommendation.</i> |

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| <u>conform</u> | Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>The kitchen does not conform to hygiene regulations.</i> |
| conformance | Correspondence in form or appearance. <i>Conformance testing.</i> |
| conforming | Adhering to established customs or doctrines (especially in religion). |
| <u>consent</u> | Give permission for something to happen. <i>He indicated his consent.</i> |
| <u>correspond</u> | Be equivalent or parallel, in mathematics. <i>The rank of Feldwebel in the German forces nominally corresponded to the British rank of sergeant.</i> |
| have | Have ownership or possession of. <i>You don't have to accept this situation.</i> |
| <u>let</u> | Grant use or occupation of under a term of contract. <i>Let A and B stand for X and Y respectively.</i> |
| <u>necessarily</u> | In such a manner as could not be otherwise. <i>It is necessarily so.</i> |
| permission | Approval to do something. <i>He received permission to go to Brussels.</i> |
| ratification | Making something valid by formally ratifying or confirming it. <i>Ratification of the treaty raised problems in several member states.</i> |
| ratify | Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i> |
| receive | Receive a specified treatment abstract. <i>Her new collection of poems was not well received.</i> |
| receptiveness | Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>He was testing the government's receptiveness to reform.</i> |
| resignedly | In a hopeless resigned manner. |
| sanction | Give sanction to. <i>A range of sanctions aimed at deterring insider abuse.</i> |
| take | Occupy or take on. <i>The nurse takes my blood pressure.</i> |
| <u>treaty</u> | A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i> |
