incongruity

The state of being incongruous; incompatibility.

The **incongruity** of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.

An inconsistent aspect or element.

inconsistency The **inconsistency** between his expressed attitudes and his

actual behaviour.

self-contradiction Contradicting yourself.

Associations of "Oxymoron" (30 Words)

The state of having mixed feelings or contradictory ideas about something

ambivalence or someone.

antagonistic Indicating opposition or resistance.

contradiction (logic) a statement that is necessarily false.

The experiment provides a **contradiction** of the hypothesis.

contradictory A contradictory proposition.

Contradictory attributes of unjust justice and loving vindictiveness.

Contrary A contrary proposition.

The facts point to a **contrary** conclusion.

A person or thing having the same function or characteristics as another.

The minister held talks with his French counterpart.

An inclination to guestion whether something will happen or whether it is

cynicism worthwhile; pessimism.

Cynicism about the future.

(of a matched pair of subjects, especially twins) not having the same trait

or disease.

discordant

The operative principle of democracy is a balance of discordant

qualities.



Characterized by an illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or

discrepant similarity.

Widely **discrepant** statements.

State of being disconnected.

disjunction There is a **disjunction** between the skills taught in education and those

demanded in the labour market.

dissonant Characterized by musical dissonance; harmonically unresolved.

Jackson employs both harmonious and dissonant colour choices.

incompatibility The quality of being unable to exist or work in congenial combination.

Defects due to software **incompatibility**.

Incapable of being used with or connected to other devices or

incompatible components without modification.

Long hours are simply **incompatible** with family life.

Not in harmony or keeping with the surroundings or other aspects of

<u>incongruous</u> something.

ironic

Incongruous behavior.

An inconsistent aspect or element.

inconsistency The **inconsistency** between his expressed attitudes and his actual

behaviour.

inconsistent Not capable of being made consistent or harmonious.

Inconsistent with the roadmap.

inharmonious Lacking in harmony of parts.

An **inharmonious** negative state of mind.

inhospitable (of a person) unfriendly and unwelcoming towards people.

They are extremely **inhospitable** these days.

Happening in a way contrary to what is expected, and typically causing

wry amusement because of this.

An **ironic** novel.

A literary technique, originally used in Greek tragedy, by which the full

significance of a character's words or actions is clear to the audience or

reader although unknown to the character.

Irony is wasted on the stupid.

opposing (of two or more subjects) differing from or in conflict with each other.

On the **opposing** page there were two addresses.

paradox (logic) a statement that contradicts itself.

I always lie is a **paradox** because if it is true it must be false.

paradoxicalSeemingly contradictory but nonetheless possibly true.

It is **paradoxical** that standing is more tiring than walking.



Witty language used to convey insults or scorn-Jonathan Swif. sarcasm

She didn't like the note of **sarcasm** in his voice.

A genre of literature characterized by the use of satire. satire

A number of articles on Elizabethan satire.

A statement that is true by necessity or by virtue of its logical form. tautology

The statement he is brave or he is not brave is a **tautology**.

Not easy to combine harmoniously. unsuited

He was totally **unsuited** for the job.
