Concurrence of opinion.

agreement

The condition of having the same number, gender, case, and/or person as another word.

*They had an **agreement** that they would not interfere in each other's business.*

arrangement

The act of arranging and adapting a piece of music.

*Mozart's symphonies in **arrangements** for cello and piano.*

bargain

An advantageous purchase.

***Bargains** between political parties supporting the government.*

| <u>compact</u> | <p>Something that is a small and conveniently shaped example of its kind in particular a compact camera.</p> <p><i>A wide selection of films is available for your 35 mm compact.</i></p> |
| <u>concord</u> | <p>Capital of the state of New Hampshire; located in south central New Hampshire on the Merrimack river.</p> <p><i>A pact of peace and concord.</i></p> |
| concordat | <p>An agreement or treaty, especially one between the Vatican and a secular government relating to matters of mutual interest.</p> <p><i>Napoleon I s concordat with the papacy.</i></p> |
| contract | <p>Contract bridge the highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make.</p> <p><i>South can make the contract with correct play.</i></p> |
| <u>convention</u> | <p>Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional.</p> <p><i>Political convention.</i></p> |
| <u>covenant</u> | <p>An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David.</p> <p><i>There was a covenant between them that her name was never to be mentioned.</i></p> |
| deal | <p>The set of hands dealt to the players.</p> <p><i>After the deal players A and B stay out.</i></p> |
| entente | <p>An informal alliance between countries.</p> <p><i>The emperor hoped to bring about an entente with Russia.</i></p> |
| <u>obligation</u> | <p>An act or course of action to which a person is morally or legally bound; a duty or commitment.</p> <p><i>He is under an obligation to finish the job.</i></p> |
| protocol | <p>Code of correct conduct.</p> <p><i>Academic protocol.</i></p> |
| settlement | <p>The property given under a settlement.</p> <p><i>Most suppliers will offer early settlement discounts.</i></p> |
| <u>treaty</u> | <p>A written agreement between two states or sovereigns.</p> <p><i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i></p> |
| understanding | <p>The ability to understand something; comprehension.</p> <p><i>He wrote with understanding and affection of the people of Dent.</i></p> |

| <u>accord</u> | Concurrence of opinion. <i>His views accorded well with those of Merivale.</i> |
| agreement | The condition of having the same number, gender, case, and/or person as another word. <i>The governments failed to reach agreement.</i> |
| <u>allegiance</u> | The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>A complex pattern of cross party allegiances.</i> |
| approve | Officially agree to or accept as satisfactory. <i>He approved himself ripe for military command.</i> |
| betroth | Give to in marriage. <i>In no time I shall be betrothed to Isabel.</i> |
| <u>commitment</u> | The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>His long commitment to public service.</i> |
| concordat | A signed written agreement between two or more parties (nations) to perform some action. <i>Napoleon I s concordat with the papacy.</i> |
| concur | Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>That s right the chairman concurred.</i> |
| contract | The highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>Exhale and slowly contract your abdominal muscles.</i> |
| <u>covenant</u> | Enter into a covenant or formal agreement. <i>The nations covenanted to fight terrorism around the world.</i> |
| faithfulness | The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i> |
| fealty | Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed fealty to the Earl rather than the King.</i> |
| fidelity | The degree of exactness with which something is copied or reproduced. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i> |
| <u>fulfillment</u> | A feeling of satisfaction at having achieved your desires. |
| <u>manifesto</u> | A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>A manifesto for gay liberation.</i> |

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| negotiation | The action or process of transferring legal ownership of a document. <i>The buyout negotiation lasted several days.</i> |
| oath | A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of oaths.</i> |
| perforce | Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i> |
| permission | The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i>Permissions to reproduce copyright material.</i> |
| pledge | Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I pledged 10 a month to my favorite radio station.</i> |
| promise | Make a promise or commitment. <i>It promised to be a night that all would remember.</i> |
| ratification | Making something valid by formally ratifying or confirming it. <i>The ratification of the treaty.</i> |
| ratify | Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i> |
| renege | Renounce or abandon. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t renege him.</i> |
| salutation | A gesture or utterance made as a greeting or acknowledgement of another's arrival or departure. <i>We would not expect a love letter to include a formal address and salutation.</i> |
| sanction | Give sanction to. <i>Foreigners in France illegally should be sent home their employers sanctioned and border controls tightened up.</i> |
| stipulate | Make an oral contract or agreement in the verbal form of question and answer that is necessary to give it legal force. <i>The will stipulates that she can live in the house for the rest of her life.</i> |
| terms | Status with respect to the relations between people or groups. <i>He got his new car on excellent terms.</i> |
| treaty | A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i> |
| troth | A solemn pledge of fidelity. <i>A token of troth.</i> |
