## Synonyms of "Pact" as a noun (18 Words)

### accord

Concurrence of opinion.

*The government and the rebels are in **accord** on one point.*

### **agreement**

The condition of having the same number, gender, case, and/or person as another word.

*They had an **agreement** that they would not interfere in each other's business.*

### **arrangement**

The act of arranging and adapting a piece of music.

*Mozart's symphonies in **arrangements** for cello and piano.*

### bargain

An advantageous purchase.

***Bargains** between political parties supporting the government.*

<b>bond</b>	Criminal law money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>Each carbon atom uses three electrons to form <b>bonds</b> with the adjacent atoms.</i>
<b>compact</b>	Something that is a small and conveniently shaped example of its kind in particular a compact camera. <i>A wide selection of films is available for your 35 mm <b>compact</b>.</i>
<b>concord</b>	Capital of the state of New Hampshire; located in south central New Hampshire on the Merrimack river. <i>A pact of peace and <b>concord</b>.</i>
<b>concordat</b>	An agreement or treaty, especially one between the Vatican and a secular government relating to matters of mutual interest. <i>Napoleon I s <b>concordat</b> with the papacy.</i>
<b>contract</b>	Contract bridge the highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>South can make the <b>contract</b> with correct play.</i>
<b>convention</b>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>Political <b>convention</b>.</i>
<b>covenant</b>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>There was a <b>covenant</b> between them that her name was never to be mentioned.</i>
<b>deal</b>	The set of hands dealt to the players. <i>After the <b>deal</b> players A and B stay out.</i>
<b>entente</b>	An informal alliance between countries. <i>The emperor hoped to bring about an <b>entente</b> with Russia.</i>
<b>obligation</b>	An act or course of action to which a person is morally or legally bound; a duty or commitment. <i>He is under an <b>obligation</b> to finish the job.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	Code of correct conduct. <i>Academic <b>protocol</b>.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The property given under a settlement. <i>Most suppliers will offer early <b>settlement</b> discounts.</i>
<b>treaty</b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>understanding</b>	The ability to understand something; comprehension. <i>He wrote with <b>understanding</b> and affection of the people of Dent.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Pact" as a noun

- *The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.*



## Associations of "Pact" (30 Words)

<b><u>accord</u></b>	Concurrence of opinion. <i>His views <b>accorded</b> well with those of Merivale.</i>
<b>agreement</b>	The condition of having the same number, gender, case, and/or person as another word. <i>The governments failed to reach <b>agreement</b>.</i>
<b><u>allegiance</u></b>	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>A complex pattern of cross party <b>allegiances</b>.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Officially agree to or accept as satisfactory. <i>He <b>approved</b> himself ripe for military command.</i>
<b>betroth</b>	Give to in marriage. <i>In no time I shall be <b>betrothed</b> to Isabel.</i>
<b><u>commitment</u></b>	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>His long <b>commitment</b> to public service.</i>
<b>concordat</b>	A signed written agreement between two or more parties (nations) to perform some action. <i>Napoleon I s <b>concordat</b> with the papacy.</i>
<b>concur</b>	Happen or occur at the same time; coincide. <i>That s right the chairman <b>concurred</b>.</i>
<b>contract</b>	The highest bid becomes the contract setting the number of tricks that the bidder must make. <i>Exhale and slowly <b>contract</b> your abdominal muscles.</i>
<b><u>covenant</u></b>	Enter into a covenant or formal agreement. <i>The nations <b>covenanted</b> to fight terrorism around the world.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fealty</b>	Formal acknowledgement of loyalty to a lord. <i>They owed <b>fealty</b> to the Earl rather than the King.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	The degree of exactness with which something is copied or reproduced. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b>.</i>
<b><u>fulfillment</u></b>	A feeling of satisfaction at having achieved your desires.
<b><u>manifesto</u></b>	A public declaration of policy and aims, especially one issued before an election by a political party or candidate. <i>A <b>manifesto</b> for gay liberation.</i>

<b>negotiation</b>	The action or process of transferring legal ownership of a document. <i>The buyout <b>negotiation</b> lasted several days.</i>
<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of <b>oaths</b>.</i>
<b>perforce</b>	Used to express necessity or inevitability. <i>Amateurs <b>perforce</b> have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<b>permission</b>	The act of giving a formal (usually written) authorization. <i><b>Permissions</b> to reproduce copyright material.</i>
<b>pledge</b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I <b>pledged</b> 10 a month to my favorite radio station.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Make a promise or commitment. <i>It <b>promised</b> to be a night that all would remember.</i>
<b>ratification</b>	Making something valid by formally ratifying or confirming it. <i>The <b>ratification</b> of the treaty.</i>
<b>ratify</b>	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to <b>ratify</b> the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
<b>renege</b>	Renounce or abandon. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t <b>renege</b> him.</i>
<b>salutation</b>	A gesture or utterance made as a greeting or acknowledgement of another's arrival or departure. <i>We would not expect a love letter to include a formal address and <b>salutation</b>.</i>
<b>sanction</b>	Give sanction to. <i>Foreigners in France illegally should be sent home their employers <b>sanctioned</b> and border controls tightened up.</i>
<b>stipulate</b>	Make an oral contract or agreement in the verbal form of question and answer that is necessary to give it legal force. <i>The will <b>stipulates</b> that she can live in the house for the rest of her life.</i>
<b>terms</b>	Status with respect to the relations between people or groups. <i>He got his new car on excellent <b>terms</b>.</i>
<b>treaty</b>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>troth</b>	A solemn pledge of fidelity. <i>A token of <b>troth</b>.</i>
