## **Paid as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Paid" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “paid” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person in a specified occupation) in receipt of pay.*
- *Marked by the reception of pay.*
- *(of work or leave) for or during which one receives pay.*
- *Involving gainful employment in something often done as a hobby.*
- *Yielding a fair profit.*



### Synonyms of "Paid" as an adjective (3 Words)

- gainful** Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit.  
*He soon found **gainful** employment.*
- nonrecreational** Involving gainful employment in something often done as a hobby.
- paying** For which money is paid.  
*A **paying** job.*

## Associations of "Paid" (30 Words)

<b>alimony</b>	Financial support that a person is ordered by a court to give to their spouse during separation or following divorce; maintenance. <i>He is said to have paid 300 000 <b>alimony</b> to his first wife.</i>
<b>benefit</b>	Derive a benefit from. <i>Part time jobs supplemented by means tested <b>benefits</b>.</i>
<b>bonus</b>	Anything that tends to arouse. <i>Good weather is an added <b>bonus</b> but the real appeal is the landscape.</i>
<b>cash</b>	Exchange for cash. <i>She was always short of <b>cash</b>.</i>
<b>compensation</b>	The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>Getting older has some <b>compensations</b>.</i>
<b>debt</b>	A feeling of gratitude for a service or favour. <i>The firm is heavily in <b>debt</b>.</i>

<b>earnings</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>He claimed damages for loss of <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>gainful</b>	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found <b>gainful</b> employment.</i>
<b>lucrative</b>	Producing a great deal of profit. <i>A <b>lucrative</b> career as a stand up comedian.</i>
<b>meed</b>	A person's deserved share of praise, honour, etc. <i>He must extract from her some <b>meed</b> of approbation.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Give (someone) money that is due for work done, goods received, or a debt incurred. <i>The destroyer responsible for these atrocities would have to <b>pay</b> with his life.</i>
<b>paying</b>	Yielding a fair profit. <i>A <b>paying</b> job.</i>
<b>payment</b>	An amount paid or payable. <i>Ask for a discount for <b>payment</b> by cash.</i>
<b>payoff</b>	The final payment of a debt.
<b>perquisite</b>	A thing which has served its primary use and to which a subordinate or employee has a customary right. <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
<b>premium</b>	A prize, bonus, or award given as an inducement to purchase products, enter competitions initiated by business interests, etc. <i><b>Premium</b> gasoline at a <b>premium</b> price.</i>
<b>profitable</b>	(of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>He d had a <b>profitable</b> day.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	Make amends to (someone) for loss or harm suffered; compensate. <i>I will <b>recompense</b> their iniquity.</i>
<b>refund</b>	Pay back (money), typically to a customer who is not satisfied with goods or services bought. <i>You may be allowed to claim a <b>refund</b> of the tax.</i>
<b>remunerate</b>	Make payment to; compensate. <i>My efforts were not <b>remunerated</b>.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<b>remunerative</b>	For which money is paid. <i>Since June 2003 he has not had any <b>remunerative</b> employment.</i>

<b><u>repay</u></b>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>The manager has given me another chance and I m desperate to <b>repay</b> that faith.</i>
<b>requite</b>	Make appropriate return for (a favour, service, or wrongdoing). <i>To win enough to <b>requite</b> my friends.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>He s reaping the <b>rewards</b> of his hard work and perseverance.</i>
<b><u>salary</u></b>	Pay a salary to. <i>He received a <b>salary</b> of 24 000.</i>
<b>sinecure</b>	A benefice to which no spiritual or pastoral duties are attached. <i>Political <b>sinecures</b> for the supporters of ministers.</i>
<b>unpaid</b>	(of a debt) not yet discharged by payment. <i><b>Unpaid</b> bills.</i>
<b>wage</b>	Carry on (a war or campaign). <i>It is necessary to destroy their capacity to <b>wage</b> war.</i>
<b><u>wages</u></b>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The <b>wages</b> of sin is death.</i>
