Definitions of "Paid" as an adjective

- (of a person in a specified occupation) in receipt of pay.
- *Marked by the reception of pay.*
- (of work or leave) for or during which one receives pay.
- Involving gainful employment in something often done as a hobby.
- Yielding a fair profit.






Synonyms of "Paid" as an adjective (3 Words)

gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
nonrecreational	Involving gainful employment in something often done as a hobby.
navana	For which money is paid. A paying job.

Associations of "Paid" (30 Words)

alimony	Financial support that a person is ordered by a court to give to their spouse during separation or following divorce; maintenance. <i>He is said to have paid 300 000 alimony to his first wife.</i>
benefit	Derive a benefit from. Part time jobs supplemented by means tested benefit s.
bonus	Anything that tends to arouse. Good weather is an added bonus but the real appeal is the landscape.
<u>cash</u>	Exchange for cash. She was always short of cash .
compensation	The action or process of awarding compensation. Getting older has some compensation s.
<u>debt</u>	A feeling of gratitude for a service or favour. <i>The firm is heavily in debt.</i>



earnings	Something that remunerates. <i>He claimed damages for loss of earnings.</i>
gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
<u>lucrative</u>	Producing a great deal of profit. A lucrative career as a stand up comedian.
meed	A person's deserved share of praise, honour, etc. <i>He must extract from her some meed of approbation.</i>
pay	Give (someone) money that is due for work done, goods received, or a debt incurred. <i>The destroyer responsible for these atrocities would have to</i> pay <i>with his</i> <i>life.</i>
paying	Yielding a fair profit. A paying job.
payment	An amount paid or payable. Ask for a discount for payment by cash.
<u>payoff</u>	The final payment of a debt.
perquisite	A thing which has served its primary use and to which a subordinate or employee has a customary right. <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
premium	A prize, bonus, or award given as an inducement to purchase products, enter competitions initiated by business interests, etc. Premium gasoline at a premium price.
<u>profitable</u>	(of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>He d had a profitable day.</i>
recompense	Make amends to (someone) for loss or harm suffered; compensate. I will recompense their iniquity.
refund	Pay back (money), typically to a customer who is not satisfied with goods or services bought. You may be allowed to claim a refund of the tax.
remunerate	Make payment to; compensate. My efforts were not remunerate d.
remuneration	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>Adequate</i> remuneration for his work.
remunerative	For which money is paid. Since June 2003 he has not had any remunerative employment.



<u>repay</u>	Make repayment for or return something. The manager has given me another chance and I m desperate to repay that faith.
requite	Make appropriate return for (a favour, service, or wrongdoing. <i>To win enough to requite my friends</i> .
reward	Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>He s reaping the rewards of his hard work and perseverance.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>He received a salary of 24 000.</i>
sinecure	A benefice to which no spiritual or pastoral duties are attached. Political sinecure s for the supporters of ministers.
unpaid	(of a debt) not yet discharged by payment. Unpaid bills.
wage	Carry on (a war or campaign. It is necessary to destroy their capacity to wage war.
<u>wages</u>	A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i>
