Definitions of "Paid" as an adjective


According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “paid” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person in a specified occupation) in receipt of pay.*
- *Marked by the reception of pay.*
- *(of work or leave) for or during which one receives pay.*
- *Involving gainful employment in something often done as a hobby.*
- *Yielding a fair profit.*

| bonus | Anything that tends to arouse. <i>Good weather is an added bonus but the real appeal is the landscape.</i> |
| <u>cash</u> | Exchange for cash. <i>She was always short of cash.</i> |
| compensation | The action or process of awarding compensation. <i>Getting older has some compensations.</i> |
| <u>debt</u> | A feeling of gratitude for a service or favour. <i>The firm is heavily in debt.</i> |

| lucrative | Producing a great deal of profit. <i>A lucrative career as a stand up comedian.</i> |
| meed | A person's deserved share of praise, honour, etc. <i>He must extract from her some meed of approbation.</i> |
| pay | Give (someone) money that is due for work done, goods received, or a debt incurred. <i>The destroyer responsible for these atrocities would have to pay with his life.</i> |
| paying | Yielding a fair profit. <i>A paying job.</i> |
| payment | An amount paid or payable. <i>Ask for a discount for payment by cash.</i> |
| payoff | The final payment of a debt. |
| perquisite | A thing which has served its primary use and to which a subordinate or employee has a customary right. <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i> |
| premium | A prize, bonus, or award given as an inducement to purchase products, enter competitions initiated by business interests, etc. <i>Premium gasoline at a premium price.</i> |
| profitable | (of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>He d had a profitable day.</i> |
| recompense | Make amends to (someone) for loss or harm suffered; compensate. <i>I will recompense their iniquity.</i> |
| refund | Pay back (money), typically to a customer who is not satisfied with goods or services bought. <i>You may be allowed to claim a refund of the tax.</i> |
| remunerate | Make payment to; compensate. <i>My efforts were not remunerated.</i> |
| remuneration | The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>Adequate remuneration for his work.</i> |
| remunerative | For which money is paid. <i>Since June 2003 he has not had any remunerative employment.</i> |

| repay | Make repayment for or return something. <i>The manager has given me another chance and I m desperate to repay that faith.</i> |
| requite | Make appropriate return for (a favour, service, or wrongdoing). <i>To win enough to requite my friends.</i> |
| reward | Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>He s reaping the rewards of his hard work and perseverance.</i> |
| salary | Pay a salary to. <i>He received a salary of 24 000.</i> |
| sinecure | A benefice to which no spiritual or pastoral duties are attached. <i>Political sinecures for the supporters of ministers.</i> |
| unpaid | (of a debt) not yet discharged by payment. <i>Unpaid bills.</i> |
| wage | Carry on (a war or campaign). <i>It is necessary to destroy their capacity to wage war.</i> |
| wages | A recompense for worthy acts or retribution for wrongdoing. <i>The wages of sin is death.</i> |
