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| alike | (of two or more people or things) similar to each other. <i>Friends are generally alike in background and taste.</i> |
| all of a piece | Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class. |
| analogous | Comparable in certain respects, typically in a way which makes clearer the nature of the things compared. <i>They saw the relationship between a ruler and his subjects as analogous to that of father and children.</i> |
| comparable | Able to be likened to another; similar. <i>The situation in Holland is comparable to that in England.</i> |
| complementary | Relating to complementary medicine. <i>A pair of complementary oligonucleotides were synthesized.</i> |
| concordant | Being of the same opinion. <i>The answers were roughly concordant.</i> |
| congruent | Corresponding in character or kind. <i>Institutional and departmental objectives are very largely congruent.</i> |
| consonant | Denoting or relating to a consonant. <i>A consonant phoneme.</i> |

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| coordinating | Serving to connect two grammatical constituents of identical construction. <i>And in John and Mary or in John walked and Mary rode is a coordinating conjunction and so is or in will you go or stay.</i> |
| correlative | Having a mutual relationship; corresponding. Correlative conjunctions. |
| corresponding | Analogous or equivalent in character, form, or function; comparable. <i>All rights carry with them corresponding responsibilities.</i> |
| coupled | (of two electrical components) connected through electromagnetic induction, electrostatic charge, or an optical link. <i>A locomotive with six coupled wheels.</i> |
| double | Designed to be used by two people. <i>Duple or double time consists of two or a multiple of two beats to a measure.</i> |
| <u>duplicate</u> | Having two corresponding or identical parts. <i>A duplicate key.</i> |
| equivalent | Having the same or a similar effect as. <i>A wish that was equivalent to a command.</i> |
| harmonious | Suitable and fitting. <i>The decor is a harmonious blend of traditional and modern.</i> |
| <u>identical</u> | (of twins) derived from a single egg or ovum. <i>Four girls in identical green outfits.</i> |
| like | (of a portrait or other image) having a faithful resemblance to the original. <i>Members of the cat family have like dispositions.</i> |
| like peas in a pod | Equal in amount or value. |
| like two peas in a pod | Conforming in every respect. |
| mated | Mated sexually. |
| opposite | Of leaves or shoots arising in pairs at the same level on opposite sides of the stem. <i>A crowd gathered on the opposite side of the street.</i> |
| <u>parallel</u> | (of lines, planes, or surfaces) side by side and having the same distance continuously between them. <i>The road runs parallel to the Ottawa River.</i> |
| similar | Resembling or similar having the same or some of the same characteristics often used in combination. <i>Problems similar to mine.</i> |

- acquaintance** Acquaintances considered collectively.
*I have trouble remembering the names of all my **acquaintances**.*
- affinity** State of relationship between organisms or groups of organisms resulting in resemblance in structure or structural parts.
*A semantic **affinity** between two words.*
- buddy** A working companion with whom close cooperation is required.
*I decided to **buddy** up to them.*
- coordinated** Operating as a unit.
*She was usually good with her hands and well **coordinated**.*
- couple** Link or combine (something) with something else.
*He hoped she d be better in a **couple** of days.*
- couplet** A pair of successive lines of verse, typically rhyming and of the same length.

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| cousin | A child of one's uncle or aunt. <i>The new motorbikes are not proving as popular as their four wheel cousins.</i> |
| crony | A close friend or companion. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i> |
| doggerel | Comic verse composed in irregular rhythm. <i>He had heard some silly doggerel that kept running through his mind.</i> |
| duet | Perform a duet. <i>Performing duets with famous foreign artists.</i> |
| duo | A duet. <i>Two duos for violin and viola.</i> |
| equal | Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>His work is concerned with why private property equals exploitation.</i> |
| husband | Use cautiously and frugally. <i>She and her husband are both retired.</i> |
| lovable | Inspiring or deserving love or affection. <i>He has a lovable sweet personality.</i> |
| lovingly | With love or great care. <i>They smile lovingly at each other.</i> |
| match | Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>He tried to match her nonchalance.</i> |
| matching | Corresponding in pattern, colour, or design; complementary. <i>A blue jacket and matching skirt.</i> |
| mate | South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>He couldn't satisfy his frisky young mate.</i> |
| neighbour | (of a place or object) be situated next to or very near (another). <i>I chatted with my neighbour on the flight to New York.</i> |
| newlywed | Someone recently married. |
| pal | Become friends; act friendly towards. <i>We got acquainted but we never really palled around.</i> |
| partner | Be the partner of. <i>A partner in a prosperous legal practice.</i> |
| peer | A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>For yet a many of your horsemen peer.</i> |

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| pitch | Hit the ball on to the green with a pitch shot. <i>The traders had already reserved their pitches.</i> |
| prenuptial | Existing or occurring before marriage. <i>Prenuptial pregnancy.</i> |
| set | Put or set seeds seedlings or plants into the ground. <i>A set of golf clubs.</i> |
| similitude | The quality or state of being similar to something. <i>Conrad uses a range of constructions which express or imply similitude.</i> |
| together | So as to be in agreement. <i>Taken together these measures would significantly improve people s chances of surviving a coach crash.</i> |
| twin | Grow as twins. <i>Twin crystals.</i> |
| yoke | Put a yoke on a pair of animals couple or attach with or to a yoke. <i>Pulled by a yoke of oxen.</i> |
