*Her **familiars** were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.*
- friend** A contact on a social networking website.  
*We are **friends** of the family.*
- intimate** A very close friend.  
*His circle of **intimates**.*
- man** All of the living human inhabitants of the earth.  
*Places untouched by the ravages of **man**.*
- my friend** A person who backs a politician or a team etc.
- second self** A 60th part of a minute of arc.
- sidekick** A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.  
*Sherlock Holmes bumbling **sidekick** Watson.*

- become friendly** Come into existence.
- become friends** Enhance the appearance of.
- chum up** Raise.
- consort** Keep company.  
*You chose to **consort** with the enemy.*
- form a friendship** Establish or impress firmly in the mind.  
Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to.
- fraternize** *She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.*
- get together** Evoke an emotional response.



<b>go around</b>	To be spent or finished.
<b>have dealings</b>	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).
<b>keep company</b>	Supply with room and board.
<b>make friends</b>	Put in order or neaten.
<b><u>mingle</u></b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>A smell which <b>mingled</b> disinfectant and soap.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix so as to make a random order or arrangement. <i>Oil and water don t <b>mix</b>.</i>
<b>pal up</b>	Become friends; act friendly towards.
<b>rub shoulders</b>	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching.
<b>socialize</b>	Take part in social activities; interact with others. <i>The children must be properly <b>socialized</b>.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Pal" as a verb

- *We got acquainted but we never really palled around.*
- *She palled up with some English chaps.*





## Associations of "Pal" (30 Words)

- acquaintance** Acquaintances considered collectively.  
*I renewed my **acquaintance** with Herbert.*
- affinity** (anthropology) kinship by marriage or adoption; not a blood relationship.  
*James s **affinity** with Sam.*
- befriend** Act as or become a friend to (someone), especially when they are in need of help or support.  
*He makes a point of **befriending** newcomers to Parliament.*
- brother** A title given to a monk and used as form of address.  
*My **brother** still lives with our parents.*
- buddy** A person who befriends and helps another with an incapacitating disease, typically AIDS.  
*I m working on it **buddy**.*

<b><u>camaraderie</u></b>	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>The enforced <b>camaraderie</b> of office life.</i>
<b>classmate</b>	A fellow member of a class at school, college, or university.
<b>colleague</b>	A person with whom one works in a profession or business. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b><u>companion</u></b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>Drinking <b>companions</b>.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b><u>comrade</u></b>	A fellow soldier or member of the armed forces. <i>You re right <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<b><u>confidant</u></b>	A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close <b>confidante</b> of the princess.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	Two people or things of the same sort considered together. <i>In three weeks the <b>couple</b> fell in love and became engaged.</i>
<b>cousin</b>	A person in one's wider extended family, to whom one is not closely related. <i>The new motorbikes are not proving as popular as their four wheel <b>cousins</b>.</i>
<b><u>crony</u></b>	A close friend or companion. <i>He went gambling with his <b>cronies</b>.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	One of a pair. <i>Say <b>fellow</b> what are you doing.</i>
<b>folk</b>	Relating to folk music. <i>A <b>folk</b> club.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>He was my best <b>friend</b> at the university.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	A relationship between friends. <i>Because of the <b>friendship</b> between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
<b>grader</b>	A wheeled machine for levelling the ground, especially in making roads. <i>A first <b>grader</b>.</i>



<b>intimate</b>	Marked by close acquaintance, association, or familiarity - V.L. Parrington. <i><b>Intimate</b> relations between economics politics and legal principles.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>He loved the mare and all her <b>mates</b>.</i>
<b><u>neighbor</u></b>	Live or be located as a neighbor. <i>Pakistan <b>neighbors</b> India.</i>
<b>neighbour</b>	A person who lives (or is located) near another. <i>I chatted with my <b>neighbour</b> on the flight to New York.</i>
<b><u>partner</u></b>	Associate or work together as partners. <i>He began to call potential coalition <b>partners</b> about forming a new government.</i>
<b><u>peer</u></b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>We <b>peered</b> into the back of the shop to see whether a salesman was around.</i>
<b><u>sibling</u></b>	A person's brother or sister.
<b>waif</b>	A homeless child especially one forsaken or orphaned. <i>A little shop presided over by a Gothic <b>waif</b> in purple eyeshadow and lipstick.</i>
<b>workmate</b>	A fellow worker.
