## **Palace as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Palace" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “palace” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A large ornate exhibition hall.*
- *A large and stately mansion.*
- *Official residence of an exalted person (as a sovereign).*
- *A large, splendid house or place of entertainment.*
- *The governing group of a kingdom.*
- *A large and impressive building forming the official residence of a ruler, pope, archbishop, etc.*



## Synonyms of "Palace" as a noun (4 Words)

### castle

A large building, typically of the medieval period, fortified against attack with thick walls, battlements, towers, and in many cases a moat.  
*The crumbling stonework of a ruined **castle**.*

### mansion

A terrace or mansion block.  
*Carlyle **Mansions**.*

**official residence** A worker who holds or is invested with an office.

**royal residence** A sail set next above the topgallant on a royal mast.

<u><a href="#">aristocratic</a></u>	Belonging to or characteristic of the nobility or aristocracy. <i><b>Aristocratic</b> government.</i>
<b>baton</b>	A staff of office or authority, especially one carried by a field marshal. <i><b>Batons</b> of cheddar cheese.</i>

<u><a href="#">dynasty</a></u>	A line of hereditary rulers of a country. <i>The Guinness <b>dynasty</b>.</i>
<b>edict</b>	A formal or authoritative proclamation. <i>Clovis issued an <b>edict</b> protecting Church property.</i>
<u><a href="#">emperor</a></u>	An orange and brown North American butterfly with a swift dodging flight, breeding chiefly on hackberries. <i>He became <b>emperor</b> in 1930.</i>
<u><a href="#">empire</a></u>	Denoting a style of furniture, decoration, or dress fashionable chiefly during the First Empire in France. The decorative style was neoclassical but marked by an interest in Egyptian and other ancient motifs. <i>Her business <b>empire</b> grew.</i>
<u><a href="#">imperial</a></u>	Relating to or associated with an empire. <i>The party and its autocratic many would say <b>imperial</b> ways.</i>
<u><a href="#">kingdom</a></u>	A monarchy with a king or queen as head of state. <i>The <b>kingdom</b> of dreams.</i>
<b>kingship</b>	The dignity or rank or position of a king. <i>Edmund assumed <b>kingship</b> of Mercia.</i>
<b>liege</b>	A feudal superior or sovereign. <i>The Scots obeyed him as their <b>liege</b> lord.</i>
<b>majestic</b>	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>His <b>majestic</b> presence.</i>
<u><a href="#">majesty</a></u>	Impressiveness in scale or proportion. <i>The <b>majesty</b> of the royal household.</i>

<b>noble</b>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>The Duchess of Kent and several other <b>noble</b> ladies.</i>
<b>patrician</b>	A member of a noble family or class in ancient Rome. <i>A <b>patrician</b> nose.</i>
<b>prince</b>	A male monarch of a small state, actually, nominally, or originally subject to a king or emperor. <i>Arctic char is a <b>prince</b> among fishes.</i>
<b>princess</b>	The wife or widow of a prince. <i>The <b>princess</b> of American politics.</i>
<b>principality</b>	Wales.
<b>queen</b>	Become a queen. <i>The <b>queen</b> of ocean liners.</i>
<b>regal</b>	A small portable reed organ of the 16th and 17th centuries, with a pair of horizontal bellows on top. <i>Her <b>regal</b> bearing.</i>
<b>regalia</b>	The emblems or insignia of royalty, especially the crown, sceptre, and other ornaments used at a coronation. <i>The Bishop of Florence in full <b>regalia</b>.</i>
<b>regency</b>	The particular period of a regency especially in Britain from 1811 to 1820 and in France from 1715 to 1723. <i>The boy being a minor there would have to be a <b>regency</b>.</i>
<b>royal</b>	Invested with royal power as symbolized by a crown. <i>The coalition obtained <b>royal</b> approval for the appointment.</i>
<b>scepter</b>	The imperial authority symbolized by a scepter.
<b>sovereign</b>	Very good or effective. <i>Our most <b>sovereign</b> lord the King.</i>
<b>ukase</b>	(in tsarist Russia) a decree with the force of law. <i>Tsar Alexander I issued his famous <b>ukase</b> unilaterally decreeing the North Pacific Coast Russian territory.</i>
