**taste** Have a distinctive or characteristic taste.  
*It was his first **taste** of serious action.*

**tasty** Pleasing to the sense of taste.  
*A **tasty** profit margin of 42.*

**victual** Provide with food or other stores.  
*The ship wasn't even properly **victualled**.*

**victuals** Any substance that can be used as food.

**zesty** Having an agreeably pungent taste.
