Synonyms of "Pamper" as a verb (13 Words)

baby

Treat someone as a baby pamper or be overprotective towards.
*Her aunt **babied** her and fussed over her clothes.*

cater to someone's every whim

Supply food ready to eat; for parties and banquets.

cocker

Treat with excessive indulgence.

coddle

Cook (an egg) in water below boiling point.
*Let s not molly**coddle** our students.*

cosset

Treat with excessive indulgence.
*All her life she d been **cosseted** by her family.*

featherbed

Hire more workers than are necessary.

indulge

Treat with excessive indulgence.
*We **indulged** in a cream tea.*

mollycoddle	Treat (someone) in an indulgent or overprotective way. <i>I found school very difficult and realized I d been mollycoddled at home.</i>
overindulge	Gratify the wishes of (someone) to an excessive extent. <i>It is easy to overindulge in these kinds of food.</i>
overparent	Be excessively involved in the day-to-day life of (one's child or children), typically in the desire to shield them from difficult situations or help them succeed. <i>Many North American parents tend to overparent their kids.</i>
pet	Stroke or caress gently. <i>I was cosseted and petted and never shouted at.</i>
spoil	Harm the character of (someone, especially a child) by being too lenient or indulgent. <i>I ve got some ham that ll spoil if we don t eat it tonight.</i>
wait on someone hand and foot	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.

- *Grandparents often pamper the children.*

adorable

Inspiring great affection or delight.
*I have four **adorable** Siamese cats.*

adore

Love intensely.
*He **adored** his mother.*

agape

(of a person's mouth) wide open in surprise or wonder.
*Downes listened mouth **agape** with incredulity.*

baby

Treat someone as a baby pamper or be overprotective towards.
*A **baby** girl.*

botch

Make a mess of, destroy or ruin.
*He was accused of **botching** the job.*

bungle

Carry out (a task) clumsily or incompetently.
*It emerged that forensic police had **bungled** in gathering the evidence.*

<u>coddle</u>	Cook (an egg) in water below boiling point. <i>I was coddled and cosseted.</i>
connate	Related in nature. <i>A connate tomato flower.</i>
cosset	Care for and protect in an overindulgent way. <i>All her life she d been cosseted by her family.</i>
cute	Clever or cunning, especially in a self-seeking or superficial way. <i>A cute little apartment.</i>
<u>darling</u>	Beloved. <i>He is the darling of Labour s left wing.</i>
dolly	An easy catch. <i>A dolly shot.</i>
dote	Lavish (someone) with affection or gifts. <i>Rose was married to a dote of a fella.</i>
<u>dredge</u>	Bring up or clear something from a river harbour or other area of water with a dredge. <i>They start to dredge for oysters in November.</i>
eros	God of love; son of Aphrodite; identified with Roman Cupid.
fumble	Move clumsily in various directions using the hands to find one's way. <i>We are not talking about subtle errors of judgement but major fumbles.</i>
<u>impair</u>	Weaken or damage (something, especially a faculty or function). <i>His vision was impaired.</i>
lovely	Very beautiful or attractive. <i>She looked lovely.</i>
mangle	Press with a mangle. <i>Mangle the sheets.</i>
mar	A mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something especially on a person s body. <i>Violence marred a number of New Year celebrations.</i>
mollycoddle	A pampered darling; an effeminate man. <i>I found school very difficult and realized I d been mollycoddled at home.</i>
mutate	(with reference to a cell, DNA molecule, etc.) undergo or cause to undergo change in a gene or genes. <i>The virus is able to mutate into new forms that are immune to the vaccine.</i>
newborn	Having just or recently arisen or come into existence. <i>She s incapable of looking after a newborn.</i>

pup	Give birth to a puppy. <i>Pupping females.</i>
rearing	Rearing on left hind leg with forelegs elevated and head usually in profile.
son	A man regarded as the product of a particular person influence or environment. <i>You re on private land son.</i>
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>Cooper was spoiling for a fight.</i>
straighten	Straighten by unrolling. <i>Straighten hair.</i>
unsightly	Unpleasant to look at; ugly. <i>An unsightly rubbish tip.</i>
vitiate	Spoil or impair the quality or efficiency of. <i>Development programmes have been vitiated by the rise in population.</i>
