- *(law) a group of people summoned for jury service (from whom a jury will be chosen).*
- *(computer science) a small temporary window in a graphical user interface that appears in order to request information from the user; after the information has been provided the user dismisses the box with `okay' or `cancel'.*
- *A decorated area within a larger design containing a separate subject.*
- *A group of people summoned for jury service (from whom a jury will be chosen).*
- *A piece of material forming part of a garment.*
- *Sheet that forms a distinct (usually flat and rectangular) section or component of something.*
- *A small temporary window in a graphical user interface that appears in order to*

- *A committee appointed to judge a competition.*

- *A thin piece of metal forming part of the outer shell of a vehicle.*
- *A piece of cloth that is generally triangular or tapering; used in making garments or umbrellas or sails.*
- *Electrical device consisting of a flat insulated surface that contains switches and dials and meters for controlling other electrical devices.*
- *A group of people gathered for a special purpose as to plan or discuss an issue or judge a contest etc.*
- *A person or people charged with an offence.*

- board** A flat portable surface usually rectangular designed for board games.

- commission** A work produced in response to a commission.  
*A **commission** was appointed to investigate allegations of police violence.*
- committee** In the UK the whole House of Commons when sitting as a committee.  
*The housing **committee**.*

<a href="#"><u>console</u></a>	An ornamental scroll-shaped bracket (especially one used to support a wall fixture. <i>The bust of Napoleon stood on a <b>console</b>.</i>
<b>control board</b>	The economic policy of controlling or limiting or curbing prices or wages etc.
<b>control panel</b>	Regulation or maintenance of a function or action or reflex etc.
<a href="#"><u>council</u></a>	Denoting housing provided by a local council at a subsidized rent. <i>A ban on school buses using the road was imposed by the county <b>council</b>.</i>
<b>dashboard</b>	Protective covering consisting of a panel to protect people from the splashing water or mud etc. <i>Scott looked at the clock on the <b>dashboard</b>.</i>
<b>dialog box</b>	A literary composition in the form of a conversation between two people.
<b>fascia</b>	(in classical architecture) a long flat surface between mouldings on an architrave. <i>A further piece of chipboard acts as a <b>fascia</b> to disguise the ceiling fixtures.</i>
<b>gore</b>	The shedding of blood resulting in murder. <i>The film omitted the blood and <b>gore</b> in order to avoid controversy.</i>
<b>group</b>	Any number of entities (members) considered as a unit. <i>A <b>group</b> of boys approached.</i>
<b>instrument panel</b>	The semantic role of the entity (usually inanimate) that the agent uses to perform an action or start a process.
<b>jury</b>	A committee appointed to judge a competition. <i>The <b>jury</b> returned unanimous guilty verdicts.</i>
<b>lamina</b>	A thin plate or layer (especially of bone or mineral).
<a href="#"><u>layer</u></a>	A sheet, quantity, or thickness of material, typically one of several, covering a surface or body. <i>A simile has at least two <b>layers</b> of meaning.</i>
<a href="#"><u>leaf</u></a>	A thing that resembles a leaf in being flat and thin. <i><b>Leaf</b> tea.</i>
<b>pane</b>	A panel or section of panels in a wall or door.
<b>sheet</b>	A quantity of text or other information contained on a sheet of paper. <i>A <b>sheet</b> of unmarked paper.</i>
<b>slab</b>	A pack containing 24 bottles or cans of beer. <i>He handled the rope competently and set out the centre of the <b>slab</b>.</i>

- team** Used before another word to form the name of a real or notional group which supports or favours the person or thing indicated.  
*A **team** of researchers.*
- venire** A group of people summoned for jury service (from whom a jury will be chosen).

- *A layer of insulating material should be placed between the panels and the wall.*
- *Body panels for the car trade.*

- argument** An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression  $y = F(x)$  the arguments of the function  $F$  are  $x$  and  $x$  and the value is  $y$ .  
*The **argument** over foreign aid goes on and on.*
- cloture** Terminate debate by calling for a vote.  
*Over 70 of the senators voted for **cloture**.*
- contention** A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement.  
*Freud's **contention** that all dreams were wish fulfilment.*
- contentiousness** An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
- contributor** A person or thing that contributes something.  
*Hunt was the largest **contributor** of hymns to these collections.*
- controversial** Marked by or capable of arousing controversy.  
*Rushdie's **controversial** book.*

<u>controversy</u>	Prolonged public disagreement or heated discussion. <i>The design of the building has caused <b>controversy</b>.</i>
<u>debatable</u>	Open to discussion or argument. <i>It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
<b>debate</b>	An argument about a particular subject, especially one in which many people are involved. <i>John <b>debated</b> Mary.</i>
<u>dialogue</u>	Provide a film or play with a dialogue. <i>They disagreed but kept an open <b>dialogue</b>.</i>
<u>discourse</u>	Extended verbal expression in speech or writing. <i>The language of political <b>discourse</b>.</i>
<b>discuss</b>	Speak with others about something talk something over in detail have a discussion. <i>They were <b>discussing</b> where to go for a drink.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	The action or process of talking about something in order to reach a decision or to exchange ideas. <i>See Appendix One for a more detailed <b>discussion</b>.</i>
<b>disputable</b>	Capable of being disproved. <i>Whether it can be described as art criticism may be <b>disputable</b>.</i>
<b>disputation</b>	Formal academic debate. <i>The founding father of logical <b>disputation</b>.</i>
<b>disputatious</b>	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>It s a congenial hang out for <b>disputatious</b> academics.</i>
<b>dispute</b>	Have a disagreement over something. <i>The point has been much <b>disputed</b>.</i>
<b>elocution</b>	The skill of clear and expressive speech, especially of distinct pronunciation and articulation. <i>A Rileyesque <b>elocution</b>.</i>
<u>enthuse</u>	Make (someone) interested and eagerly appreciative. <i>Public art is a tonic that can <b>enthuse</b> alienated youth.</i>
<b>forum</b>	A meeting or medium where ideas and views on a particular issue can be exchanged. <i>We hope these pages act as a <b>forum</b> for debate.</i>
<b>hassel</b>	Norwegian chemist noted for his research on organic molecules (1897-1981).
<u>heated</u>	Made warm or hot het is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>She had a <b>heated</b> argument with an official.</i>

<b><u>hotspot</u></b>	An area of volcanic activity. <i>While some were caught in the cross fire at various political <b>hotspots</b> most victims were targeted and killed.</i>
<b>interlocutor</b>	A person who takes part in a dialogue or conversation.
<b>issue</b>	Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale. <i>A point of <b>issue</b>.</i>
<b>membrane</b>	A thin pliable sheet of material forming a barrier or lining. <i>The nucleus is a distinct region with a <b>membrane</b> around it.</i>
<b>polemical</b>	Of or involving dispute or controversy. <i>A <b>polemical</b> essay.</i>
<b>prompting</b>	A cue given to a performer (usually the beginning of the next line to be spoken). <i>After some <b>prompting</b> the defendant gave the police his name.</i>
<b><u>quarrel</u></b>	An angry dispute. <i>They had a <b>quarrel</b>.</i>
<b><u>wrangle</u></b>	To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively. <i>The bar keeper threw them out but they continued to <b>wrangle</b> on down the street.</i>
