
## Panic as a Noun

#### Definitions of "Panic" as a noun

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "panic" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- Sudden mass fear and anxiety over anticipated events.
- A state of widespread financial alarm provoking hasty action.
- A frenzied hurry to do something.
- Sudden uncontrollable fear or anxiety, often causing wildly unthinking behaviour.
- An overwhelming feeling of fear and anxiety.





### Synonyms of "Panic" as a noun (19 Words)

affright

An emotion experienced in anticipation of some specific pain or danger (usually accompanied by a desire to flee or fight. *The deer gazed at us in affright.* 



agitation	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. Widespread <b>agitation</b> for social reform.
<u>alarm</u>	An alarm clock. I hammered on several doors to raise the <b>alarm</b> .
anxiety	Strong desire or concern to do something or for something to happen. <i>She suffered from anxiety attacks.</i>
apprehension	Painful expectation. They acted with intent to prevent lawful <b>apprehension</b> .
apprehensiveness	Fearful expectation or anticipation.
consternation	A feeling of anxiety or dismay, typically at something unexpected. <i>To her consternation her car wouldn t start.</i>
dismay	Concern and distress caused by something unexpected. <i>To his <b>dismay</b> she left him.</i>
disquiet	A feeling of worry or unease. Public <b>disquiet</b> about animal testing.
<u>dread</u>	Dreadlocks. I used to have a <b>dread</b> of Friday afternoons.
fear	An unpleasant emotion caused by the threat of danger, pain, or harm. <i>The fear</i> of God.
fright	An experience that causes one to feel sudden intense fear. She s had a nasty <b>fright</b> .
<u>horror</u>	Something that inspires horror something horrible. A <b>horror</b> film.
<u>hysteria</u>	Exaggerated or uncontrollable emotion or excitement. The anti Semitic <b>hysteria</b> of the 1890s.
<u>nervousness</u>	The anxious feeling you have when you have the jitters. There was a trace of <b>nervousness</b> in his voice.
perturbation	The act of causing disorder. <i>The term distress connotes some degree of</i> <b>perturbation</b> <i>and</i> <i>emotional upset.</i>
<u>scare</u>	A situation characterized by a sudden and typically widespread sense of alarm or anxiety about something. Recent food <b>scares</b> have made the public rightly sensitive to new apparently untested technologies.
terror	Terrorism. Weapons of <b>terror</b> .



### trepidation

A feeling of alarm or dread. The men set off in fear and **trepidation**.

## Definitions of "Panic" as a verb

- Be overcome by a sudden fear.
- Drive someone through panic into (hasty action.
- Cause sudden fear in or fill with sudden panic.
- Feel or cause to feel panic.

get overwrought	Grasp with the mind or develop an understanding of.
get worked up	Suffer from the receipt of.
go to pieces	Stretch out over a distance, space, time, or scope; run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point.
horrify	Fill with apprehension or alarm; cause to be unpleasantly surprised. They were horrified by the very idea.
lose control	Fail to perceive or to catch with the senses or the mind.
lose one's nerve	Allow to go out of sight.
overreact	Respond more emotionally or forcibly than is justified. Don t <b>overreact</b> to the bad news take it easy.
<u>scare</u>	Become scared. I was <b>scare</b> d stiff.
take fright	Remove something concrete, as by lifting, pushing, or taking off, or remove something abstract.
terrify	Fill with terror; frighten greatly. <i>The thought terrifies me.</i>
unnerve	Disturb the composure of. The journey over the bridge had <b>unnerve</b> d me.

fear	A feeling of profound respect for someone or something. I shall buy her book though not I <b>fear</b> the hardback version.
fearfulness	The trait of being afraid.
fearsome	Causing fear or dread or terror. The cat mewed displaying a <b>fearsome</b> set of teeth.
fright	Frighten. She s had a nasty <b>fright</b> .
frighten	Drive out by frightening. If you say anything to him you might <b>frighten</b> him off.
<u>frightening</u>	Making someone afraid or anxious; terrifying. A <b>frightening</b> experience.
<u>haunt</u>	Haunt like a ghost pursue. A grey lady who <b>haunt</b> s the chapel.
<u>horrific</u>	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>Horrific</i> injuries.

sanguinary	Marked by eagerness to resort to violence and bloodshed-G.W.Johnson. <i>This bitter and <b>sanguinary</b> war.</i>
<u>scare</u>	Become scared. Recent food <b>scare</b> s have made the public rightly sensitive to new apparently untested technologies.



scared	Fearful; frightened. Too shocked and <b>scared</b> to move.
scary	Frightening; causing fear. It was <b>scary</b> the way they bonded with each other.
terrify	Fill with terror; frighten greatly. The thought terrifies me.
<u>terrifying</u>	Causing extreme terror. The <b>terrifying</b> events of the past few weeks.
terror	Terrorism. A <b>terror</b> attack.
