## Paradigm as a Noun

### Definitions of "Paradigm" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “paradigm” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The generally accepted perspective of a particular discipline at a given time.*
- *The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position (or slot) in a grammatical sentence (are in paradigmatic relation with one another).*
- *Systematic arrangement of all the inflected forms of a word.*
- *A typical example or pattern of something; a pattern or model.*
- *(in the traditional grammar of Latin, Greek, and other inflected languages) a table of all the inflected forms of a particular verb, noun, or adjective, serving as a model for other words of the same conjugation or declension.*
- *A standard or typical example.*
- *A world view underlying the theories and methodology of a particular scientific subject.*
- *A set of linguistic items that form mutually exclusive choices in particular syntactic roles.*



## Synonyms of "Paradigm" as a noun (13 Words)

<b>case</b>	An agreed summary of the facts relating to a legal case drawn up for review or decision on a point of law by a higher court. <i>It was a <b>case</b> of bad judgment.</i>
<b>case in point</b>	A comprehensive term for any proceeding in a court of law whereby an individual seeks a legal remedy.
<a href="#"><u>epitome</u></a>	A brief abstract (as of an article or book). <i>She looked the <b>epitome</b> of elegance and good taste.</i>
<a href="#"><u>exemplar</u></a>	Something to be imitated. <i>An <b>exemplar</b> of success.</i>
<b>exemplification</b>	A representational or typifying form or model.
<b>illustration</b>	Showing by example. <i>By way of <b>illustration</b> I refer to the following case.</i>
<a href="#"><u>image</u></a>	(Jungian psychology) a personal facade that one presents to the world. <i>The company tried to project an altruistic <b>image</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>instance</u></a>	An example or single occurrence of something. <i>A serious <b>instance</b> of corruption.</i>
<b>prototype</b>	A basic filter network with specified cut-off frequencies, from which other networks may be derived to obtain sharper cut-offs, constancy of characteristic impedance with frequency, etc. <i>These objects are the <b>prototypes</b> of a category of rapidly spinning neutron stars.</i>
<b>representative case</b>	A person who represents others.
<a href="#"><u>sample</u></a>	A sound or piece of music created by sampling. <i><b>Samples</b> of products for evaluation.</i>
<a href="#"><u>specimen</u></a>	A sample for medical testing, especially of urine. <i>They collected a urine <b>specimen</b> for urinalysis.</i>
<b>substitution class</b>	An event in which one thing is substituted for another.



## Usage Examples of "Paradigm" as a noun

- *The discovery of universal gravitation became the paradigm of successful science.*
- *English determiners form a paradigm: we can say 'a book' or 'his book' but not 'a his book'.*
- *Society's paradigm of the 'ideal woman'.*
- *He framed the problem within the psychoanalytic paradigm.*

<b>absolute</b>	Not limited by law. <i>An <b>absolute</b> guarantee to respect the nation's authority.</i>
<b>archetype</b>	A very typical example of a certain person or thing. <i>Mythological <b>archetypes</b> of good and evil.</i>
<b>emulation</b>	Technique of one machine obtaining the same results as another. <i>A model worthy of <b>emulation</b>.</i>
<b>epitome</b>	A brief abstract (as of an article or book). <i>She looked the <b>epitome</b> of elegance and good taste.</i>
<b>example</b>	An item of information that is typical of a class or group. <i>A workbook and a data set will enable the researcher to follow worked <b>examples</b>.</i>
<b>exemplar</b>	Something to be imitated. <i>An <b>exemplar</b> of success.</i>
<b>herbarium</b>	A room or building housing a herbarium.
<b>ideal</b>	Conforming to an ultimate standard of perfection or excellence embodying an ideal. <i>You're my <b>ideal</b> of how a man should be.</i>
<b>instance</b>	A particular case. <i>I <b>instanced</b> Bob as someone whose commitment had certainly got things done.</i>
<b>lattice</b>	An interlaced structure or pattern resembling a lattice. <i>The lift stopped and he peered through the metal <b>lattice</b>.</i>
<b>mannequin</b>	A person employed by a designer or shop to model clothes. <i>She was too fat to be a <b>mannequin</b>.</i>
<b>model</b>	Construct a model of. <i>The clothes were <b>modelled</b> by celebrities.</i>
<b>monitory</b>	Giving or serving as a warning. <i>Shook a <b>monitory</b> finger at him.</i>
<b>paradigmatic</b>	Serving as a typical example of something. <i>His biography is <b>paradigmatic</b> of the experiences of this generation.</i>
<b>paragon</b>	A perfect diamond of 100 carats or more. <i>Your cook is a <b>paragon</b>.</i>
<b>perfect</b>	A tense of verbs used in describing action that has been completed sometimes regarded as perfective aspect. <i>The equipment was in <b>perfect</b> condition.</i>

<b>personification</b>	The act of attributing human characteristics to abstract ideas etc. <i>The knight is accompanied by two feminine <b>personifications</b> of vice.</i>
<b>photogenic</b>	(of an organism or tissue) producing or emitting light. <i>A <b>photogenic</b> child.</i>
<b>poser</b>	A person who poses; a poseur.
<b>prototype</b>	Make a prototype of a product. <i>He is the <b>prototype</b> of good breeding.</i>
<b>quintessence</b>	The fifth and highest element after air and earth and fire and water; was believed to be the substance composing all heavenly bodies. <i>We were all brought up to believe that advertising is the <b>quintessence</b> of marketing.</i>
<b>quintessential</b>	Representing the perfect example of a class or quality. <i>He was the <b>quintessential</b> tough guy strong silent and self contained.</i>
<b>replica</b>	An exact copy or model of something, especially one on a smaller scale. <i>A <b>replica</b> of the Empire State Building.</i>
<b>sample</b>	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>Riffs <b>sampled</b> from other musicians.</i>
<b>specimen</b>	A bit of tissue or blood or urine that is taken for diagnostic purposes. <i><b>Specimens</b> of copper ore.</i>
<b>spheroid</b>	A solid generated by a half revolution of an ellipse about its major axis prolate spheroid or minor axis oblate spheroid. <i>It looked like a sphere but on closer examination I saw it was really a <b>spheroid</b>.</i>
<b>type</b>	Determine the type to which a person or their blood or tissue belongs. <i>Two sporty <b>types</b> in tracksuits.</i>
<b>typify</b>	Be characteristic or a representative example of. <i>The sun typified the Greeks, and the moon the Persians.</i>
<b>universality</b>	The quality of being universal; existing everywhere. <i>The <b>universality</b> of the experience of grief and loss.</i>
<b>unpopular</b>	Not liked or popular. <i><b>Unpopular</b> measures.</i>
