disabled	Relating to or specifically designed for people with a physical or mental disability. <i>Technology to help the elderly and the disabled.</i>
dunce	A stupid person; these words are used to express a low opinion of someone's intelligence. <i>He was baffled by arithmetic and they called him a dunce at school.</i>
<u>enthral</u>	Hold spellbound.
foot	An army unit consisting of soldiers who fight on foot. <i>The foot of the mountain.</i>
freezing	The freezing point of water 0 C. <i>He was freezing and miserable.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>She speaks halting English with a heavy accent.</i>
handicap	A race or contest in which a handicap is imposed. <i>He plays off a handicap of 10.</i>
handicapped	People collectively who are crippled or otherwise physically handicapped. <i>His third child was born severely handicapped.</i>
hospital	A medical institution where sick or injured people are given medical or surgical care. <i>Christ's Hospital.</i>
hypnotize	Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>A witness had been hypnotized to enhance his memory.</i>
<u>ill</u>	Presaging ill fortune. <i>Tried not to speak ill of the dead.</i>
<u>incapable</u>	Unable to behave rationally or manage one's affairs. <i>The pilot may become incapable from the lack of oxygen.</i>
<u>ineffectual</u>	Not producing an intended effect. <i>An ineffectual ruler.</i>
<u>lame</u>	Make a person or animal lame. <i>He was badly lamed during the expedition.</i>
mesmerize	Attract strongly, as if with a magnet. <i>He was mesmerized when at the point of death.</i>
<u>numb</u>	Make numb or insensitive. <i>Vodka might numb the pain in my hand.</i>
operation	The performance of some composite cognitive activity an operation that affects mental contents. <i>The company's first hotel is now in operation.</i>

- patient** The semantic role of an entity that is not the agent but is directly involved in or affected by the happening denoted by the verb in the clause.
*An exact and **patient** scientist.*
- sick** People who are sick.
*Mark felt **sick** with fear.*
- spellbind** Put into a trance.
The singer held the audience spellbound.
- trance** Put into a trance.
*She s been **tranced** and may need waking.*
- unable** (usually followed by `to') not having the necessary means or skill or know-how.
*She was **unable** to conceal her surprise.*
- unconscious** Not awake and aware of and responding to one's environment.
*Lay **unconscious** on the floor.*
- wheelchair** A chair fitted with wheels for use as a means of transport by a person who is unable to walk as a result of illness, injury, or disability.
