| <b>dunce</b>              | A stupid person; these words are used to express a low opinion of someone's intelligence.<br><i>He was baffled by arithmetic and they called him a <b>dunce</b> at school.</i> |
| <b><u>enthral</u></b>     | Hold spellbound.   |
| <b>foot</b>               | An army unit consisting of soldiers who fight on foot.<br><i>The <b>foot</b> of the mountain.</i>  |
| <b>freezing</b>           | The freezing point of water 0 C.<br><i>He was <b>freezing</b> and miserable.</i>   |
| <b>halting</b>            | Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain.<br><i>She speaks <b>halting</b> English with a heavy accent.</i>   |
| <b>handicap</b>           | A race or contest in which a handicap is imposed.<br><i>He plays off a <b>handicap</b> of 10.</i>  |
| <b>handicapped</b>        | People collectively who are crippled or otherwise physically handicapped.<br><i>His third child was born severely <b>handicapped</b>.</i>                                      |
| <b>hospital</b>           | A medical institution where sick or injured people are given medical or surgical care.<br><i>Christ's <b>Hospital</b>.</i>   |
| <b>hypnotize</b>          | Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate.<br><i>A witness had been <b>hypnotized</b> to enhance his memory.</i>   |
| <b><u>ill</u></b>         | Presaging ill fortune.<br><i>Tried not to speak <b>ill</b> of the dead.</i>  |
| <b><u>incapable</u></b>   | Unable to behave rationally or manage one's affairs.<br><i>The pilot may become <b>incapable</b> from the lack of oxygen.</i>  |
| <b><u>ineffectual</u></b> | Not producing an intended effect.<br><i>An <b>ineffectual</b> ruler.</i>   |
| <b><u>lame</u></b>        | Make a person or animal lame.<br><i>He was badly <b>lamed</b> during the expedition.</i>   |
| <b>mesmerize</b>          | Attract strongly, as if with a magnet.<br><i>He was <b>mesmerized</b> when at the point of death.</i>  |
| <b><u>numb</u></b>        | Make numb or insensitive.<br><i>Vodka might <b>numb</b> the pain in my hand.</i>   |
| <b>operation</b>          | The performance of some composite cognitive activity an operation that affects mental contents.<br><i>The company's first hotel is now in <b>operation</b>.</i>                |

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| <b>patient</b>     | The semantic role of an entity that is not the agent but is directly involved in or affected by the happening denoted by the verb in the clause.<br><i>An exact and <b>patient</b> scientist.</i> |
| <b>sick</b>        | People who are sick.<br><i>Mark felt <b>sick</b> with fear.</i>   |
| <b>spellbind</b>   | Put into a trance.<br><i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>   |
| <u>trance</u>      | Put into a trance.<br><i>She s been <b>tranced</b> and may need waking.</i>   |
| <u>unable</u>      | (usually followed by `to') not having the necessary means or skill or know-how.<br><i>She was <b>unable</b> to conceal her surprise.</i>  |
| <u>unconscious</u> | Not awake and aware of and responding to one's environment.<br><i>Lay <b>unconscious</b> on the floor.</i>  |
| <b>wheelchair</b>  | A chair fitted with wheels for use as a means of transport by a person who is unable to walk as a result of illness, injury, or disability.   |
